As the Ukulele is easier to grasp for beginners, a broader range of students will be able to achieve success and excellence in music with the Ukulele. This will, in turn, encourage them to continue on with their music studies in subsequent classes/years.

If they have a successful experience learning to play music in the 4th grade (with the Ukulele), they will be better prepared for Choir and Band in 5th and 6th grade.

Moving from Guitars to Ukuleles

Why now?

This is the right time to think about transitioning as the guitars Liberty has been using for 4th graders at the Plato campus are due for repair or replacement within the next few years. Repairing them costs almost as much as replacing them.

Which is better for students? I asked the owner of The Chordhouse, Sarah Adams, a professional teacher of both guitar and ukulele, to explain why the ukulele would be best for our 4th graders:

- 1. The ukulele is a 4 string instrument with strings G C E A. With just one, two, or three fingers students can play many chords and scales with relatively quick success. This gives the students confidence to keep going and the ability to explore the instrument more thoroughly.
- 2. The guitar is a complex 6 string instrument with strings of E A D G B E. When most students are familiar with consecutive notes starting with middle C. Playing a C scale on the guitar is more difficult on the guitar.
- 3. The fret-string grid system of learning to play music is abstract and difficult to translate from standard notation. Starting with a 4 string instrument that is C based like the ukulele is a great way to start with this difficult task.
- 4. Simply The guitar is bigger. That makes it more expensive and more difficult to store. The ukulele is more accessible and is less time consuming to tune 4 strings rather than six.
- 5. Students are less likely to experience severe finger pain while playing the ukulele.
- 6. Using the key of C the key without incidentals is a great intro to teaching music theory. The major scale, scale degrees, intervals, triads, chords, sight singing and voice leading. The ukulele is C based and it makes it easier to scaffold learning.
- 7. The guitar is great too, but with the ukulele you're going to have a better success rate and find more ways to incorporate and scaffold music theory learning with the ukulele. There are so many fun activities with the ukulele and the sound is so pleasing. It's just got a happy sound.
- P.S. If you are concerned about cost, I've already received 13 brand new ukuleles for Plato through the DonorsChoose grant. We just need 17 more and could finance the purchase of those by selling the guitars we currently have. Many families would jump at the opportunity to purchase an inexpensive instrument for their child, especially around the holidays.

2023-2024 American Literature Textbook Change Justification Old Man and the Sea Instead of Red Badge of Courage 2023-2024 Jared Dybzinski

What are the problems concerning the previous textbook?

I have taught Crane's *The Red Badge of Courage* since the beginning of the high school. When I designed the American literature course, I wanted to choose novels representative of different major eras/movements in our literary history. I think this makes sense for a survey course. Red Badge has served my class well, for the most part, but I have always struggled to teach it. For one, Crane's approach is incredibly ironic. Every paragraph is soaked with irony. This can be brilliant in its own way, but it makes it very difficult for a young man or woman to know what Crane is actually saying or claiming or believing or denouncing. By the end of the story, it feels as if Crane is mocking everything, even his own notions of heroism. The effect is to feel like hope itself is something to mock. This would line up with Crane's personal perspective as he himself said hope was the most vacuous emotion in the world (see Chester L. Wolford's article "The Anger of Henry Fleming: The Epic of Consciousness" for a good analysis of this reading of Red Badge).

Now, the text gets across this perspective in an artistically impressive way. It has given me and my students much to discuss through the years, but I just don't think it is the best thing to offer our students' growing literary and metaphysical appetites.

Justify the new textbook selection. What is it about this textbook that sets it apart from its peers? If there was a previous textbook, how is the new one superior? Explain how this textbook adheres to the original philosophy and intentions of the founders.

At first glance, it might seem puzzling to replace a hopeless text with *Old Man and the Sea*. After all, doesn't the typical first reading of this book create outrage? All that fighting and hoping, and the sharks win anyways? Well, the sharks win the meat, but they don't crush the man's heart. The book is dark and gives a similarly tragic view of human effort, but the book preserves a sense of the old man's dignity as well as the redemptive beauty of the old man's relationship with the boy. In this book we have the cruel struggle between man and indifferent nature (like Crane), but man finds a harmony with nature in the midst of the cruelty and indifference. Thus, our students will get some similar dark strains and realism as the Crane text, but they would get some more redemptive seeds. They would also get more Hemingway, and I have always felt guilty that one of the giants of modern American literature only had one short story in my course. Furthermore, the book is short enough for me to do more in-class reading. This will help me model good reading, and it will help make sure we are literally "on the same page" when it comes to our discussions.

