What is Transition Services?

Transition services is a coordination of activities and supports that are developed to ensure a person with disabilities happiness, success, and independence after high school and into continued adult education, employment, and independent living. Planning for transition services includes insuring education and independence in social skills, daily living skills, community access skills, self-determination, career preparation, and recreation and leisure activities. Transition planning is based on an individual's strengths, needs, preferences, and interests to create post-secondary goals for academic and functional achievement.



The Individuals with Disabilities Education Act (IDEA 2004) mandated the transition planning process for all students who have an Individualized Education Plan in K-12 education. According to IDEA, transition planning must begin before a student turns 16 years of age (age 14 in Texas), and developed by a team that should include the student, parents, IEP team, and other individuals that will

support the transition process. Other legislation also supports the transition process through mandating programs and rights for individuals with disabilities that include employment opportunities, community access, and equal education. The Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA) is a civil rights law that provides equal access to jobs, schools, transportation, and all other public/private places in the community. The Workforce Investment Act (WIA) provides workforce development activities to improve employability, retention of employment, and fair wages for all workers. Legislation and appropriate transition planning allows students to truly transition into a successful adult life after high school.



How to plan for the Future?

Transition planning should build on itself, evolve, and change as a child matures, interests vary, and exposure to academics and life options are presented through the years. As a person with disabilities, their families, and other support persons, it is important to know how to prepare for transition planning, how to manage the planning, and how to best implement one's goals as successfully as possible.

Preparation:

- Collect information about your child; strengths, interests, and preferences.
- Discuss goal setting with your child
- Learn about resources and get on waiting lists.
- Provide experiences; chores, community activities, hobbies, etc.

Management:

- Attend all meetings
- Give input and be an active participant
- Help your child set reasonable goals
- Review and monitor your child's transition plan
- Support academics and help your child schedule courses
- Encourage career exploration
- Contact outside agencies and ask questions

Implementation:

- Work with outside agencies
- Know and support post-secondary goals
- Encourage involvement in extra-curricular activities
- Visit higher level educational institutions, trade schools, and other training facilities

Transition Planning Timeline.....

Earliest Ages:

- Research community support agencies
- Place name on all waiver and waiting lists

14 years of age - Middle School:

- List strengths, interests, and preferences
- Discuss graduation options
- Plan academic courses yearly to match goals and interests
- Participate in career exploration education

9th grade - 12th grade:

- Participate in appropriate transition assessments
- Set post-secondary goals for education, employment, and independent living
- Plan academic courses yearly to match goals and interests
- Participate in Career and Technical programs
- Update Transition Plan annually
- Collaborate with community support agencies
- Gain work experiences, paid and un-paid
- Meet with appropriate transition team members, such as; College and Career Counselor, Guidance Counselor, Transition Coordinator, Recruiter, etc.
- Complete a Summary of Performance (SOP) prior to graduation

Financial & Legal Supports and Services



Financial and legal support services provide families and individuals with disabilities federal, state, and local information of their rights and resources available to them throughout their lifetime. Early research and planning is key in this domain due to long waiting lists, required finances, and numerous amounts of applications and documentation.

Individuals with disabilities are eligible for a variety of federal and state services that will provide health care, therapies, in home training, community access training, and supported living options. These services are provided by Medicaid waiver programs that require extensive wait lists that individuals need to be placed on at the earliest of age. Other federal and state services can also support families and individuals with additional income for required medical and living needs, as well as, financial life planning for individuals with disabilities to live long independent lives.

Many local resources also provide families with legal services, inform and defend their rights, and develop future life planning documents that provide peace of mind for individuals and their loved ones. Depending on needs, guardianship and alternatives to guardianship options should be discussed before one's eighteenth birthday with legal services. The same resources can also support the development of wills and trusts that will support an individual their entire life time.

Extensive Supports & Developmental Disabilities

Information and supports for individuals and families with developmental disabilities is a necessity at the earliest signs of needs. Once a person is diagnosed with a developmental disability, resources should be extensive for the person and family in order to support all involved emotionally, physically, and mentally.

A developmental delay is when a child does not reach expected developmental milestones in areas such as; fine or gross motor skills, language acquisition, social skills, cognitive skills, and other areas. These conditions usually begin during the developmental period and impact day to day functioning and usually lasts for a lifetime.

When a child demonstrates signs of developmental delay, it is important to seek help as soon as possible. Early identification and intervention can significantly impact the learning of new skills, as well as, reduce the need for costly intervention for an extended amount of time. Extensive supports that can support individuals with a developmental delay may include; further evaluations, therapies, continued education, behavioral/emotional supports, and developing a sensory diet to support daily functioning.

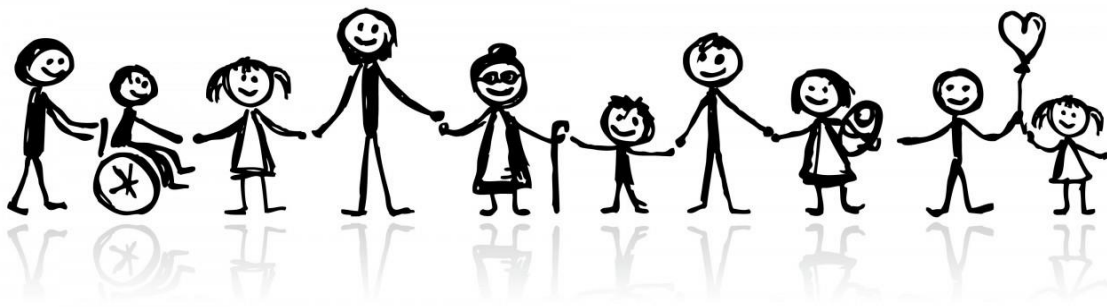

Employment



Employment is the ultimate goal for any person moving into adulthood and self-independence. Numerous resources exist in the community that will provide workforce development services; such as, career counseling, job training, work experiences, job coaching, and supportive/competitive employment. Through the passing of the Workforce Innovation and Opportunity Act (WIOA), expectations have increased and have been funded for services through these work resources to be diligent about including all people in the search for successful employment.

