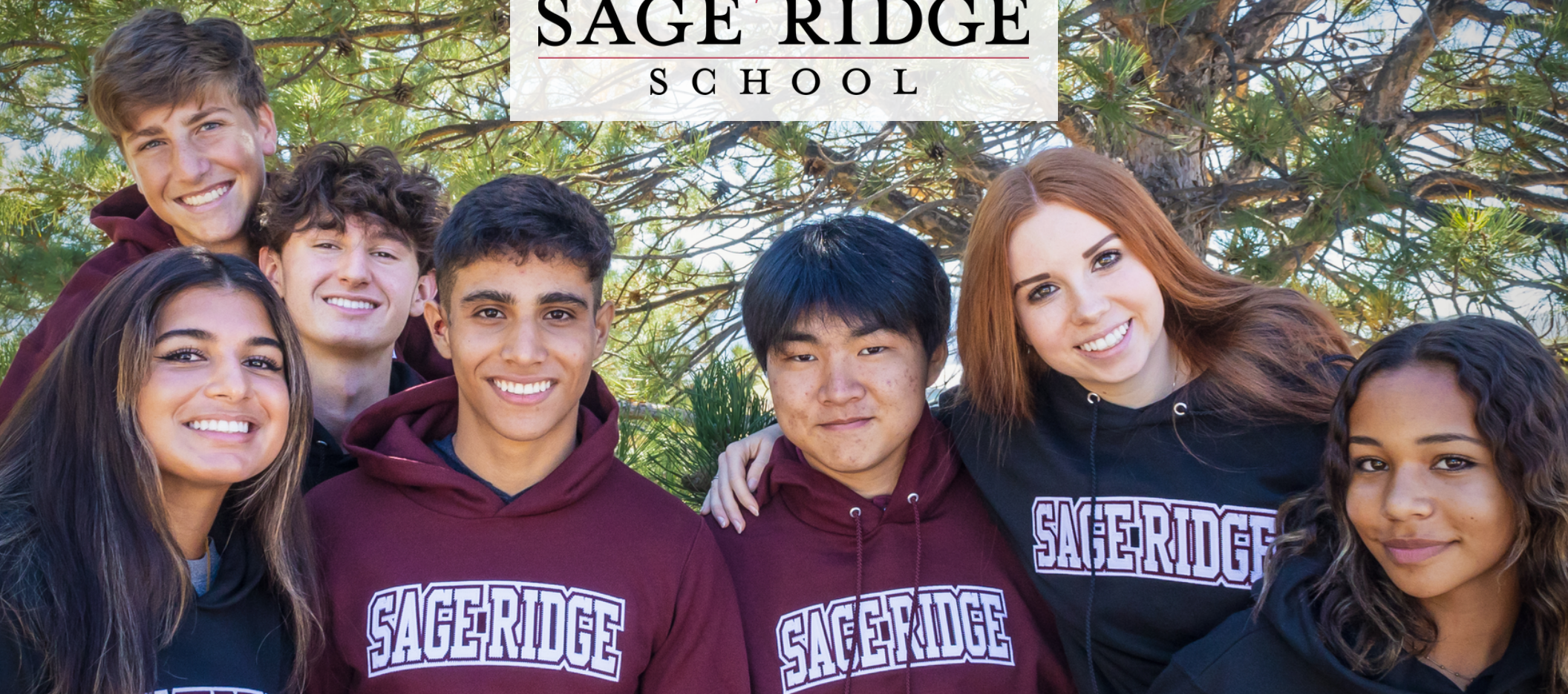
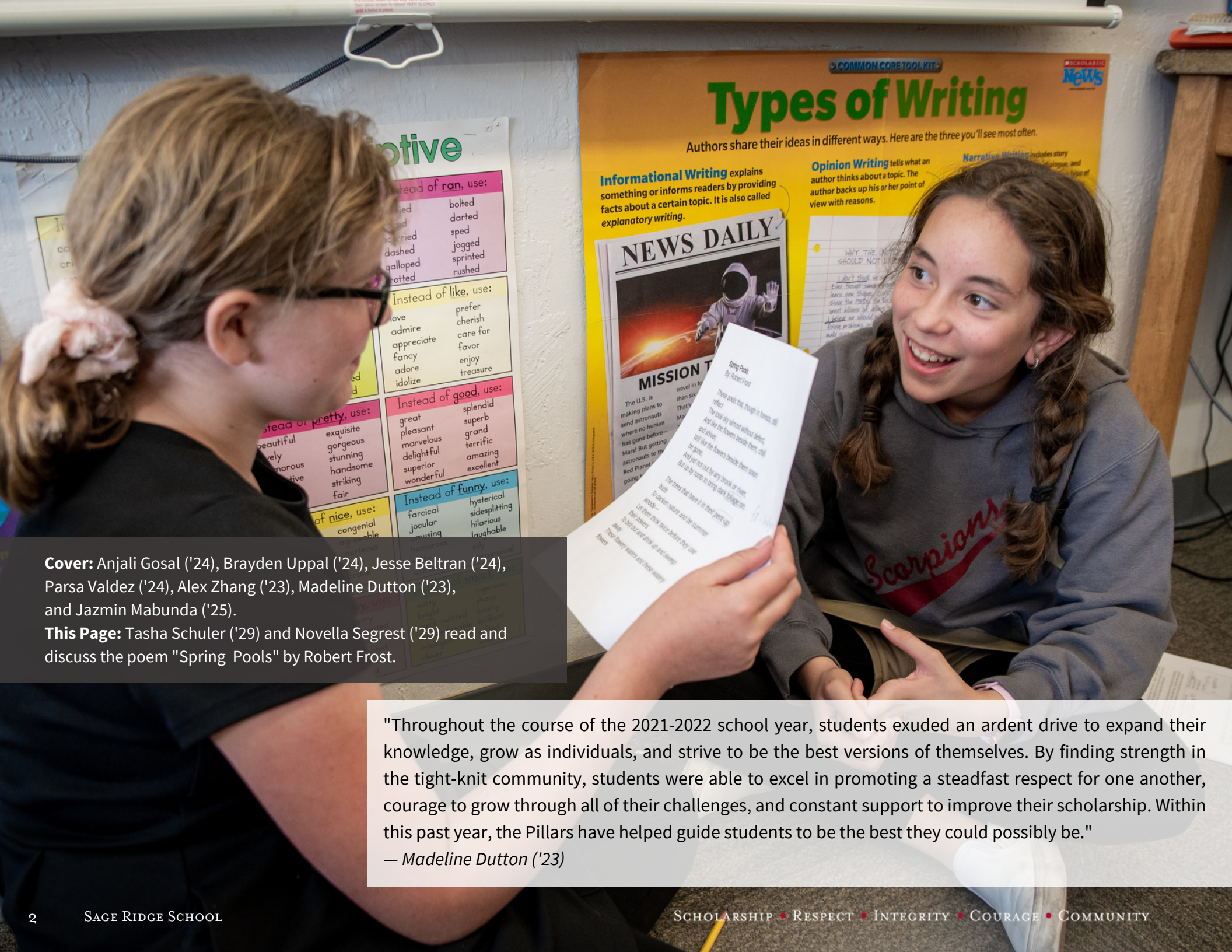

