
# DOLBY ELEMENTARY—CAROL WOMACK

book trailers! We are so excited.


The 3D machine is up and running! Students will be working on designing their own 3D objects to print and keep.

The students vote on an official voting machine in March of 2019. The fifth grade students work with partners and read one of the books, research the author of their chosen book, and create a PowerPoint slide show about their book including an ad about their book. Mary Lanier, T.S. Cooley librarian, greatly enjoys being a member of the state committee that selects the books that are placed on the LYRC 3rd - 5th grade list.

Grandparents have been invited to read in the library to their grandchild's class the week of September 10 - 14 to celebrate Grandparents' Week. This is one of the highlights of the year for the students and their grandparents!


