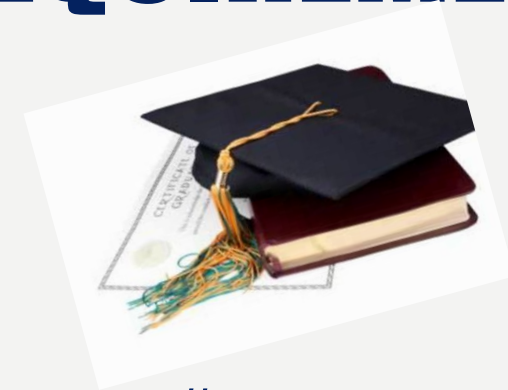

GRADUATION REQUIREMENTS



**4-year colleges in SC require 3 credits of lab science, 2 credits of a foreign language, and one fine arts credit.*

Retention and Promotion Policy



To be promoted to the 9th grade

Student must be promoted by middle school

To be promoted to the 10th grade

Student must have earned a total of 5 credits **including 1 Math and 1 English**

To be promoted to the 11th grade

Student must have earned a total of 11 credits **including 2 Math and 2 English**

To be promoted to the 12th grade

Student must be able to graduate by the end of the current school year. The subsequent summer term is NOT counted as part of the current school year.

9th Grade Year is CRITICAL

Students who are on-track at the end of their 9th grade year (earn at least a quarter of the credits toward their diploma with no Fs in core classes) are as much as **four times more likely** to graduate on time than their off-track peers.

- The 9th grade on track metric is more predictive of a student's likelihood of graduating on time than race, ethnicity, poverty level, and previous test scores. ([Allensworth, 2013](#))

For every core course that a 9th grade student fails, their chance of graduating in four years **decreases by 30%** ([Center for High School Success](#))

Attendance Requirements

Excused vs Unexcused

EXCUSED - An absence is **excused** when a student has been out of school for a **"lawful"** reason and has submitted a note to the school explaining the absence.

UNEXCUSED - An absence is unexcused when a student fails to submit a note for an absence or when a student has been out of school for an **"unlawful"** reason.



Lawful vs Unlawful

LAWFUL - Illness; doctor/dental appointment; death/serious illness in immediate family; recognized religious holiday of their faith; student court appearance; prearranged absences for other reasons at the discretion of the principal

UNLAWFUL - Willfully absent from school without the knowledge of parent/guardian; absent without acceptable cause with the knowledge of their parent/guardian.

Seat-time recovery - it's back

In order to receive credit for a high school course, a student must attend at least 85 days (for full credit course) .

Students who miss more than the days listed below may not receive credit even if they are passing the class. An “FA” (50) will appear on their high school transcript.

- 5 days for a 1.0 credit course
- 3 days for .5 credit course
- All absences, **excused or unexcused**, count toward these limits.

Students will receive an email stating that they are at risk for a failure due to attendance and that they are required to make up seat time.

Seat-time recovery is offered Mon, Wed, and Fri mornings at 8:00 in room 141 with Mr. Hudak.

Seat-time Flex Session Recovery is also offered with Mrs. Plummer. Some students are automatically enrolled in the Seat-time recovery flex period and must report to room 131 or the Auditorium before the tardy bell rings. Students may also send an email to kplummer@sdoc.org if they would like to have additional Flex sessions scheduled to clear up their attendance more quickly.

College Planning

COLLEGE PLANNING

Freshman and Sophomore Years:

- Build your transcript—Grades are important!!
- Think about and explore possible majors.
- Explore college websites for requirements.
- Create your resume (*Extracurricular Activities, Service Hours, Honors, Awards, etc.*).
- Apply for Summer Programs and Workshops.
- Keep in mind - there are different pathways to a college degree.

College Planning

Junior Year:

- Begin to narrow choices to a few schools.
- Plan to take the appropriate test(s) in the spring.
- Update your resume.
- Visit Colleges:
 - Juniors are allowed 2 college visits.
 - Students must complete the College Visitation form **prior** to taking the visit (**green** form).
 - Official documentation from the college must be turned in to the Attendance office following the visit for absences to be excused.
 - Look for Open House Events - Universities put on their best show these days.

