The Georgia Standards of Excellence English Language Arts/Literacy standards have been adopted as part of the official standards for all CTAE courses. Therefore, career and technical education in the district inherently integrates academic content. To ensure that career and technical education is aligned to in-demand occupations and industries, the CTAE Director and other members of the district-level CTAE staff have close relationships with the Greater Columbus Chamber of Commerce, as well as direct connections to other business and industry professionals. The CTAE Department also maintains advisory committees for each CTAE program area. These advisory committees meet at least twice per year and are composed of district teachers, post-secondary educators, and business professionals. Through these networks, the CTAE Department is kept aware of workforce development needs in the region, informing decisions to modify CTAE curriculum and instruction to maintain relevance.</p> <p>All high school CTAE courses are organized in Pathways, which are three sequential courses in the same program area. Each CTAE Pathway is paired with Career and Technical Student Organization (CTSOs). CTSOs are embedded in the course standards in high school and strongly encouraged in middle school. These co-curricular organizations offer leadership programs and competitive events which reflect current curriculum standards and competencies for the instructional programs they serve. Teachers infuse the CTSO's experiential learning activities into the instructional activities, thereby helping students see the real-world value of their academic studies.</p> <p>High school CTAE Pathways culminate with an End of Pathway Assessment (EOPA). Georgia's EOPA process was derived in direct response to Perkins V Legislation, which mandated states to implement a measurement mechanism that would ascertain the technical skill attainment level of students participating in career and technical education courses. The district administers EOPAs to all eligible students who have completed a CTAE Pathway, thereby enabling them to demonstrate skill attainment and earn industry-recognized career credentials.</p> <p>Additionally, elementary school counselors facilitate three (3) career lessons for each grade level. Fifth grades students complete a Career Portfolio outlining his or her post-secondary options.</p> <p>Finally, work-based learning (WBL) opportunities are provided to students in the 11th and 12th grades. WBL is a course for academic credit, and it represents the pinnacle of the career-related education experience. WBL is designed so that students' job placements are directly related to the curriculum of the CTAE Pathway classes they have completed or in which they are concurrently enrolled. Through these placements, students will gain in-depth interactions with industry professionals and exposure to actual workplace settings.</p>

This system follows the student so when a student changes schools the days cumulated at a previous school will be included in the notification to administrators at the new school. ● MCSD is following implementation science to install layers of evidence-based interventions at schools. For the 2021-22 school year we had fifteen (15) schools meeting criteria for "operational" status in Positive Behavioral Interventions and Supports (PBIS). Twenty-four (24) schools are "emerging" and eight (8) "installing." We also have seven (7) schools that are "distinguished" status, which is the highest level of recognition supported by the Georgia Dept. of Education for PBIS implementation. We now have all 54 schools/programs trained in Tier 1 PBIS and implementing at some level. We will continue to provide training and support for PBIS. ● We started social-emotional-behavioral and developmental screening for Pre-K-12 grade students district-wide in the 2018-19 school year. We have repeated this process yearly and will continue to screen districtwide three times per year. ● All 54 schools/programs implemented Social-Emotional Learning. Some schools used Second Step social-emotional learning (SEL) curriculum to deliver lessons through classroom teachers. "Connect with Kids," an online SEL platform, was also used to provide for district-wide implementations of SEL for all grades. 12 of our schools received a grant through the state's Dept. of Human Resources to use the 2ndStep digital curriculum for the next 5 school years starting in 2022-23. This online version allows for better monitoring of school implementation of SEL. ● We offered multiple PBIS Classroom Systems and "Check-In Check-Out" training for schools based on readiness year. We will repeat these trainings this year and also continue providing the PBIS Tier 2 Systems and Tier 3 Systems training to Muscogee County for schools during the 2023-24 school year. Each school team has a Tier 2 Coordinator and SST Chair that will participate in district-level coaching meetings this school year and two onsite coaching sessions/meetings to be provided to their Tier 2 team by the Department of Prevention and Intervention Practices. ● GaDOE's PBIS Classroom training will be provided to schools again during the 2023 school year. The GaDOE PBIS classroom training is entitled "Universal Classroom Supports for Educators" and will be provided annually for all schools until every school has been trained. ● The Departments of Prevention and Intervention Practices and Program for Exceptional Students have developed a Pre-Functional Information (PFI) Process designed to serve as a precursor to the full FBA/BIP process that promotes the development of early and effective planning that results in more functional and appropriate interventions for students with the slightest behavioral struggles. Training on this document was provided to all PBIS Coaches, SST Chairs, and 504 Chairs this school year. We will train on this process annually moving forward.

The district has established a Pre-K office which employs a full time Director and 1 FTE Administrative Assistant. The district has 22 Early Success Centers (ESC) located within our elementary schools. The schools were selected by region (West, Central and East) to house ESCs to assure access to all parents. Each early success center will have 2-4 Pre-K classrooms which promotes teacher collaboration and supports professional learning communities with a total of 55 classes. Each classroom will have a lead Pre-K teacher and a paraprofessional. All Pre-K teachers possess a bachelor's degree related to Early Childhood Education or a Georgia T4 or T5 teaching certificate and follow a state approved, district adopted curriculum that supports Georgia Early Learning and Development Standards (GELDS). We support our prek teachers by providing new teacher orientation, job embedded professional development, and instructional support from our building level academic coaches and district Pre-K academic coach. The ESCs are located within established elementary schools in the district to allow accessibility and exposure to the students and parents to elementary school routines and practices. At the completion of Pre-K4 program within the district, students are automatically enrolled in their zoned school for the upcoming Kindergarten year. The district will establish a summer transition program for incoming Kindergarten students. These plans identify the students' career pathway, diploma type, and courses necessary to graduate. The IGP serves as a guide to develop the transition plan in the students' IEP and will assist with transitioning the student to postsecondary education or the work force.</p> <p>High School transition students are encouraged to apply for Vocational Rehabilitation services in order to receive pre-employment transition services while still in school. Vocational Rehabilitation offers the following pre-employment transition services: Self-advocacy, workplace readiness, job exploration, counseling on enrollment opportunities, and work-based learning experiences. PES students enrolled in grades eleventh and twelfth are invited to participate in High School High Tech (HSHT). HSHT students participate in activities that expose them to industries, jobs, and colleges. HSHT students acquire knowledge of educational requirements for careers and college entry information. HSHT students also attend job fairs, work on resume building opportunities, participate in mock interviews, and learn self-advocacy skills, social media etiquette and financial literacy. Students in specialized-adaptive classes in grades ninth through twelfth participate in community-based instructional opportunities. Specialized adaptive students in eleventh and twelfth grade participate in the community two days per week utilizing previously learned job skills and building upon the established skill set.
