MESSAGE FROM ADMINISTRATION

Wintery weather will be upon us soon enough, and it is time again to prepare for school cancellation and delay decisions. The following update provides an outline of the process we follow for making school cancellation/delay decisions for weather events. All communications regarding closures and delays will be coming through Remind, which is our main school communication tool. These messages will come to you by text, email, or both, depending on which you prefer. Remind messages will reach you instantaneously, which is very important when we are making quick decisions very early in the morning.

If you don't receive the district notification through Remind yet, you will need to opt into Remind to make sure you get our messages. Send a text message to this number "81010". The text message must simply say "ebuusdvt". When you send the text message, you will get a reply asking you to provide your full name to join BUUSD Notifications. Easy!

The school calendar is set up to accommodate snow days, and we encourage all of our students to get out and play in the snow if Mother Nature throws a snowball at us!

We typically start with a plan to delay school two hours to give everyone enough time to safely make it in, but sometimes it is obvious that we will need to close for the full day. In the event of a full snow day, all school activities will be cancelled for the day.

Check out BUUSD's procedures based upon REMIND Messaging dated November 7th. However, if you are not receiving Remind, please reach out to -----, so records can be accurate.

The decision to delay or cancel is extremely important for everyone's safety. We take it very seriously. There is no guarantee that we can make the correct decision every time, but we do our absolute best. Please help us by being patient and understanding, and providing appropriate and constructive feedback.










Mr. Booth stated "... we want more students like Phillip to be a part of our meetings, so their interests and opinions are heard."

Igniting, Inspiring, and Improving are at the forefront of many teachers, especially for those teachers who have passion in science.

For **Mr. Crawford Stempel**, the newly appointed department chair, his department is undergoing significant changes not only in terms of personnel, but also curriculum and space.

Over the past few years, his department began embracing phenomenon based science instruction, which features a storyline method of learning.

He highlights "phenomenon based teaching is where we provide real-world context to learning science. Students are presented with observable, real world events with an inherent problem, issue or mystery that needs to be solved."


He credits the energy of his colleagues and willingness to require students to problem solve with deeper learning and meaning. He hopes students will be engaged in addressing issues, such as the increase of sea levels due to global melting to creating solutions for urban growth while protecting biodiversity with human needs.

For Mr. Reccia and Ms. Risra these issues are at the forefront, but also equipping the students with the skills to collaborate, problem solve, and participate in a sequence of lessons, in which each step is driven by students' questions that arise from their interactions with phenomena. Thus fostering deeper learning and involvement with the content.
