Laissez Les Bon Temps Roulez!

On Mardi Gras in 1827, a group of students donned colorful costumes and danced through the streets of New Orleans, emulating the revelry they'd observed while visiting Paris. Ten years later, the first recorded New Orleans Mardi Gras parade took place, a tradition that continues to this day. In 1857, a secret society of New Orleans businessmen called the Mistick Krewe of Comus organized a torch-lit Mardi Gras procession with marching bands and rolling floats, setting the tone for future public celebrations in the city. Since then,

krewes have remained a fixture of the Carnival scene throughout Louisiana. Other lasting customs include throwing beads and other trinkets, wearing masks, decorating floats and eating King Cake.

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Reminisces from a Reader—Helen Curol, MLIS, Library Consultant

It seems that we librarians have been forever worrying about education & libraries in the 21st C! This worry has caused us to:

live in a state of bewilderment about what we should be doing from day-to-day;

plan, tweak/re-tweak, even eliminate plans;

learn/unlearn/relearn technology & software upgrades;

remain updated with federal/state/local policies from ESEA (Elem & Secondary Educ Act) to No Child Left Behind to Common Core to the present (ESSA) Every Student Succeeds Act;

relentlessly read such professional literature as A NATION AT RISK (1983) to THE DEATH AND LIFE OF THE GREAT AMERICAN SCHOOL SYSTEM (2010) to EMPOWER: WHAT HAPPENS WHEN STUDENTS OWN THEIR LEARNING (2017) for 30+ years.

Are you now tired?

If so, my advice is to remember what we as librarians are traditionally expected to accomplish:

Promote LOVE of reading by conversing with students well enough to RECOMMEND appropriate books/e-books, magazines, newspaper articles, and databases that will be of interest to them for purposes of broadening their horizons, meeting their life's challenges, and (ultimately) developing a love of literature.

Facilitate equity of service by providing access on-site throughout the day as well as virtually 24/7 to information & leisure reading in a wide variety of formats for all!

Instruct students & teachers how to acquire, <u>evaluate</u>, and use information (including online) so that they are effective users of ideas & information, a lifelong skill.

Collaborate with faculty to mirror classroom lessons when preparing library lessons, co-teach when appropriate, and educate them about librarian accountability.

Become a change agent & leader at schools to engage students & faculty in culture change that includes books in conversations during social interactions, book discussions (in variety of formats), cultivate curiosity, present programs that attract community, and research atypical ideas.

If we forget our traditions (especially "Buzz About Books") and focus <u>only</u> on each "next phase" to come along – we shall develop a permanent myopia that will cloud our 20/20 library vision.


PRIEN LAKE ELEMENTARY—SARA WALTERS


It's been a cold January, but we have stayed warm in the Prien Lake library with our new snow buddies for the couch. They were bought with book fair profits.


LEBLEU SETTLEMENT—RENEE LELEUX


LeBleu Settlement students have been busy reading and testing. Some students have already met their goal and they get iPad time.

In library, classes have been working in groups to research biographies and design and create power points to go along with their research.


