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What Is An SIC?

- Broad-based community advisory body
- Focused on goals to improve the school
- Required in each K-12 public school by law

Parents • Teachers • Community Members
Students • Administrators • School Leaders



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SICs in South Carolina


Established in state law over 45 years ago

- 1977 (Education Finance Act)
- 1984 (Education Improvement Act)
- 1993 (Early Childhood Act)
- 1998 (Education Accountability Act)
- 2014 (Read to Succeed Act)

Over 1,100 SICs with nearly 12,000 members




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What Are SICs Intended To Do?

- 1** Provide input and feedback on school strategic improvement plans and updates
- 2** Assist the school in implementing various improvement activities
- 3** Monitor and report on school progress toward improvement goals

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Why SICs?


Research shows family/community engagement in schools lays the groundwork for:

- ✓ Student achievement
- ✓ Post-secondary school success
- ✓ Improved student behavior
- ✓ Stronger school-home relations
- ✓ Increased support of educators

SICs provide additional insight, unique perspective, and vital assistance



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Types of SIC Members

Elected → *(staggered two-year terms)*

- Parents
- Teachers
- Students (Grades 9-12)

Appointed → *(terms set in local bylaws)*

- Community Members

Ex-Officio → *(by virtue of position)*

- Principal
- Others (AP, PTA/PTO Member, Parent Liaison)

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Holding SIC Elections

Parents Elect Parents

Teacher Elect Teachers


Students Elect Students

Use methods that are fair and have high levels of participation – piggyback on other school events (Open House, etc.)

Nominations and elections are typically held during faculty meetings

Hold as part of student government elections with a line item on the ballot

REMEMBER: Elections must be held annually by **October 15**

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SIC Appointments






Community Members are appointed by the Principal
Intended to be individuals who cannot serve on an SIC in any other way






- ✓ Bring resources and ideas
- ✓ Lend expertise and perspective
- ✓ Help build broader community support
- ✓ Come from a variety of backgrounds

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Maximum SIC Size?


Statute does not limit SIC size

SICs should reflect the size and diversity of their schools, but not be so large to become unwieldy


Not everyone helping the SIC needs to be a member

Anyone interested can attend SIC meetings, serve on SIC committees, or help with SIC initiatives

Elect SIC Officers


Chair • Vice Chair • Secretary
Note: No Treasurer

Set Meeting Schedule


At least eight (8) meetings per year
 Consider needs of all members when selecting days and times

 School Improvement Plan




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So What Does An Effective SIC Meeting Look Like?

- ✓ **The SIC Chair runs the meeting**
- ✓ **Approval of prior meeting's minutes**
- ✓ **Update from the Principal**
- ✓ **Committee reports**
- ✓ **Work session and/or guest speakers**
- ✓ **Look toward "next steps"**
- ✓ **All SIC members are actively engaged**

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SIC Leader Roles for Meetings


Chair Develops agenda with the Principal
 Ensures meeting notices and materials are circulated in advance of the meeting
 Runs meeting and coordinates discussion

Vice Chair Assists and acts in absence of the Chair


Secretary Takes notes, distributes minutes, and maintains SIC records

Principal Provides reports and other information

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SICs and the FOIA

SICs are considered “public bodies” as defined by the SC Freedom of Information Act (FOIA)

All SIC meetings are open to the public


Meeting Schedules and Agendas are publicly posted

SIC records are open – Agendas, Minutes, Bylaws, Reports, Election Results, Membership

SIC records are kept on file

SC Code of Laws, 1976 (as revised), Title 30, Chapter 4

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Developing SIC Bylaws

Bylaws are an SIC’s agreed upon policies and procedures

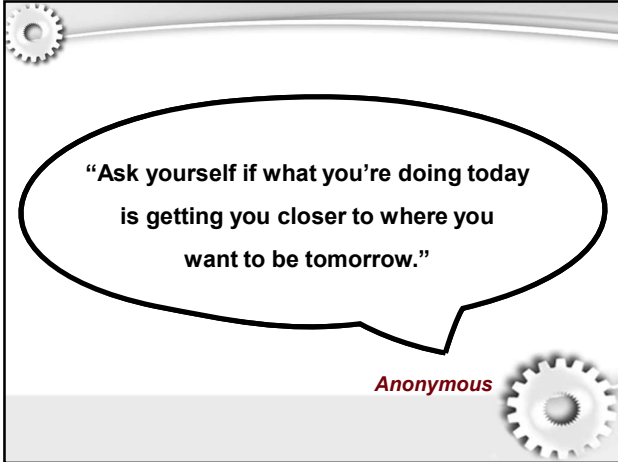
Keep Bylaws handy and updated

Review them every few years – over time, practice can stray from policy

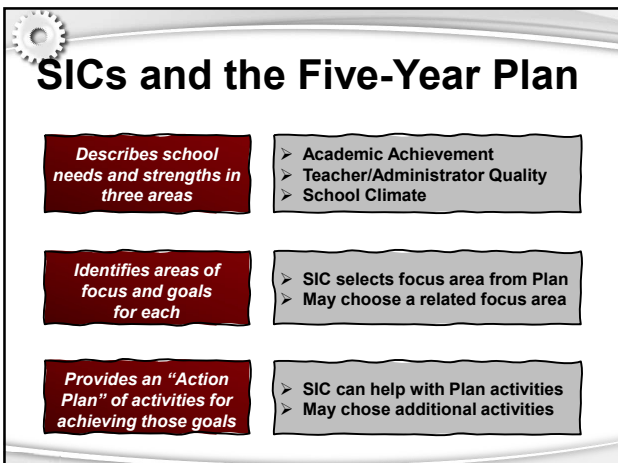
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SICs Use Committees for Work


Formed around areas of focus and goals

Do research, tend to details and logistics, and prepare recommendations for the full SIC


Report on work regularly to the full SIC

Committee members do not have to be SIC members

Recommended standing committees for ongoing work such as Member Recruitment and Publicity/Advocacy



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Reporting on SIC Work

SIC prepares (by April 30) the *SIC Report to the Parents* outlining progress for the current year


Needs • Goals • Actions • Results

With the Principal, SIC helps prepare the annual narrative for the *SC School Report Card*

Describes the school and notes goals, while highlighting challenges and successes for the year


Be sure to tell the story of the school that statistics alone can't tell
