NEW THIS SCHOOL YEAR

A PEEK INSIDE A FEW OF THE NEW OPPORTUNITIES FOR STUDENTS THIS SCHOOL YEAR

INTRODUCTION TO TRADES FOR GRADES 9 & 10

New this year, students in grades 9 and 10 are enjoying a class with a hands-on learning experience that is also building some important life skills. In the "Art of the Trades" class, students are applying their math knowledge with some basic carpentry skills to build cornhole boards. Students will then paint, stencil and lacquer the cornhole boards to be

sold in an auction to school booster clubs or other organizations.

The students are also investing in their school by designing and building things like heavy duty shelves for our science classrooms or theater sets for the recent fall musical, the Wizard of Oz.

To help our students continue building on what they are learning, they will take a field trip to the "Constructing our Future" event in St. Paul. There they will participate in hands-on demos and speak with professionals from various trade organizations that will help students begin thinking about what they might want to pursue after high school. This course gives kids a chance to get hands-on tool experience that they may not have had the opportunity to learn elsewhere. Practicing these life skills in a safe space, even if they don't use them in future classes or careers, helps them build confidence.

5TH GRADE BAND EXPLORATION

New this year at the elementary schools, all 5th grade students at both Lincoln Center Elementary and Kaposia Education Center are being introduced to band. The students spend one month on each of the different instruments including:

- Trumpet
- Trombone
- Clarinet
- Flute

They learn how the instrument makes sounds and basic notes. This introduction to band gives students wanting to continue with band in middle and high school an opportunity to try different instruments and see what they like playing best. IB Physics Rocket Launch

IB Physics students built rockets this fall and launched them on the football practice field. They're experiencing first hand: Newton's three laws of motion, the concept of momentum, and the kinematics equation of motion.

Secondary Students Read at Elementary Schools

Student leaders at the secondary building visited both elementary schools this fall to read to classrooms. They read Hispanic themed stories in honor of Hispanic Heritage Month.

Middle School Scientists

7th grade scientists practiced their observation skills using fish. Working in pairs they took turns changing the fish's environment. With each change to the environment in their bowl, they observed how the fish reacted. Hands-On STEAM Learning Lincoln Center students had an in-school "field trip" by Mobile Ed Productions. They spent time at each station doing interactive, hands-on STEAM experiments like pedaling to generate energy and excavating fossils.

SAFETY AND SECURITY IN OUR SCHOOLS

South St. Paul Public Schools (SSPPS) is committed to the safety of every student, staff member, and person who enters our buildings. District and school leaders partner with local law enforcement and other agencies to plan, prepare, and implement a safe and supportive learning environment, Using Standard Response Protocols (SRP) from the "I Love You Guys" Foundation, students and staff are trained annually on the five components of the SRP.



HOLD - A Hold is called to keep a hallway or certain area of the building clear.

SECURE - A Secure is called when there is a danger outside of the building.

LOCKDOWN - "Locks, Lights, Out of Sight." A Lockdown is called when there is something dangerous inside of the building.

EVACUATE - There may be times when we need to evacuate the building to ensure the safety of our students and staff.

SHELTER - A shelter is called when specific protective actions are needed based on a threat or hazard such as tornadoes or severe weather.

COMMUNICATION

SSPPS places a high value on the connections we have with students, families, and the community. While the district strives to be proactive, accurate, and timely in communication with families and our greater SSP community, there may be times when circumstances dictate longer notification or response times. There may also be certain information that the district is unable to share due to data privacy reasons.

We ask that our community is mindful of what they are posting on social media until the district has had a chance to gather all the facts and alert families with the accurate information. Often, inaccurate information that is posted on social media can lead to additional stress, anxiety, and frustration. The safety of our students and staff are the district's number one priority and we are committed to keeping our lines of communication open with our families and greater SSP community.

Here are a few of those opportunities:

- FREE TAKE 'N BAKE MEALS: Free take 'n bake meals prepared by local restaurants are available to all residents. Meals are available at Central Square each week from Monday afternoon through Saturday while supplies last.
- OPEN DOOR PANTRY: Free groceries for all residents, 3rd Wednesday of every month at Kaposia Education Center from 4:00-6:00 pm: December 20, January 17, February 21, March 20, April 17, and May 15.
- FARE FOR ALL: Discounted groceries, Fare For All happens oneTuesday of every month at Central Square from 4:00-6:00 pm: December 19, January 23, February 20, March 19, April 23, and May 21.
- EVERY MEAL: Free meals placed discretely in student's backpacks on Friday to help cover the weekend food gap. Both Lincoln and Kaposia are sponsored by local organizations. Families at either school can apply through their school's secretary.


