Book Rental and School Lunch Assistance

Students who apply and qualify under the School Lunch Program for free or reduced-price lunch will qualify also for assistance for state adopted textbooks and the workbooks that accompany the state adopted texts.

Students who receive food stamps and/or TANF will receive a letter notifying them of their free status for the 2008–09 school year. If you receive this notification letter, you do not need to complete an application for the students on the letter. Students not receiving a notification letter will still need to complete an application.

Applications for free and reduced lunches and textbook assistance will be mailed with student schedules to high school students by mid-August. Applications for elementary, middle, and junior high school students will be mailed to their homes at the beginning of August. Applications also will be available at all elementary, middle and junior high schools to help parents who think they may qualify for assistance.

Immunization Requirements

All students attending Indiana public schools are required by law (PL 103, 150 and 205) to be immunized against diphtheria, whooping cough, tetanus, measles, rubella, poliomyelitis, mumps and Hepatitis B, and varicella. Measles, rubella and mumps **must** be given on or after the child's first birthday. Students are required to have the following:

- **Kindergarten and Grade 1:** 5 DPT, 4 Polio, 2 MMR, 3 Hepatitis B, 1 varicella
- **Grades 2 through 12:** 3 DPT, 4 Polio, 2 MMR, 3 Hepatitis B and 1 varicella

These requirements are necessary because of the continuing outbreaks of vaccine preventable diseases that occur among students. The **only** exceptions to these requirements are children for whom the vaccines are medically contraindicated or children whose parents have filed a written statement of religious objection. All exemptions must be renewed with the school **yearly**.

Indiana Code 20-34-4-5: (c). A child may not be permitted to attend school beyond the first day of school without furnishing proof of immunization or complying with the rules for immunization exemption as stated above.

Parents are required to submit a written statement of their child's immunizations complete with month, day and year given and signed by the physician, or provide to the school a medical record with dates of the immunizations.

Transportation

About three weeks before the start of school a letter of notification will be mailed to each family that has a student eligible to receive bus transportation. This letter will indicate the bus number, bus stop location, and the approximate pickup and drop-off times.

In addition, a copy of the expectations for student behavior will be included. Parents, your children's safety is the most important concern of the Lafayette School Corporation Transportation Department. You can help us with this by reminding your child of the following expectations:

1. Always observe classroom conduct while on the school bus.
2. Always cooperate with the bus driver and obey the driver's instructions promptly and respectfully.
3. Walk safely to and from the bus stop. Walk facing oncoming traffic when there are no sidewalks. Cross in front of the bus when signaled by the driver. Walk 10 steps in front of the bus before crossing to and from the bus stop.
4. **Never attempt to retrieve papers or articles near or under the bus!**

5. Be at the bus stop at least five minutes before the assigned pick up time. Wait at least 10 feet from the roadway.
6. Never attempt to enter or leave the bus until it comes to a complete stop. The driver will signal students when to load or unload.
7. Sit in assigned seats as promptly as possible and do not block the aisles. Students are not to stand or move from seat to seat while being transported.

Planning Ahead?

Already thinking about next summer? Your child may be eligible to participate in some excellent summer programs. Drew Brees has partnered with the Purdue Employees Federal Credit Union to offer the Purdue Athletes Life Success Program (PALS). Children between 9 and 15 years old participate between mid-June and mid-July in a camp that emphasizes wellness, fitness, sportsmanship and community involvement.

The program provides enrichment opportunities for children who otherwise might not have the chance to participate in such summer aerobic fitness activities as swimming or soccer. If you think your child might be eligible, please watch for information about the program next spring or contact your child's principal.

Next summer the Greater Lafayette Area Special Services cooperative preschool special education center at Linnwood again will host two youth camps. The camps aim to serve close to 200 children between 5 and 15 years old through a six-week program offered by Wabash Valley and Wabash Center.

The four-hour morning program called Camp Glow is sponsored and directed by Wabash Valley. The four-hour afternoon program titled Camp Sparks is sponsored and directed by Wabash Center. If you believe your child might benefit from such a program please discuss these camp opportunities with your child's special education teacher.

