

#### **PROCLAMATION**

#### SCHOOL LIBRARY MONTH APRIL 2018

WHEREAS, the school library program is to ensure that students and staff are effective users of ideas and information; and

WHEREAS, the school librarian's role is to provide the leadership and expertise necessary to ensure that the library program is an integral part or the instructional program of the school; and

WHEREAS, the Board of Education has entrusted the school librarian in each school to teach the skills of locating and using information through traditional resources and new technologies, to provide literature appreciation activities, and to guide and encourage content and recreational reading to every student; and

WHEREAS, lifelong learning begins and is systematically developed through the school library curriculum of the elementary and secondary schools; and

WHEREAS, the school library program contributes to the individual growth and development of all students, while fostering both excellence and equity in education; and

WHEREAS, the school librarians of Calcasieu Parish Schools have dedicated themselves to work for quality library programs for all students;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the Department of Curriculum & Instruction of the Calcasieu Parish Schools does hereby proclaim April 2018 as School Library Month in all of the public schools of Calcasieu Parish and calls upon school administrators, teachers, students and citizens of the schools to recognize and support this action and to participate throughout, the month of April in the celebration of School Library Month.

# MESSAGE FROM HELEN CUROL, LIBRARY CONSULTANT

Fellow Librarians, I wish you a "Happy National School Library Month!" I encourage all schools & faculty to also recognize your work & help celebrate your month with you.

Sometimes in the hustle & bustle of everyday service, we forget the positive impact that we make on students. Often our time is spent on challenges regarding a small number of students who take a wealth of our time for the following reasons:

They don't seem to appreciate reading & curiosity as we would like.

There doesn't appear to be a deep appreciation of the power of books to help them escape periodically from life's harsh realities (instead of synthetic substances).

They perform as if there is not a love of learning for the sake of learning (or curiosity's sake).

There is seemingly a lackadaisical attitude about returning resources on time – which we evaluate as the lack of a greater lifetime skill of meeting deadlines.

There does not seem to be a care about whether or not Google information is accurate or not.

There doesn't seem to be a concern for the value of getting correct information.

They appear to be unwilling to learn about the global impact operative in the 21<sup>st</sup> C.

A few pretend that they care nothing about reading, learning, or testing when schools are graded for those actions and neighborhood property values become a result of the grades.

That's a few of the tests that erode our daily activities even to the point of mental exhaustion. While many fellow educators do not grasp the accountability documents that we as librarians face, I suggest that they look at the finally revised 36-page document, GUIDELINES FOR LIBRARY MEDIA PROGRAMS IN LOUISIANA SCHOOLS (https://www.louisianabelieves.com/docs/default-source/teacher-toolboxresources/2017-louisiana-librarian-guidebook.pdf?sfvrsn=22) You will see that the DeQuincy HS Librarian (Adri LeBlanc) was on the committee that updated them. Every school library should also have one on hand that was distributed to them last August at the in-service meeting.

However, as we have all done during times in life while coping with tragic elements, we simply never stopped believing in positive thoughts to get to positive outcomes. I remember "reaching" students that completely surprised me! Did not reach all, but I continue to believe that another librarian or education leader did (or will. As long as we do not demoralize ourselves & the students in the process, there continues to be hope

that we shall ALL (students, librarians, & teachers) find our perfect fit in

this life & then grow to excel in it.

Please know that you are appreciated & never stop believing in .



toppings as they wanted and to get out of class for an hour to watch SING!






# BARBE HIGH—KAYLA LITTLE & KIM CHOLLEY

Students in grades K-2 participated in a Reading Fair. Stu-





#### ST. JOHN ELEMENTARY—PENNY PENTECOST


During St. John Elementary's Dr. Seuss celebration, library club members

Bell City High School hosted their spring book fair this month. Everyone "PAWSED" for books. It was a huge success.




#### FK WHITE MIDDLE—TIFFANY BOSS





# VINCENT SETTLEMENT—KATEIE STONE






# CYPRESS COVE—KRISTI FONTENOT
