# Outdoor learning areas expanded throughout the district

Even before the COVID-19 pandemic, Columbia Public Schools recognized the many benefits of getting kids out of the classroom and into nature.

Research shows when you get students outside, attention span, behavior and engagement improve. Plus, outdoor learning is not just conducive for science, it can also boost creativity for language arts and other subjects.

Mike Szydlowski, CPS science coordinator, and his team have worked to add outdoor classrooms and learning areas throughout the district for more than a year. In the midst of returning for fall in-person learning during a global pandemic, the push to complete outdoor spaces has been a priority.

"At each school we are trying to identify five to six outdoor classroom spaces as well as build a nature play area and even outdoor eating areas," Szydlowski said.

The process starts by walking the school property to determine areas that are overgrown with brush and can be cleared out and made useful. Seating areas, facilitated by the addition of tables, folding camp chairs and in many cases, seating pads constructed from yoga mats, are added to areas that provide shade and inspiration in a semi-private learning space.

Fairview Elementary School recently celebrated its one-year anniversary of its outdoor space. Other schools where nature areas are complete or close to completion include West Boulevard, Paxton Keeley and Derby Ridge elementary schools. Russell Boulevard and Two Mile Prairie elementary schools are also in the works, to be followed by efforts at the middle school level, with Jefferson Middle School being one of the first.

"Working through the summer has meant some hot days, but the goal to have the spaces ready for fall made it worth it," Szydlowski said.

Szydlowski said he is pleased that students and their families have also been willing volunteers and adds the kids are really enjoying being a part of the process.

"Everything we are doing will be here long after the pandemic," Szydlowski said.

# Learning this fall



The District has developed a COVID-19 tracker to monitor transmission within the school district boundaries. The tracker also includes numbers of employees and students who have been affected by COVID-19. Additionally, families can follow the daily mode indicator for any changes in learning modes at the school and district levels.



As outlined in the district's re-entry plan, families were provided a choice between in-person and online learning enrollment options, understanding that in-person learning could be five days a week in-person, in-person hybrid (various options) or fully online depending on COVID-19 community transmission, guidance from health experts and local leaders, average daily attendance for students and staff, substitute availability and extreme swings in new cases. Any long-term changes in learning modes require approval by the Board of Education.



### Jimmy Hale - John Warner Middle School

Hale has spent 24 years in education, including 14 years in administration. He has served as an educator and coach and is approaching his eighth year with Columbia Public Schools. Named the principal of John Warner Middle School in the spring of 2019, Hale has been

## Kristen Palmer – Center for Gifted Education (EEE)

Palmer has 16 years instruction experience, including gifted education. She has served as both an assistant principal and principal for Columbia Public Schools. Prior to moving to Columbia, she was a science

instructor with NASA/Bernard Harris science enrichment camps at the University of Oklahoma and taught in the University of Oklahoma

Mini-College gifted program. She earned a degree in elementary education from the University of Oklahoma, a master's degree in elementary administration from the University of Missouri and an education specialist degree in administration from William Woods University.



### Amanda Ruyle – Two Mile Prairie Elementary School

Ruyle was born and raised in Columbia. She taught kindergarten and third grade in Columbia Public Schools and was most recently the assistant principal at Russell Boulevard Elementary School. A graduate of Rock Bridge

High School, she earned her undergraduate degree in early childhood and elementary education, master's degree in curriculum and instruction and a specialist degree in educational leadership and policy analysis from the University of Missouri.



### Tyler Simmons – West Boulevard Elementary School

Simmons has been with Columbia Public Schools for the majority of his educational career and has served as both an elementary teacher and assistant principal. Prior to becoming the principal at West Boulevard Elementary

School, he served as the assistant principal at Fairview Elementary School. He earned his undergraduate degree in elementary education from Northwest Missouri State University and a master's degree in curriculum and instruction from the University of Missouri. He also holds a specialist degree in educational leadership and policy analysis from the University of Missouri and obtained his doctoral degree in educational leadership from William Woods University.



