INSTRUCTIONAL SERVICES

Collaboration and Communication: October kicked off with a productive district level PLC day! K-8 reconvened to dive into common assessment data to gauge how students are progressing, discuss curriculum, and share effective teaching practices. Teachers from CVHS and MLHS were able to come together to look at ways to support skills assessed in CAASPP and to discuss how to best help students reach mastery. Music, Art and PE grades 6-12 were able to meet in there respective departments to talk about how to vertically align their programs. In response to feedback from these long-awaited district PLCs, Instructional Services is following up on curriculum and support needs communicated across the district.

Curriculum and Programs: Instructional Services is continuing to meet with Shasta College as well as partnering with community leaders to investigate exciting new ways to expand our already awesome CTE offerings. As we continue to listen to the needs and concerns of our teachers, October will be the first of a nine week series that site leaders and instructional services will attend in order to dive into the most recent research regarding reading and how to best support teachers in refining our comprehensive reading program. We're looking forward to learning more about how we can best serve our students and support our teachers.

Assessment:Sites are reflecting on Fall NWEA data as well as the FIAB/IABs (small assessment tools) to support CAASPP skill progress, all of which can help us better gauge student growth as we move through the school year.



STUDENT SERVICES

We have been actively planning for the various Expanded Learning Opportunities that will be offered during our CAMP weeks in the coming school year. A Request for Proposals (RFP) was posted and we will be presenting two contracts for services to the Board of Trustees in October. The contracts offer our students opportunities to experience a wide range of activities that will enrich, inspire and elevate their learning. CAMPS will be offered at SLS, BSA, and GOES during Winter Break, Presidents' Week, Spring Break and Summer Session.

Our SAILS Program will be celebrating national LIGHTS ON AFTER SCHOOL! during the week of October 23rd - 27th. This event was created to celebrate after school programs and their important role in the lives of children, families and communities. Lights shine bright in our SAILS program and we are honored to participate in this event. Students and staff will host a special after school open house on October 25th from 4pm - 6pm at SLS, GOES and BSA to showcase the many projects and activities that our students engage in during extended learning. On October 26th during SAILS, students will travel to the Sundial Bridge to further celebrate Lights On! They will be wearing yellow and will walk the bridge, which will be illuminated yellow.

The new mower is more ergonomically suited for the operator, has a wider cut and moves along faster. All great benefits in aiding to the upkeep of the newly laid turf on our field. We also received our new "sweeper" October 10th that replaces another piece of aged equipment. The sweeper clears the field of grass clippings.

Nutritional Services took possession of our long awaited replacement box delivery truck in late September. This vehicle is replacing one that was 24 years old and on its last legs. It has been on order for 10 months. The department was able to use KIT Grant funds for this entire purchase.