SC STATE SCHOLARSHIPS

Palmetto Fellows Scholarship (\$6,700 - \$10,000 per year)

- Rank in the top 6% at end of 10th, 11th or 12th grade academic year
- Score 1200 SAT or 24 ACT (1400 or 31 if rank criteria not met)
- Earn a 3.5 Cumulative SC UGP GPA (4.0 if rank criteria not met)

LIFE Scholarship (\$5,000- \$7,500 per year)

To start at a 2-YEAR COLLEGE

- **3.0 Cumulative SC UGP GPA**

To start at a 4-YEAR COLLEGE, students must meet one of the additional requirements below:

TCTC/University Transfer

General Education/University Transfer courses are offered at TCTC and are designed for students planning to attend a 4-year college or university or desiring to get a head start on general education courses. Students who qualify can begin taking these courses while still in high school, or they can use this path after they graduate for a more affordable way to earn a college degree.

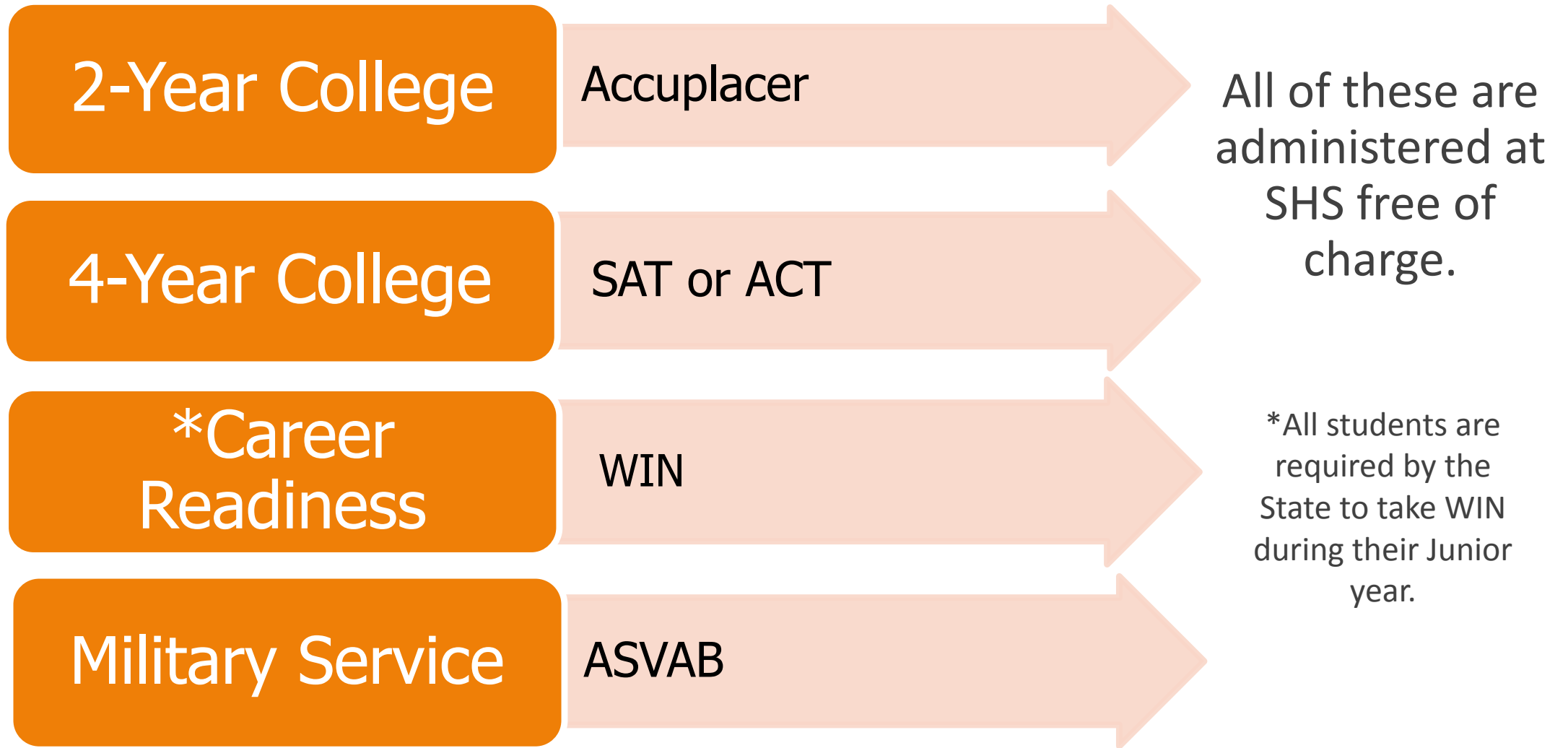
To prepare, students should

- Review courses required for their intended college major at Tri-County or other 4-year college or university in order to select the most appropriate courses;
- Check with the college they plan to attend to verify course transferability and the grade that must be earned;
- Take Tri-County's ACCUPLACER assessment to gauge college readiness and to qualify for certain courses.
- While still in high school, they will enroll through the **Dual Enrollment Office**
 - Popular Dual Enrollment courses:
 - English 101, English 102, MAT 120 (Probability and Statistics), PSC 201 (American Government), General Psychology, SPC 205 (Public Speaking)

ASSESSMENTS

PSAT: October 17 www.collegeboard.org

- All Sophomores are tested each year, and Juniors who sign up can test again - their results are now available in their College Board account.
- ***Juniors*** - This is the qualifying test for National Merit Scholarship Competition.