NOTE FROM THE HEAD

Greeting to our Sage Ridge Community of Families and Friends:

As the new Head of School, I am excited to share with you the impact of your generosity during the 2021-22 school year. Our Sage Ridge community experiences the results of your giving every day.

We were able to celebrate the groundbreaking of our new Student Activity Center because our donors found inspiration in the vision of the future heart and home of our campus. The project would not have been possible without the generosity and energetic support of the extended Clemetson and Primm families and a local foundation which, in March 2021, provided us a \$2,000,000 grant conditioned upon matching funds being raised by December 31, 2021. It is an honor to be able to share with you in this Impact Report that Sage Ridge's matching grant was provided by the treasured Reno foundation, the E. L. Wiegand Foundation.

The E. L. Wiegand Foundation was established in 1982 and has been a longtime supporter of Sage Ridge School, helping Sage Ridge to expand its technology and to develop and strengthen its innovative programming and infrastructure. Kristen Avansino, the President and Executive Director of the Foundation, and her husband, Skip Avansino, the Chairman and Chief Executive Officer of the Foundation, were advocates for education and respected Sage Ridge's vision to offer an Independent School education to Northern Nevada families. Much to everyone's amazement and joy, Sage Ridge received the first installment of the grant in the amount of \$1,300,000 in October 2021. By midnight on December 31, 2021, the funds raised exceeded \$2,000,000 thereby securing the full match amount.