### Adam Taylor – Battle High School

Taylor is a third-generation graduate of Hickman High School with deep community roots. He earned a degree in Business Marketing from the University of Missouri and began his educational career as a coach at Hickman High. While there, he pursued a career in education and,

after seven years of teaching, became the assistant principal at Battle High School. He served as the associate head principal at Battle High School last year in preparation for becoming this year's principal.



### **Kyra Yung – Battle Elementary School**

Yung served as a K-12 principal at another district before being hired by Columbia Public Schools as the assistant principal for Alpha Hart Lewis Elementary School. Last year she transitioned to Battle Elementary School as the assistant principal. Due to COVID-19, Yung took the role

of principal sooner than expected when Jeri Petre moved to the CPSElementary@Mizzou virtual learning program. Yung earned her early childhood degree at Central Methodist University and has both a masters and a specialist degree in educational leadership from the University of Missouri. She is currently working on her doctorate.

### **Update: Bond Progress**

### **Locust Street Expressive Arts Elementary School**

Progress continues with all work scheduled to be completed by the start of second semester. Remodeling of the existing building included the reallocation and reorganization of some office spaces, as well as the installation of new flooring and ceiling tiles. The largest portion of the project was the new addition. Crews are finishing details within the building, such as construction of a new black box theater, as well as outdoor work on playground spaces.

### **Rock Bridge Elementary School**

The addition to Rock Bridge Elementary School, originally scheduled for completion in the fall of 2021, is now planned for fall of 2022. The completed expansion will provide additional classroom capacity for approximately 100-150 students, eliminating the three remaining trailers. Improvements to the existing space also include ADA enhancements such as a new lift on the gymnasium stage.

### **Oakland Middle School**

This summer marked the completion of a two-year remodeling project at Oakland Middle School. Work at the school included an update to the HVAC system, new flooring and ceiling tiles as well as various classroom remodels. Mechanical and structural work was also performed to maintain building sustainability and a new athletic field with a track has been added.

### Free Bus Transportation

Free bus transportation is provided to all students in kindergarten through grade 8 residing one mile or more from their attendance area school. Students in grades 9-12 residing two miles or more from their attendance area school are eligible for free transportation.

Free/Reduced-price Lunches and Breakfasts Free and reduced-price lunch applications are accepted all year and are available at www.cpsk12.org/nutrition or at your child's school. A new application must be filled out every year to qualify. Students from families properly approved to receive SNAP, TANF, or are of foster status are eligible for free benefits. Application may still be required. Students from families properly approved to receive food stamps or Aid to Families with Dependent Children (AFDC) benefits may be automatically approved to receive free or reduced-price meals.

Reduced-price breakfast: \$0.30 Reduced-price lunch: \$0.40

Since summer 2020, we have offered free meals for students via Grab-and-Go.

Families can find their closest stop using the interactive map on the CPS website (www.cpsk12.org/grabandgo). Buses run multiple-stop routes (Monday-Friday) on all days that are listed as in session on the school district calendar.

Stops last a maximum of 15 minutes. Stops are not school-specific but rather designed regionally to include as many high-need areas as possible. Please find the stop closest to you using the map provided online

(www.cpsk12.org/grabandgo) and go there at the designated time.

Grab-and-Go pick-up locations are also available to families who can't access one of the stops.

Students ages 2-18 can obtain a meal. Adults **may** pick up meals for students who are unable to do so. A student number is not required for each student meal set that is obtained. If a child is not enrolled at CPS, we will need to know the child's name, parent/guardian name and contact information.

We ask that you practice social distancing while at the stop. Both breakfast and lunch will be packed into each Grab-and-Go bag. Students may select a sack meal that includes breakfast and lunch, one milk and a fruit and/or vegetable. Meals contain some perishable and some non-perishable items. Please adhere to disposal and refrigeration instructions for perishable items.
