Another school year is ending! One in which librarians performed well for the most part, the online survey reveals that there are still too many students who do not feel that they are trained well enough to utilize Destiny's Online Catalog (low of 31% in one school) or CPSB's Digital Media Resources (low of 22% in another school). Even though it is a minority of students who think they are not trained well enough), there should be no student who feels that way! We have to collaborate more with faculty to ensure that students visit the library for the training they need to survive in a world with an information overload (with not all of it being authentic)! We MUST become evangelical in library doctrine that raises students to the point of success where accessing reputable information is concerned.

Throughout the year we have all worked to support the curriculum and promote love of life-long reading among our students. Since we are the "information specialists" for all subjects, we are educated to know how to find it – even when we do not automatically know it. Although technology makes our lives better in many ways, it has brought about an **era of unlearning**. We now continually **unlearn** past practices and methods of success while simultaneously learning new ones for:

- Careers (e.g., *from* more time for play for elementary students & preparing upper students to maintain community employment needs *to* less time for play in elementary in favor of beginning communication about careers & preparation of students for globalization & data driven decision making; Information gathering and analyzing (e.g., *from* stress-free old card catalog & print for accessing library
- resources **to** OPACs, databases, e-books that that may or may not provide authentic information depending on creators);
- Working together (e.g., *from* team work where each employee was part of a hierarchy & had a specific place & task *to* perform *to* collaboration where each employee is an equal with valid input to provide).

Research conducted in 2017 (and reported by EDUCATION WEEK, December 13, 2017) predicts that 7 of 10 workers are currently in jobs with unknown futures in the future of 30 years. Artificial Intelligence (AI) is looming large over many of them. However, education may very well move to Intelligence Amplification (IA) so that students learn skills that are transferable across careers. These skills are things like flexibility, creativity, initiative, innovation, intellectual openness, collaboration, conflict resolution, curiosity, & improvisation. **Unlearning the past while simultaneously learning the present requires abundant energy, a daily sense of fresh serendipity, and inspired time management skills. The library is the most appropriate place for this growth to begin. Another reason that, as Library Consultant, retirement is my future! I offer my "au revoir" to each of you while I relax - as you begin your new era of simultaneously unlearning /learning!**