Texas is dedicated to building a workforce that is skilled, motivated, and reliable to maintain a strong economy and community development. A variety of generic resources are available to anyone who needs further training and supports finding the right employment fit. One Stop Career centers, staffing centers, and other state work programs are available to gain skills, information, and employment options for the future.

Individuals with disabilities have access to disability specific employment services that can correlate with other generic supports. Vocational rehabilitation services, Medicaid programs, and other educational programs can provide the same employment training along with specific social skills, self-advocacy skills, transportation options, and other services that will support employment in the community. Disability services may begin working with individuals during the transition years (as early as 15) and follow them into adulthood until successful, sustainable employment is achieved.

Independent Living & Advocacy



Independent Living and Advocacy services continue to grow in numbers as independence and inclusive community living for people with disabilities becomes the norm. It is imperative for youth and their families to set expectations that allow an individual to live their own life and make their own choices. Educating youth on self-advocacy and independent living skills, beginning at the earliest of age, will ensure their opportunity to live and add to their community in the most positive of ways.

In the area of independent living, individuals have many options based on their needs and wants. Complete independence with no supports to different levels of supported living, a person with disabilities can choose what would most support their best life. Support Services through a variety of providers will help with independent living options by offering financial support, in home care options, and group home living alternatives that individuals can experience to find the best fit for them. Many independent living options are supported financially through Medicaid waiver programs or through other planned financial assistance that families and the individual may choose for themselves.

In the area of advocacy, many parent, non-profit, and educational groups are available to support families and individuals with their rights as well as promote and educate individuals in self-advocacy. Becoming comfortable and knowledgeable about how to self-advocate and finding others to support one's advocacy rights is critical from birth through adulthood.

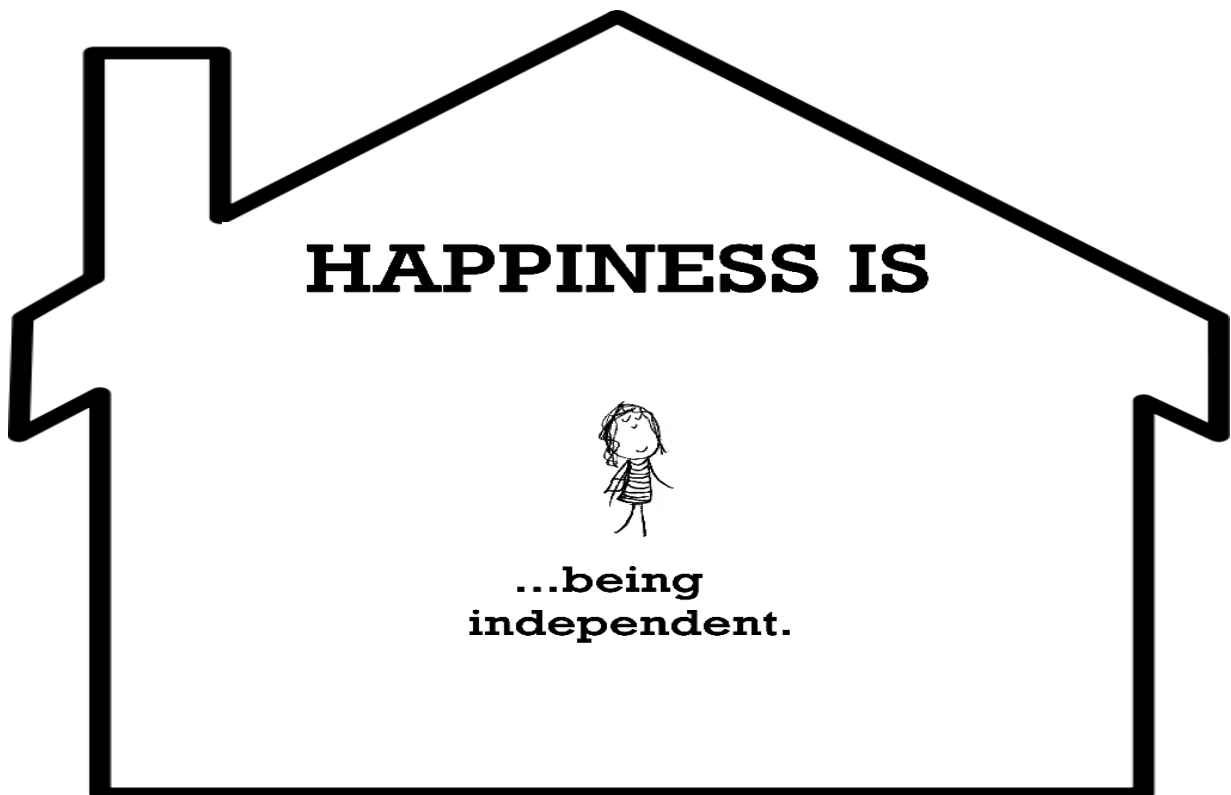

Identifying services available to individuals and families that are accessible and financially reasonable is important throughout a person's life. It is recommended to research your options and be open to a variety of services to find the best supports for a healthy way of living for a lifetime.

Mental Health resources provide supports for one's emotional, psychological, and social well-being. Mental Health affects how a person thinks, feels, and acts; which also determines how one reacts in different situations, relates to others, and the choices one might make in diverse environments. Access to quality resources for mental health issues are all over the community through private, public, and non-profit organizations. It is important to seek services at the first sign of problems with one's mental health and wellness.