Chinese Language and Cultural Studies Provided by LSC

In 2007–08 the Lafayette School Corporation embarked on a mission to globally connect our students with the emerging economic and political power of the country of China. Not only did teachers and administrators make a third trip to China to visit schools there but Chinese educational leaders visited the Lafayette School Corporation and a guest teacher from China instructed students from Grades 4–12 in Mandarin Chinese!

We were pleased to host Madam Sun Ye as a guest teacher at Edgelea,

Sunnyside, Tecumseh and Jefferson this past year. Sun Ye brought language exploration to the students of Edgelea and Mandarin Level 1 instruction to 30 students at Tecumseh and Jefferson. In addition to that, she conducted a Chinese cultural club at Sunnyside and connected many students to Purdue University and the Confucius Institute there.

Sun Ye was made available to the Lafayette School Corporation through a grant from the Hanban organization in China and its United States partner, the College Board.

In 2008–09, Sun Ye will be back in China teaching linguistics at a university but will be replaced by two Hanban/College Board guest teachers. One of the teachers will be assigned to Edgelea full-time, and the other will teach both Mandarin Level 1 and 2 to students at Tecumseh and Jefferson.

The LSC also won a grant from the American Councils of Critical Languages and will host a third guest teacher through that program at Sunnyside Middle School where students will explore Mandarin Chinese and the culture of China.

In addition to the curricular offerings, the Lafayette School Corporation will host a delegation of students and teachers from its sister schools in Dalian, China, sometime in the fall. The sister schools partnerships were established from trips taken to China by LSC teachers and administrators on a grant from the Freeman Foundation. With the Olympics being conducted in Beijing this August, interest among our students in learning about China will be sure to be at an all-time high!

Update on Construction Projects

The Bob Rohrman Performing Arts Center is rapidly nearing the close of phase one of the planned three phases of construction. Students will be able to use the new rehearsal rooms during the upcoming school year while the existing music area is being renovated. Work in the theater will begin in May and should be completed in September in time for a grand opening celebration and dedication.

Sunnyside Middle School's new academic wing is under way. Sixth-grade students will occupy the space during 2009–10 while the existing cafeteria is being renovated. All fifth- and sixth-grade students will attend the new Sunnyside building beginning in the 2010–11 school year.

The projects to construct a new softball field and replace varsity and junior varsity tennis courts on property east of Jefferson High School has started. The tennis courts will be used during the 2008–09 school year. The softball field will require multiple growing seasons before it can be used but should be available for use some time during the 2009–10 school year.

The project to construct an area for bus parking and overflow event parking at Jefferson High School should be completed this fall. The area will double as a practice field for the Marching Bronchos.



Getting Fit

Federal law has required school districts to establish wellness policies designed to

encourage eating healthy and physical activity. Working with Purdue University, LSC staff assisted in writing a grant proposal in an effort to purchase fitness equipment for students in Grades 6 through 8 and to work with additional ways of incorporating fitness into a student's lifestyle, beginning in Grade 3.

The grant was competitive, and only a few grants were selected for funding. LSC has learned that it was one of 97 school corporations across the country awarded a grant. The new equipment will be installed and programs implemented over the next three years.

Challenge Program Evolving to Meet Needs and Develop Talents

In February 2007, the Indiana General Assembly passed legislation mandating that high ability K–12 students be identified and served in Indiana’s public schools. The legislation defined a high ability student as one who “performs at, or shows the potential for performing at, an outstanding level of accomplishment, in at least one domain when compared to other students of the same age, experience, or environment; and is characterized by exceptional gifts, talents, motivation or interests” (Indiana Code).

The Lafayette School Corporation has a commendable record in its support of education for high ability students. LSC recognizes and appreciates the special talents of all of its young people and is dedicated to providing appropriate environments to nurture these talents.

In 1986–87, LSC began providing self-contained classes for elementary students in Grades 2–5 who were achieving one to two grade levels above their peers academically. The belief was and is that, because of their special learning characteristics, these children’s needs could best be met in a classroom with a specially trained teacher.

High ability students in first grade who demonstrate potential are “clustered” with peers with a special first-grade teacher at Edgelea School. Students in Grades 2–5 are served at Edgelea with specially trained teachers in self-contained classrooms. Students in Grades 6–12 have been provided a variety of Excel, Challenge, and Honors course options and extracurricular activities to enable them to develop their academic, artistic, musical, physical and leadership talents.