AmPhil Campaign Management - summary

- -Brett inquired about quotes regarding options ranging from full management and execution to monthly consulting hours
- All proposals are based on a flat-fee structure (best practice according to AFP)

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AmPhil Campaign Management – three requested options

- AmPhil manage and execute
 - Full Service option (this was the proposal they've already delivered)
 - \$10,675/mo for ~10 months
- LCS and AmPhil manage and execute together
 - Need to dialogue about what components would be done in-house vs. by AmPhil
 - Would require some in-house staffing
- LCS manage and execute, AmPhil available for coaching and guidance
 - AmPhil recommendation: major gift coaching
 - Monthly fee based on hours needed
 - Would require more in-house staffing

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Goal: Raise \$2M for the opening of the Junior High

Next Steps:

- Meet with Sandy Shrader (AmPhil) to discuss management options, price points, etc.
- Build out campaign execution plan
 - Refine case for support
 - Conduct donor meetings
 - Pursue and grow foundation and grant funding
 - Enlist campaign committee
 - And more...

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Campaign & Departmental Budgeting - goals

- Achievable Goals for next 3 years (\$4.505M total)
 - -Foundation and grant funding: \$2.25M
 - -Capital Campaign: \$2M
 - -Annual Fund and Scholarship Funds: \$255K

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Campaign & Departmental Budgeting – general recommendations

- Overhead expenditures: up to 20%
 - Roughly half should be devoted to direct fundraising expenses (donor visits, thank you gifts, travel, printing, etc)
- Program expenditures: 80% or more
 - Usually involves some shared expenses where a portion of staff time, marketing expense, facilities expense, food services, etc. are considered program expenses as they overlap with other functions of the organization

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Departmental Staffing

In-house staffing options – a potential strategy*

- Grants Specialist
 - Grant writing (applications AND new foundation proposals)
 - Grant reporting and management
- Advancement Services Specialist
 - Database management
 - Reporting, data analysis
 - Acknowledgements
 - Mailings (appeals, pledge follow-ups, etc)
 - Wealth research & donor portfolio upkeep

*dependent on campaign management plan



Year-End Appeal

- Designation: Annual Fund
- New mechanism: Giving Society/Donor Clubs
- Collateral:
 - 2 letters, 2 emails, social media, online giving page
- Timeline:
 - Letter 1 to mail house week of Nov 13 (hits mailboxes near end of November)
 - Email delivery coordinated with letter arrival
 - Letter 2 to mail house week of Dec 4 (hits mailboxes mid-December)
 - Email delivery coordinated with letter arrival
- Of Interest: The year-end appeal is the single most effective fundraising activity at Liberty (and across the nonprofit world).

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Annual Fund – defined

- Catch-all term for general nonprofit fundraising (does not include money raised during capital campaigns or for endowment fund)
- The most common form of fundraising designation across the nonprofit world



Annual Fund - benefits

Provides Unrestricted Funds

 Allows FAC, BOD, and Director of Finance to direct annual fund giving towards the most wise and prudent expenses, regardless of their community appeal

Increases donor participation

Asking everyone to give grows the donor base

Reinforces the Mission

- Gives regular opportunities to communicate about what Liberty Common School does best mission is front and center
- Ask people to give towards the mission (rather than towards a niche project)

Establishes Giving Patterns

- Campaigns occur at regular intervals, which helps donors plan and sets expectations properly
- Allows us to move away from creating a new "sales pitch" for a new need each year
- Frees FAC and BOD to direct annual fund \$\$ at normal fiscal rhythms (rather than requiring a special BOD decision each fall)

Identify Upgradeable Donors

Annual fund giving reveals consistent givers and gives the opportunity to ask them to upgrade their gift year-over-year

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Annual Fund - goals

- Grow our donor base (fundraising as a team sport)
- Build awareness of LCS mission and the importance of broad consistent support
- Educate donors about how LCS is funded
- Grow trust in existing fiscal managers and BOD to make wise and necessary financial decisions for the school
- Move away from asking for donations for fund crises or wish list items

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Giving Societies (aka donor clubs)

2 main purposes:

- 1. Recognize donors and express appreciation in a public way
 - This is in addition to standard letters and thank you cards
- 2. Provide an incentive to donors to increase their giving, threshold by threshold, each year
 - Creates a soft mechanism to upgrade donors
 - Creates opportunities for "aspirational giving"



Giving Societies (aka donor clubs)

Traits of good donor clubs:

- They convey prestige and an aura of exclusivity
- They have a mission-specific name and benefits
- There is 1 club, but with multiple levels
- Benefits are few and easy to fulfill
 - Primary benefit: access (creates a sense of belonging, teamsmanship, fellowship)






Total Funds Received (through 10/31/23)


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


Total Funds Received (through 10/31/23)

Program Guiding Philosophy

Mathematics is an essential element of a person's education, responsible for transforming young people into rational-thinking human beings while developing a powerful foundation for further courses of study in related fields.