Our future has never been brighter, thanks in large part to the enduring commitment of the Sage Ridge Board of Trustees who spent the holiday season meeting with donors to ensure that the school met the match. Our current and alumni parents, grandparents, and friends of school devoted their precious time, energy, and effort to the success of our capital project. We look forward to celebrating the grand opening in the spring of 2023 with all those who made this dream a reality. We offer our heartfelt thanks to everyone who played such an instrumental part in cementing the future of Sage Ridge. Anne Frank reminds us, "No one has ever become poor by giving."

Our Pillar of scholarship was upheld in 2021-2022 by maintaining a top-notch college preparatory experience through on-campus and distance learning options.

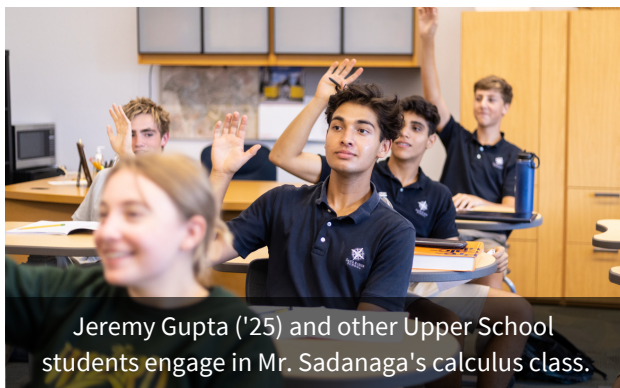
ERUDITO

Ask a Sage Ridge Latin teacher what makes teaching Latin rewarding at the only school in Northern Nevada to offer it, and you will learn that “It’s the students who make the program. Excellent students every year. Fun, engaging, creative,” according to Dr. Robert Simms. Latin scholars at Sage Ridge enjoy the opportunity to study Latin literature after taking the AP exam. One student translated parts of Harry Potter into Latin.

Very few students in Nevada even have the opportunity to study Latin. Sage Ridge students are active as officers at the state Junior Classical League and the National Junior Classical League. According to Latin teacher Ms. Darcie Hutchison, Latin provides “access to a culture that has a lot to teach us, a way of discovering a passion for language that is about how languages work and opens up a world that goes beyond their everyday experience.” At Sage Ridge, Latin is engaging and interdisciplinary; students study the art, the architecture, and the people.

SCHOLARSHIP STRONG AS EVER

Many of our Upper School students achieved notable success on their Advanced Placement (AP) exams during the 2021-22 testing cycle. Reaching our highest pass rate since 2015, ninety-three percent (42 of 45) of our students have received scores of 3 or higher on the 124 AP exams taken with an average score of 3.89. In addition, 22 of these students have qualified for an AP Scholar Award granted to those who receive scores of 3 or higher on three or more AP Exams.



SAGE SESSION

During the last two weeks of the school year, classes are finished and students move into Sage Session, which provides opportunities to participate in experiential learning outside of the classroom. Last year students went scuba diving, designed their own Disney rides and went to Disneyland, went to Washington D.C. to meet important members of state, built escape rooms, flew drones, built sculptures, and more!

Students who participate in our Arts and Athletics programs courageously express themselves and their talents while balancing academic responsibilities and modeling ethical behavior and teamwork for their peers.

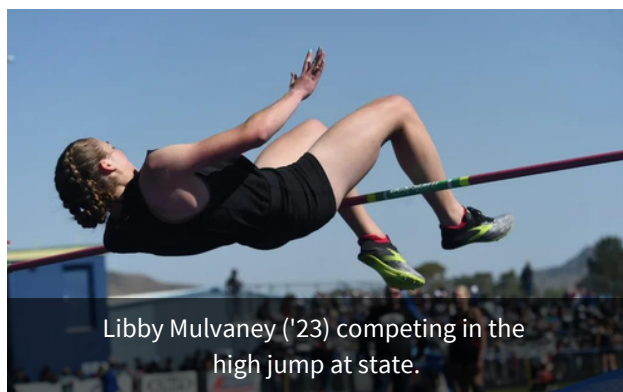
CELEBRATING THE ARTS

COMPETING AT STATE

During the 2021-22 school year, we had the exciting opportunity to send eight varsity sports and 45 players to state championships! Varsity Boys Basketball made their first-ever appearance at state in school history. The Boys Ski Team sent seniors Logan Reeves and Nathan Barth to compete at state where Reeves placed 12th. Boys Golf sent Brayden Uppal to state, placing 11th overall. Track and field sent Carter Burns ('23), Jeremy Gupta ('25), Chloe Huyler ('25), and Libby Mulvaney ('23) to state, where Chloe broke the state record for the 3200 meter. Swim sent Addison Clark ('25), Alex Power ('22), and Zach Power ('25) to compete in state, where Addison placed 6th, Zach placed 1st and 2nd, and Alex placed 1st and 2nd in their respective events. We hope to see more athletes compete at state in the 2022-23 school year!

