


Career Coaching & Job Readiness Training

- 8-weeks of Career Coaching
- Career Panels and Mock Interviews
- Students earn \$200 stipends
- Eligibility for paid internships if desired
- Up to 150 spots each year



160 Mock Interview Experiences


48 total career coaching sessions in small groups




