Big Ideas

- 1. The community that we live in impacts our behaviors, beliefs and attitudes.
- 2. We are social beings. Our social relationships influence what we think and believe, how we react to situations, and even what we wish for.
- 3. Sociologists look for patterns in social relationships.
- 4. Individuals can benefit by using their sociological imagination to look at events in their lives.
- 5. Sociology includes three major theoretical perspectives.
- 6. Events in our life reflect our society's culture.
- 7. Values are the basis of norms.
- 8. Sanctions enforce conformity in a society.
- 9. Without socialization, we will not develop many of the characteristics we associate with being human.
- 10. Human infants who are deprived of intensive and prolonged social contact with others are stunted in their emotional and social growth.
- 11. Humans learn the rules of their culture, what is expected of them in various situations, and how to interact successfully with other people, through the lifelong process of socialization.
- 12. Extreme isolation/abuse/neglect can cause serious developmental delays, such as language development.
- 13. Society is divided into classes that have unequal levels of income, wealth, power, and prestige.
- 14. Sociologists have identified several social classes in the United States. They include the upper class, the middle class, the working class, the working poor, and the underclass.