COMMUNITY

The Sage Ridge community came together to celebrate the school at the annual gala, and students put our curriculum into action to support local and global initiatives.

GALA

On 5 March 2022, members of the Sage Ridge community converged on the Atlantis for *An Evening on Bourbon Street*, renewing both the Gala tradition and our partnership with the resort. Guests included last year's senior class; staff and faculty; past, current, and future parents; members of the Board of Trustees; and friends of the school. The evening's entertainment drew together NOLA and SRS with a dance troop, tarot card reader, live band, an emcee steeped in the Mardi Gras tradition, and tables representing the Krewes of New Orleans. Thanks to the generosity of our families, all of the staff tickets were sponsored and we raised over \$100,000, eclipsing the fundraising goal for the event. Funds raised were earmarked for the theater program, our learning management system, campus enhancements, replacing Spike (the school mascot), and procuring a sound system for the new Student Activity Center.

SENIORS AT URBAN ROOTS

Members of the Class of '22 performed their last community service as a group at Urban Roots right here in Reno. This farm in the middle of the Biggest Little City grows food, among other things, in raised beds and in greenhouses. The students helped transition the beds from the dormant winter season to spring. They mended boundaries, added compost to the soil, and removed unconsolidated plant matter. The staff at Urban Roots shared the why and how behind this community gardening project, which inspired the students to think more expansively about what is possible from a food production perspective here in the high desert.

GIVING TUESDAY

On Tuesday, 30 November 2021, Sage Ridge School participated in Giving Tuesday, which is a global philanthropic movement for the power of radical generosity during a day that encourages people to do good. We asked our students why they were grateful for Sage Ridge, what they were excited about at Sage Ridge, and why they love Sage Ridge. Overwhelmingly the answers were friends, their education, in-person learning, and their teachers.

WITH GRATITUDE TO A SPECIAL FRIEND OF SAGE RIDGE SCHOOL

In May 2022, Sage Ridge School lost a longtime friend and supporter in Kristen Avansino. Kristen was tragically struck by a vehicle while she was walking in a pedestrian crosswalk in San Francisco. Kristen was the President and Executive Director of the E. L. Wiegand Foundation, one of Sage Ridge's partners on the Student Activity Center, and the Executive Director of The Edwin L. Wiegand Trust.

As the President and Executive Director of the Foundation and Executive Director of the Trust, Kristen, together with her husband Skip, worked tirelessly to embody the legacy of Mr. Edwin L. Wiegand, who was an inventor, entrepreneur, and philanthropist. The Foundation and Trust gave generously to many causes, both local and national, but Kristen was particularly interested in education because of the impact education had on her life. Kristen received her Bachelor of Arts degree and Master of Arts degree in Dance from Mills College in Oakland; she also earned a California Lifetime Teaching Credential through the Graduate Internship Program at the University of California, Berkeley.

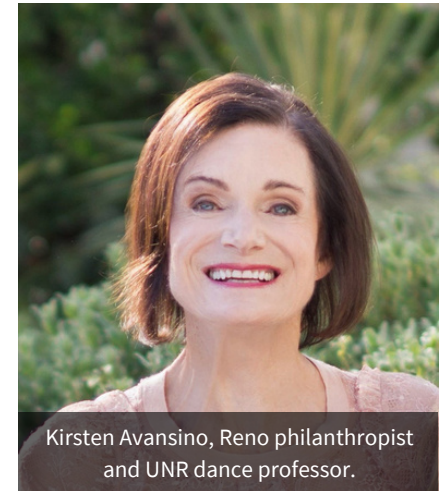
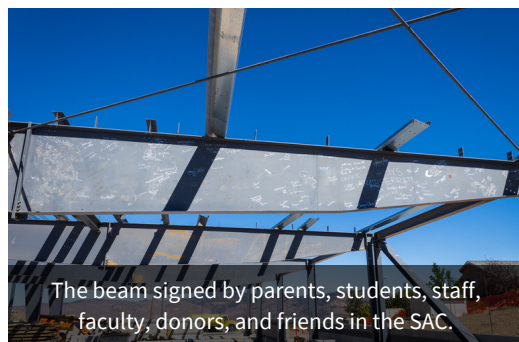

