



OPERATIONS









Montgomery County Student Advisory Delegation


The 2022-2023 school year was the second cohort of our Student Advisory Delegation which included 40 juniors and seniors from 20 high schools, brought together to provide student voices on a variety of educational topics. The students met four times throughout the year to learn about the education system in Montgomery County and Ohio and how they can be advocates for their own education and for the improvement of the system for all students. The delegates also visited the Ohio Statehouse in the Spring to meet with our elected representatives to talk to them about what is working in schools and the areas students feel need some additional attention to ensure Ohio students are future-ready.

The Instructional Services division improves teaching and develops teacher and administrative leadership through a variety of customized educational services such as curriculum supervision, gifted education support, English Language Learner coordination, and literacy and mathematics instructional support. It's home to the Future Self Centerand Remote Learning Center, oversees the Western Ohio Service Collaborative, and hosts professional development for educators in the Dayton-region and beyond.











Afghan Refugee Program


In response to the rising number of English Language Learners across the county, Instructional Services launched a new service specific to supporting students who are considered English Language Learners. The department is supporting individual schools, as well as leading an English Learner Educator network, supporting the families and students of refugees, and managing a Title III Consortium. MCESC provides additional support for Afghan Refugee families that have been recently placed in the Miami Valley Region. With support from Montgomery County Department of Jobs & Family Services, MCESC hosted an Afghan Refugee Summer Program. This week-long program offered students and families the opportunity to connect while creating a space for hands-on learning through integrated experiences.

SOCIAL EMOTIONAL LEARNING

The Social Emotional Learning team educates and supports school districts in the implementation of whole-child-focused initiatives that champion the mental wellness of students, staff, families, and school communities. This department includes professional development and consultation, prevention services and programming, school psychologists and the Early Childhood Program.

Schools of Excellence in Prevention

Throughout the years of the program, Schools of Excellence in Prevention schools have demonstrated making a difference in student outcomes through data, but they have also made a lasting impact on the mental wellness of their community



— like in New Lebanon Local Schools where youth prevention groups are educated in best practice prevention strategies. They learned that using scare tactics to deter students from using substances, like a mock car crash at prom time, are ineffective and can actually cause more harm by traumatizing students. They decided to remove mock car crashes and planned other, more effective, activities that would keep students safe and healthy on prom night. This is best-practice prevention that will last for generations!

SPECIALIZED + RELATED SERVICES

The Regional Center collaborates with districts across Miami Valley to provide related services and specialized support to children ages three to 21. These services include Speech-Language Pathology, Orientation and Mobility, Teacher of the Visually Impaired, Educational Audiology, Hearing Intervention, as well as the Autism and Low Incidence Coaching Teamand the Educational Assessment Team. Each service plays a crucial role in enhancing the educational experience of children and improving their access to the educational environment.

Autism and Low Incidence Coaching Team

The Autism and Low Incidence Coaching Team of Certified Autism Specialists provide high-quality training and job embedded coaching on evidence-based practices to build the capacity of educational teams serving students with autism and/or other complex disabilities. Through Lynn DeMange's individual coaching with West Carrollton high school, the school team repurposed a storage room into a sensory room to support the sensory and emotional regulation needs of one student. However, the room has now turned into a regulating space for many other students because a calm brain is a brain ready for learning, and that benefits us all!

Occupational and physical therapists use their expertise in child growth and development to work collaboratively with families and educational professionals to help students develop the sensory-motor and adaptive skills required for learning and life success.

Student Programs operates two Learning Centers that offer inclusive and specialized education programs for students in grades K-12, up to age 22. Utilizing a holistic approach to education and mental health, including intensive instruction and learning of coping skills, the Learning Centers aim to enable students to reach their full potential and lead fulfilling lives.

Tiger Learning Lab

Tiger Learning Lab, established by Learning Center West, is an innovative program designed to provide students with simulated daily living and vocational experiences. By engaging in individual and group exploration, students have the opportunity to enhance their functional independence, gain essential life skills, and prepare for gainful employment in diverse industries. Tiger Learning Lab places a strong emphasis on equipping students with practical daily living skills including household chores, personal care, and time management. In addition, by engaging in real-world tasks, students gain practical experience in sorting and organizing, assembly and manufacturing, and workplace etiquette. By focusing on daily living tasks and vocational training, students cultivate a diverse skill set that empowers them and prepares them for success.

CAREER READINESS

Career Readiness includes four functions: Workforce Development, College Access, Policy and Advocacy, and Data Analysis. Together they support schools through programs and services that create career connections and improve access to college including leadership of our Business Advisory Council, working with elected officials to advance education policy, and utilizing data to inform decisions.

Inside Dayton Fellows

Starting in 2019, the Workforce Development department began hiring college and high school students as a part of the MCESC Inside Dayton Internship and Fellowship Program. Designed to incorporate student voices into MCESC's work, the program has hired over





At the end of each internship session, the students present to the community their recommendations on how areas of service can be improved.
