empower individuals, strengthen communities, bridge barriers, create solutions to social problems, and move us closer to Dr. King's vision of a "Beloved Community."

In the words of Martin Luther King, Jr., "Everybody can be great because everybody can serve."

A Christmas luncheon was held in the library. Each faculty member bought a toy for the Toys for Tots program.




#### JI WATSON—AMBER SMITH