Kristen understood philanthropy and had a true commitment to making the world a better place. She also was always ahead of her time in recognizing needs and advances in education. The Trust's support of Sage Ridge began many years ago at a time when STEM studies were just becoming a priority for educational institutions. In 2018, the Foundation provided a generous grant for Sage Ridge's Innovation Lab; that grant was followed several years later by one from the Trust for advanced equipment for the Innovation Lab.

Kristen was a Professor of Dance at the University of Nevada from 1971 to 1980, where she formulated and implemented the dance curriculum, and she was an Adjunct Professor of Dance from 1989 until her death, serving as a lecturer and guest choreographer for dance performances at UNR. Kristen's background made her a natural champion for the visual and performing arts; yet, she recognized that the Student Activity Center was a critical next step for Sage Ridge. Kristen was a remarkably insightful person, and the legacy she left Sage Ridge through the Foundation will live forever in the E. L. Wiegand Student Activity Center.



GROUNDBREAKING

Over 100 AIM donors and special guests gathered Tuesday, 28 September 2021 to celebrate Sage Ridge's historic groundbreaking. In attendance was a community of lead donors, current and alumni parents, faculty and staff, members of the Board of Trustees, the AIM Steering Committee and our partners, Montane Building Group and OneStudio D+A, all of whom have joined with us in this exciting project. At sunset, the AIM Steering Committee shared powerful and emotional remarks of gratitude, celebration, courage, and respect, with a sweeping view of the expansive graded site — the future home of the Student Activity Center, Knowledge Lab, and Performing Arts Center — in the backdrop and the sparkling downtown lights in the distance. There was palpable excitement and energy, and a collective feeling of anticipation as we celebrated this momentous occasion for the school. It has been said, "A day never ends if it makes a memory." It was certainly a day in Sage Ridge's school history that we will never forget.