The continuing success of the Challenge Program can be attributed to the hard work and collaborative efforts of teachers, students, administrators, parents, board members and the community. Curriculum and instructional activities within Challenge classrooms are accelerated at least one year, enriched and differentiated with research and independent study as integral parts of each grade level’s program. An effort is made to integrate technology into the curriculum, and authentic assessment techniques also are important program components.

During the second semester of the 2007–08 school year, Edgelea School piloted a kindergarten program for high ability students from Edgelea, Earhart and Miami on Thursday and Friday afternoons. The program proved to be quite successful, and during 2008–09 the high ability kindergarten program will be expanded to include students from all eight LSC elementary schools.

Students in this program will attend morning kindergarten at Edgelea School and then an afternoon program that includes enriched activities in language arts, math and the social sciences. Missi Findley will teach the class.

Previously, high ability kindergarten students were served through testing for early entry. The new high ability kindergarten program will allow LSC to serve high ability K–12 students.

- Goals for the Lafayette School Corporation Challenge Program are that high ability students will:
 - Pursue challenging, differentiated curriculum that will allow them to become independent learners.
 - Discover and understand their own uniqueness and display positive self-concepts as they pursue their individual interests and needs, and develop innovative products.
 - Understand divergent views and respect individuals’ viewpoints as they cooperatively and responsibly interact with their communities.
 - Employ higher level thinking skills and meta-cognitive processes in their pursuit of mastering advanced content.
 - Display multicultural awareness and appreciation of diversity within a global perspective.

The addition of a high ability kindergarten program this school year demonstrates that the Lafayette School Corporation is continuing its quest to provide educational programs that meet the needs of all K–12 learners.

HIGH SCHOOL

Jefferson High School Highlights of 2007–08

- Five JHS seniors qualified as National Merit Finalists! Paul Brown, Erin Nolan, Brittany Oliver, Edward Paget and Andrew West were among 15,000 who were considered for 8,200 scholarships. Three students received a National Merit Award from their chosen university. Paul Brown received a Ball State University National Merit Award, Edward Paget received a Northwestern University National Merit Award, and Andrew West received a Rose-Hulman National Merit Award.
- Jefferson High School science students and teachers had an excellent showing at the Lafayette Regional Science & Engineering Fair. Steve Randak was awarded the High School Outstanding Teacher Award, as well as the Fair Director’s Award. Science Teacher, Joe Ruhl along with JHS senior Betsy Tao were awarded an all-expenses-paid trip to the International Science & Engineering Fair to be conducted in Atlanta, Georgia, in May. In 14 different categories, JHS students earned six gold medals, 10 silver, eight bronze, and five honorable mentions, earning Jeff High School the Outstanding School Award for the 10th time out of the last 11 years.
- Jefferson students excelled in the Scholastics Art Competition. Three of the five Best of Show Awards were awarded to Jefferson High School students! Lauren Henson won in drawing; Kayla Sorenson won in painting; and Shane Dresch won in digital art. About 2,000 works of art were submitted in the Scholastics competition. Lauren Henson also won Best of Show for her sculpture in the New

Artists Competition. This is the 11th consecutive year a Jefferson student artist has won a Best of Show Award in the nine-county New Artists competition.

- In competition with schools the size of Jefferson High School across the United States, the school newspaper, the *Booster*, was given 970 points out of 1,000 possible points in a judging contest by the American Scholastic Press Association (ASPA). Based on a report from ASPA, the *Booster* was the only school in Indiana to receive the award, and the distinction was only awarded to 17 schools nationwide! The *Booster* is led by English teacher Chuck Herber.

Broncho Dads Returns

Jefferson High School is looking forward to having the Broncho Dads program back this fall! In addition, the program is being expanded to include Tecumseh Jr. High School.

The program started in the spring of 2008 and is based on a parent program started at Arlington High School in Indianapolis called Security Dads. Both programs are designed to put a fatherly presence in the school.

Broncho Dads will not provide security at JHS or Tecumseh but is there to serve as Mentors while providing Encouragement and a Nurturing (MEN) environment for all students. The dads can be found throughout the school day, during lunch and at various school events. Broncho Dads don't have to be a father of a student at JHS or TJHS; community members are welcome to participate.

All Broncho Dads must complete a security background check and a brief orientation with a school administrator or veteran Broncho Dads.