Armed Services Vocational Aptitude Battery (ASVAB):

- Given each year in the fall to Juniors and Seniors who sign up
- Will be given in the Spring of 2024 to all Sophomores - a test that can be used to indicate career readiness

ASSESSMENTS

ACCUPLACER: November 15 - given to all Juniors in the fall

- Assessment of College Readiness - used for placement at technical schools and to qualify for Dual Enrollment.
- Get the Study APP: accuplacer.collegeboard.org/students

ACT & SAT: Either test is universally accepted as an entrance exam for 4-year colleges and universities. All 3rd year students can test for free on a school day at SHS and will select their preference.

- Juniors and Seniors can qualify for a waiver for additional test opportunities; check with your student's School Counselor.

- Athletes who intend to play Division 1 or Division 2 athletics must register with the NCAA Eligibility Center at <https://web3.ncaa.org/ecwr3/>
- Students can register as early as their sophomore year.
- SAT/ACT scores must be submitted by the Testing Agencies (Code 9999). The Eligibility Center super scores the SAT and ACT.
- Official Transcripts are required.
- **Current registration fee is \$100.**
- **Full Qualifier:**
 - Complete 16 Core Courses (10 before senior year; 7 must be English, Math, or Science)
 - Minimum Core GPA of 2.3 plus test score based on NCAA sliding scale

- SAT/ACT scores must be submitted by the Testing Agencies (Code 9876).
- Official Transcripts are required.
- **Current registration fee is \$90**
- To be eligible, students must graduate with a 2.3+ GPA or meet 2 of these 3 requirements:
 - 2.0 GPA on 4.0 scale
 - Minimum 18 ACT score or 970 SAT score (Evidence-Based Reading and Writing + Math)
 - Graduate in the top half of your senior class

The NAIA accepts the grade point average determined by the high school, provided it is recorded and awarded in the same manner as for every other student at the school.

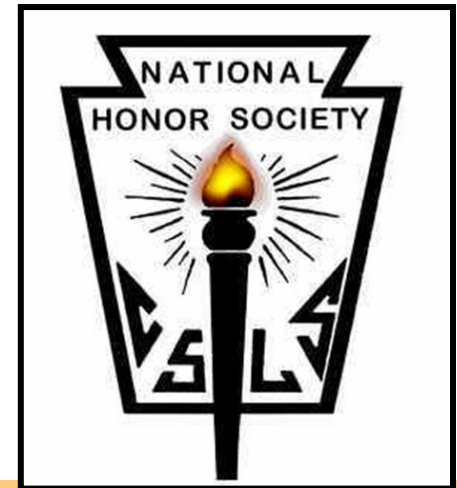

- **Pre-Registration - December and January**
 - Teacher/Student conversations
 - Teachers make recommendations for core classes
 - Parents and students discuss recommendations, electives and alternates prior to IGP conferences
- **IGP Conference - in February and March**
 - Parents/guardians and student meet with counselor - course requests will be entered into Powerschool at that time

Advanced Placement®: The Basics

- AP® courses reflect the rigor of college level courses with the engagement and support of high school teachers
- Courses usually involve hands-on learning with student-teacher interaction as opposed to lecture based learning with independent work
- Courses reflect what is taught in introductory-level college courses
- Students take **AP Exams** at the end of the course, measuring their mastery of college-level work
- A score of 3 or higher on an AP Exam can typically earn students college credit and/or placement into advanced courses in college (see hand out)

Dual Enrollment and Dual Credit

- **Dual Enrollment** – student is enrolled in both high school and college at the same time
- **Dual Credit** – student receives high school credit toward graduation requirements for taking a college course
- **University Transfer Options-** Coursework taken while in high school that transfers to 2- 4 year institutions commonly known as general education requirements
- **Technical Career Pathway Options-** Coursework taken while in high school that leads to stackable workforce credentials that also fulfill AAS requirements at 2&4 year institutions
