versary of the end of World War I (1914-1918). Canada, Australia, and New Zealand observe November 11 as Remembrance Day to honor people who have died in war. The United Kingdom celebrates Remembrance Day on the Sunday closest to November 11. Veterans Day celebrations in the United States include parades and speeches. Special services are held at the Tomb of the Unknowns in Arlington National Cemetery in Arlington, Virginia.

In 1919, President Woodrow Wilson proclaimed November 11 as Armistice Day to remind Americans of the tragedies of war. A 1938 law made the day a federal holiday. In 1954, Congress changed the holiday's name to Veterans Day to honor all United States veterans.

Don't forget to turn your clocks back Sunday, November 5th for Daylight Savings Time!

I ask that you continue such tenacity throughout the school year to make it your best year ev-


er – as well as mine. It is not easy to work hard every day, but always remember that






WESTWOOD ELEMENTARY—KAREN ASHWORTH


October has been an incredible month at Fairview! We had a Calcasieu Parish Public Library librarian come in to talk to the 3rd-5th graders about


TS COOLEY ELEMENTARY—MARY LANIER

The Jr. League came to Dolby to read to 1st grade for the Read for the Record.


 $65 \, 1^{\rm st}$ grade students enjoyed hearing the book $\it Quackers$ on the morning of October 19.