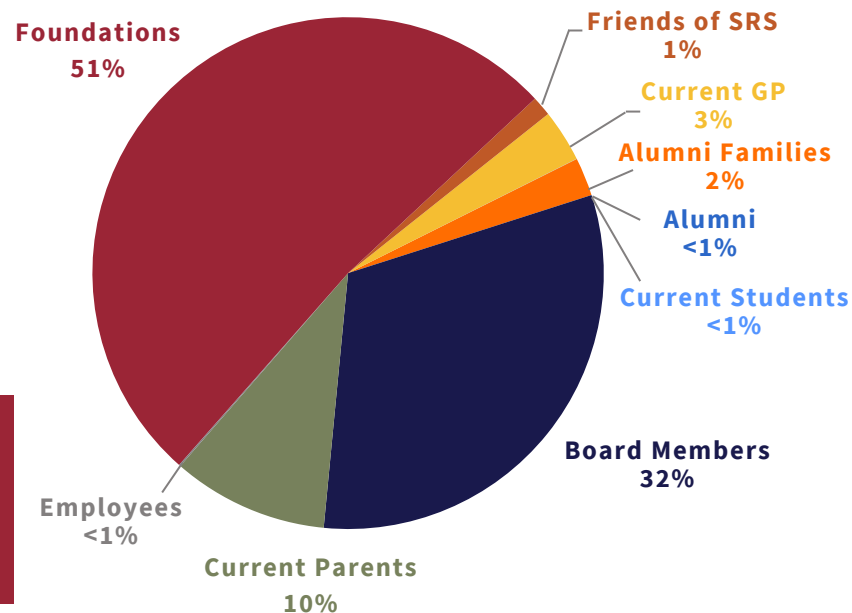

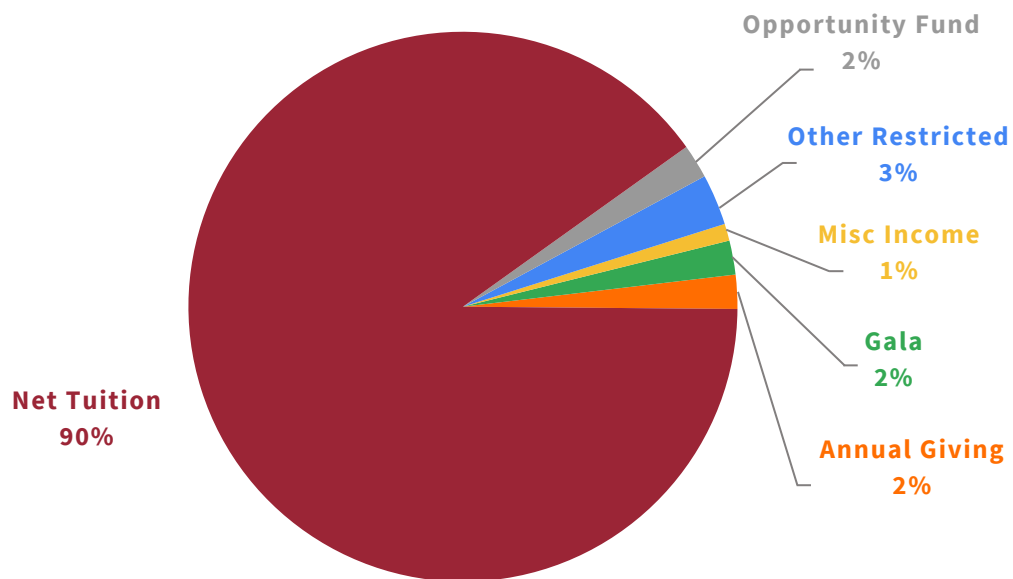

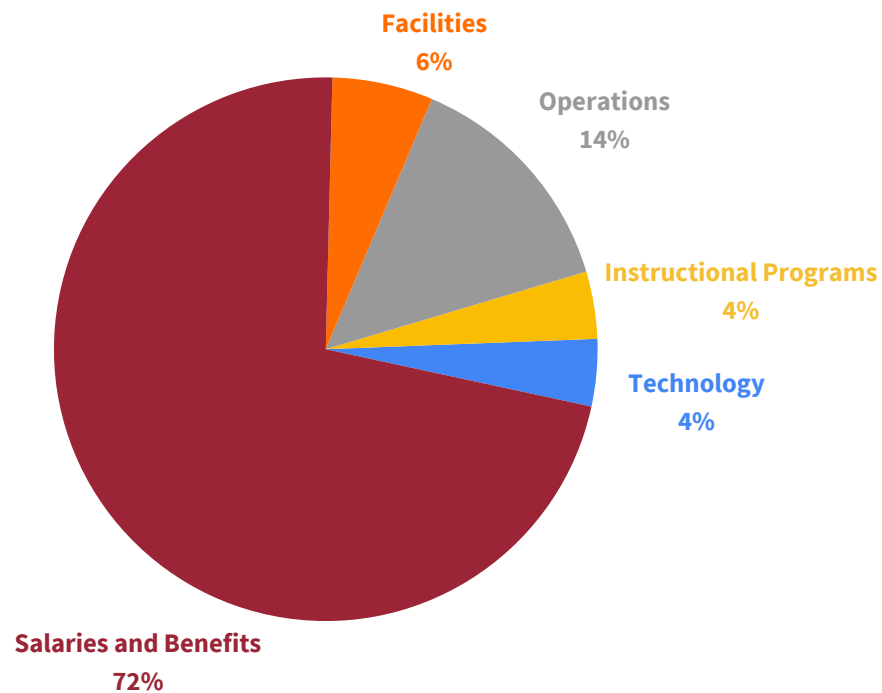

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GIVING OPPORTUNITIES

ANNUAL FUND

The Sage Ridge Annual Fund Campaign is the school's primary philanthropic appeal and our foundation for philanthropy. The Annual Fund supports the people and programs that make the school experience so special. Unrestricted gifts help Sage Ridge School because they give school leadership the flexibility to allocate money where it will serve the best purpose. Such gifts provide myriad opportunities for students.

THE OPPORTUNITY FUND — SAGE RIDGE SCHOLARS

Sage Ridge Scholars are high-achieving, mission-appropriate students from socioeconomically diverse backgrounds. The Sage Ridge Scholars program was established in 2000 with support from the Redfield Foundation and other generous donors. Awardees receive full tuition and supplies for grades 9-12. Sage Ridge supported four Sage Ridge Scholars in the 2021-22 school year.

GALA

The Gala is our biggest annual fundraiser of the year and a favorite event among our community. These celebratory events provide us with an opportunity to engage with our vibrant community.
