

Melville Louis Kossuth (Melvil) Dewey was born on December 10, 1851 to a poor family who lived in a small town in upper New York state.

Dewey invented the Dewey Decimal Classification (DDC) system when he was 21 and working as a student assistant in the library of Amherst College. His work created a revolution in library science and set in motion a new era of librarianship. Melvil Dewey well deserves the title of "Father of Modern Librarianship."

Dewey changed librarianship from a vocation to a modern profession. He helped establish the American Library Association (ALA) in 1876; he was its secretary from 1876-1890 and its president for the 1890/1891 and 1892/1893 terms.

Students submitted names and pictures for the Veteran's Wall and invited all local veterans to have breakfast with them in the commons.














ST. JOHN ELEMENTARY—PENNY PENTECOST
