Big Ideas

- 22. How does sequencing events in a story help the reader to summarize the text?
- 23. How does a reader use context clues to determine/clarify the meaning of unknown and multiple meaning words?
- 24. How do readers use specific information from the text to explain events, ideas, and concepts?
- 25. How do readers use inferencing to create meaning from informational and literary texts?