The purpose of mathematics is to inculcate understanding, knowledge, and the skills necessary for success in college-level courses such as calculus and statistics while also instilling a sense of wonder and awe for what the human mind is capable of creating and discovering.

In teaching mathematics, instructors balance both a conceptual and procedural approach to traditional algorithms, while also striving to highlight the beauty and mystery found within the subject.

Students are required to be diligent in the study of mathematics through nightly homework and regular assessments, thus developing good work habits through the deployment of good character and virtue.

Wisdom from Climbing Parnassus

- Formative knowledge is more valuable, but it takes longer. The disciplined mind requires years to gestate. And the ideal curriculum for the twentieth century is the same triumvirate that ruled in the seventeenth, eighteenth, and a goodly part of the nineteenth: Latin, Greek, and mathematics. All other subjects grew from them, even as they were distinctly secondary to them.
- ➤ The mind's formation requires that one possess a "will to take pains." It is work. Yet the reward is massive. Most people are "content with the mean"; the average suffices for the vast majority. But if we would be great, we must spend time with great things.
- This is a very long view indeed. And such education serves to do even more than discipline and form the mind. It inculcates right habits of feeling.
- ➤ The long way around is the shortest route home.

Program Continuity K-12

Liberty Common School

Singapore Math (Standards Edition) – A thorough inspection of the primary k-6 curriculum was conducted through several group and individual meetings last spring and this fall. The overall consensus is that the curriculum continues to serve the school well, as students now have a much stronger grasp of algebraic concepts than they did when the school was using the U.S. Edition as noted by **Mr. Huey**. Teachers have made minor but necessary adjustments in the adoption/implementation over the last several years, all of which

comport with the mission, philosophy, and policies of the school.

Alignment across campuses is strong. Regular meetings are held to ensure program continuity between the Plato and Aristotle campuses

Liberty Common High School

The new Introductory Algebra course is in its first year for 8th-grade students who are not quite ready for a rigorous study of Algebra 1. So far, the course (taught by Mrs. Dille) is going well, and has an added side benefit of allowing the Pre-Algebra course to focus on getting 7th-grade students ready for Algebra 1 in the 8th grade.

AP Precalculus is a new course offered by the College Board. LCHS has been approved to offer the class in its inaugural year. Several

students have signed up to take the exam in May.

Key Accomplishments/Initiatives

Liberty Common School

LCS Math League, led by Mrs. Robinson (4th), Mrs. Hickman (5th), Mr. Huey (6th), and Mr. Ronen (4th & 5th), continues to foster advanced mathematical development of our high-

achieving math students.

Teachers read, studied, and discussed *Knowing and Teaching Elementary Mathematics* by **Liping Ma** last year, which is a foundational text in the school's approach to k-6 mathematics. The book describes the nature and development of the knowledge elementary teachers need in order to be considered accomplished mathematics teachers, and suggests why knowledge seems more common in China than in the United States, despite the fact that Chinese teachers have less formal education than their US counterparts. **Mrs. James** had this to say about the book: "My personal takeaway from the book is importance of precision in mathematical language. Students come to 3rd grade with the habit/practice of saying things like '2-5 is impossible' which is of course not true. Now, my students say, 'regroup' instead of 'impossible'. Rather than saying, '3 can't be evenly divided into 4 groups,' I highlight the same concept but add, 'while keeping it a whole number. In 4th grade, you'll get to start decimals and they'll teach you how so split up that number!"

Liberty Common High School

The transition from **Mrs. McAllister** as Department Chair to **Mr. Lovely** has gone smoothly. Mrs. McAllister's wonderful leadership over the past 10 years in much appreciated.

Teachers are participating in a book study of *The Republic* by **Plato** to gain a deeper understanding of a classical approach to teaching mathematics. It's an interesting read thus far, which rich discussions about the roots of Western philosophy.

The high-school math team competed at CSU's math day and won the small school competition in dominant fashion. LCHS sent three teams, with each of them competing at a high level. This was an outflow of the Mu Alpha Theta math honor society led by Mrs. McAllister and Mrs.

Lannen.


