HAMELINCK JOINS MIDLAKES

The Phelps-Clifton Springs Central School District welcomed Jeff Hamelinck as Director of Curriculum and Instruction in June.

Hamelinck, known as a strong, student-first leader, earned a Bachelor's in Elementary Education from SUNY Fredonia and a Master's in Computer Education from Nazareth College in addition to a Certificate of Advance Study in Education Administration from SUNY Oswego.

Prior to Midlakes, he was principal of two different schools in the Newark Central School District and has worked as a kindergarten teacher, and a teacher on special assignment with assistant principal duties.

YEAR IS OFF TO AN EXCITING START

While students returned to campus several days ago, and our entire staff before then, I wanted to welcome everyone back to Midlakes for the start of another school year.

We have high hopes for the year and our teachers and staff have worked throughout the summer to prepare for students.

We are ready to embrace our shared values of respect, responsibility, independence, and kindness with all of our families and provide students with the tools they need to be highly successful and work with families

This year brings a few highlights:

PLANS FOR EXCELLENCE

Over the summer, teams of teachers and administrators from each school building met to review data, identify key focus areas, and set schoolwide goals and action plans for the 2023-2024 school year.

We call these our "Plans for Excellence," which will help us remain focused on the areas that will have the greatest impact on our students. These areas include:

- Reducing chronic absenteeism.
- Supporting social-emotional needs.
- Increasing accountability of all.

• Committing to the delivery of meaningful and consistent building-wide curriculum.

• Increasing student engagement and school participation through additional activities offered by our schools.

Our teams will share further details of these plans in October during an upcoming Board of Education meeting.

PARENTSQUARE

You may have already noticed a few more messages from staff through ParentSquare. We rolled out this new communication tool for districtwide communications last spring, expanded it to our Athletics Department over the summer, and provided training to teachers and staff on how to communicate with families at the start of the school year.

This important tool allows all of our families to receive digital messages in one consistent way, while providing the ability to set language preferences and schedule to receive messages at a time that works best for them.

Families and teachers can also use the app to communicate one-on-one. All of this

should make our communications with families more effective.

FACILITY IMPROVEMENTS

There have also been several upgrades made to our campus facilities. We were able to secure federal funds for a new age-appropriate playset for the universal pre-kindergarten program, the old Teft Avenue school bell has been refurbished and moved to the Midlakes One-Room Schoolhouse, parking lots have been resealed and

striped, and the Midlakes High School Auditorium reopened in time to host graduation.

Also, significant progress has been made on our capital construction project at the secondary school with a completely re-imagined music wing and cafeteria area taking shape.

A new middle school cafeteria opened on the former site of the high school band room in September.

New practice rooms and a chorus room are opening with a new straight corridor ready to take students to these

areas. The stadium field has also opened. (See more on the project on Page 11.)

We remain optimistic that our capital construction will be completed by the end of the school year with demolition work on a new high school band room having already begun in the old middle school cafeteria and final touches in other areas taking place.

As we begin a new year, our talented staff is ready to make the new school year meaningful for our students, but everyone can have a positive impact on students.

We encourage our families to join us by:

- Establishing consistent routines for your child.
- Encouraging daily attendance.
- Engaging in conversations about their day.
- Providing a quiet place to study.
- Staying in contact with their teachers.

SCHOOL DISTRICT SECURES FREE MEALS IN 2023-2024

The Phelps-Clifton Springs Central School District is pleased to announce a meal certification option available to schools participating in the National School Lunch Program and School Breakfast Program called the Community Eligibility Provision.

This certification allows Midlakes to offer both breakfast and lunch at no cost to all students during the entire 2023-2024 academic year, and subsequent three academic years.

Each student will be allowed one full breakfast and one full lunch per day, under the certification. Students will be charged for individual items and double meals, which can be purchased using personal checks, cash, or cashless payments through MySchoolBucks. Meal options will be consistent with previous years.

No further action is required on your behalf to participate in the free program. However the district encourages families to complete the Community Eligibility Provision (CEP)/Household Income Eligibility Form to help secure future grants and funds for the school meal program.

Midlakes Middle/High School is excited to announce the adoption of a modern electronic hall pass.

The digital system, which has been implemented by other schools in our region, allows teachers and staff to keep focused on what's going on in their classrooms to deliver instruction instead of worrying about students wandering the halls.

The hall pass also enhances school security by allowing staff to quickly locate students in the halls during an emergency and provides increased parent/guardian engagement by allowing them to access their child's hall pass history.

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ast year, students made cheese from scratch, charted the incubation of chickens and ducklings, learned about grafting grape vines, raised large-mouth bass, and grew disease-resistant chestnut trees.

This year is shaping up to offer even more with expanded opportunities for students to immerse themselves in the local agricultural industry as the curriculum increases opportunities matching the interests of students, current trends, and the passion of teachers.

"Our goal is to connect kids to something they are interested in and give them some non-traditional options — something they will get excited about," said Ethan Sleeman, a teacher at Midlakes Middle/High School. "It may not be their major in college, but when they have a home or apartment someday, they can take advantage of what they learned to grow a garden and appreciate what they learned at Midlakes."

Six different courses at the school now focus on everything from agricultural innovation, entrepreneurship, and sustainability, along with plant and food sciences for students in grades 8-12.

Also, a new Agriculture Club advisors Marina Bartolotta-O'Brien and Jessica Spence brought students to several area farms to learn about daily business operations and how innovation drives one of the biggest industries in today's economy.

"We all have the need to eat, put clothes on our backs, and a roof over our heads," said Mrs. Bartolotta-O'Brien. "None of that would happen without agriculture."

These new opportunities are on top of the traditional lessons teachers of all grades regularly bring into the classroom, such as an elementary school field trip to a local farm, work on community careers, a science class trying to grow disease resistant trees or speakers and farmers bringing their experiences and farm animals to campus to share with students.

The plan is to grow the program with





Through Midlakes agriculture program, students visited several local farms in 2022-2023 including Embers Rising Farm, Fa-Ba Farm, Stoney Ridge Farms, Bonna Terra Farm, Padelford Brook Soap Co., and Hemdale Farms & Greenhouses. Also, students learned about the incubation process of ducklings and chicks, helped expose elementary school students to farm animals and life, planted seeds with first graders, and much more.

additional courses like Introduction to Agriculture – 8, Agricultural Exploration, Small Animal Science, and Floral Design, and join the FFA, an extracurricular organization for students interested in agriculture and leadership.

All of it is on top of what was already occurring in grades K-12 with projects on careers — including farming — work planting, growing and harvesting goods, producing maple syrup, visits by 4-H, local farmers, and much more.

"The reality is that a quarter of all working Americans are immersed in agriculture in some way," said Mrs. Spence, hired last year with Mrs. Bartolotta-O'Brien to join Mr. Sleeman and expand agriculture offerings. "There have been a lot of light bulb moments because our students have had limited exposure to agriculture, food systems, and animal science. They didn't know they had these opportunities."

The expanded focus on agriculture at Midlakes was allowed to happen after the state brought agriculture into the classroom under the Career & Technical Education umbrella to better reflect current trends.

Midlakes teachers said their coursework appeals to all types of learners while providing an additional pathway to earn credits, graduate, and prepare students for various careers and post-secondary education in the agricultural industry.

It also builds connections to the approximately 50 agricultural-related businesses and nearly 20 local farms located within the borders of the school district.

"I think part of it is that the community has asked for it on top of the fact that it's a required class for students to get a credit in Ag. Tech.," said Mr. Sleeman. "The hope is we build it into a big following because of where we live and what's around us."




