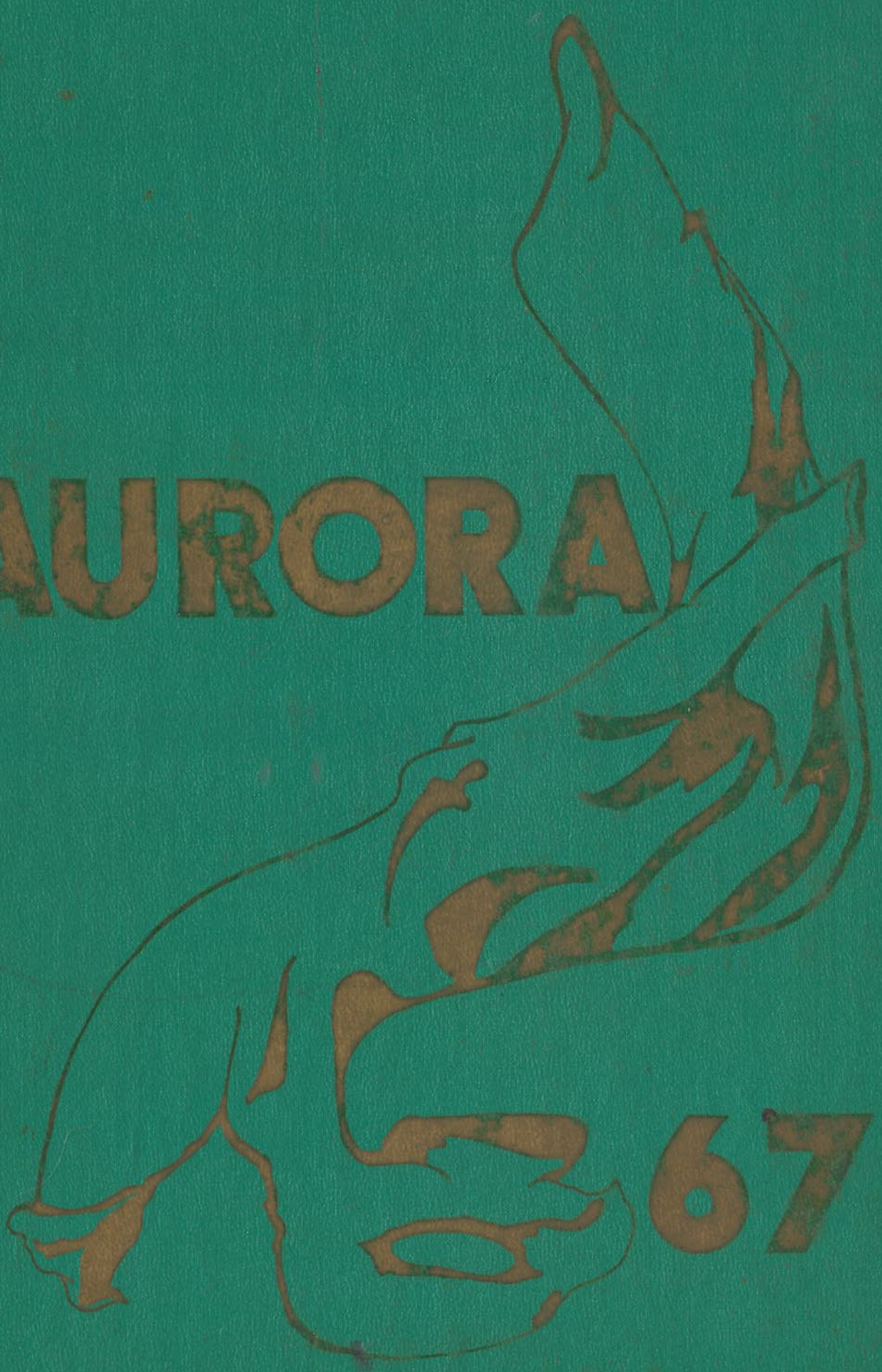
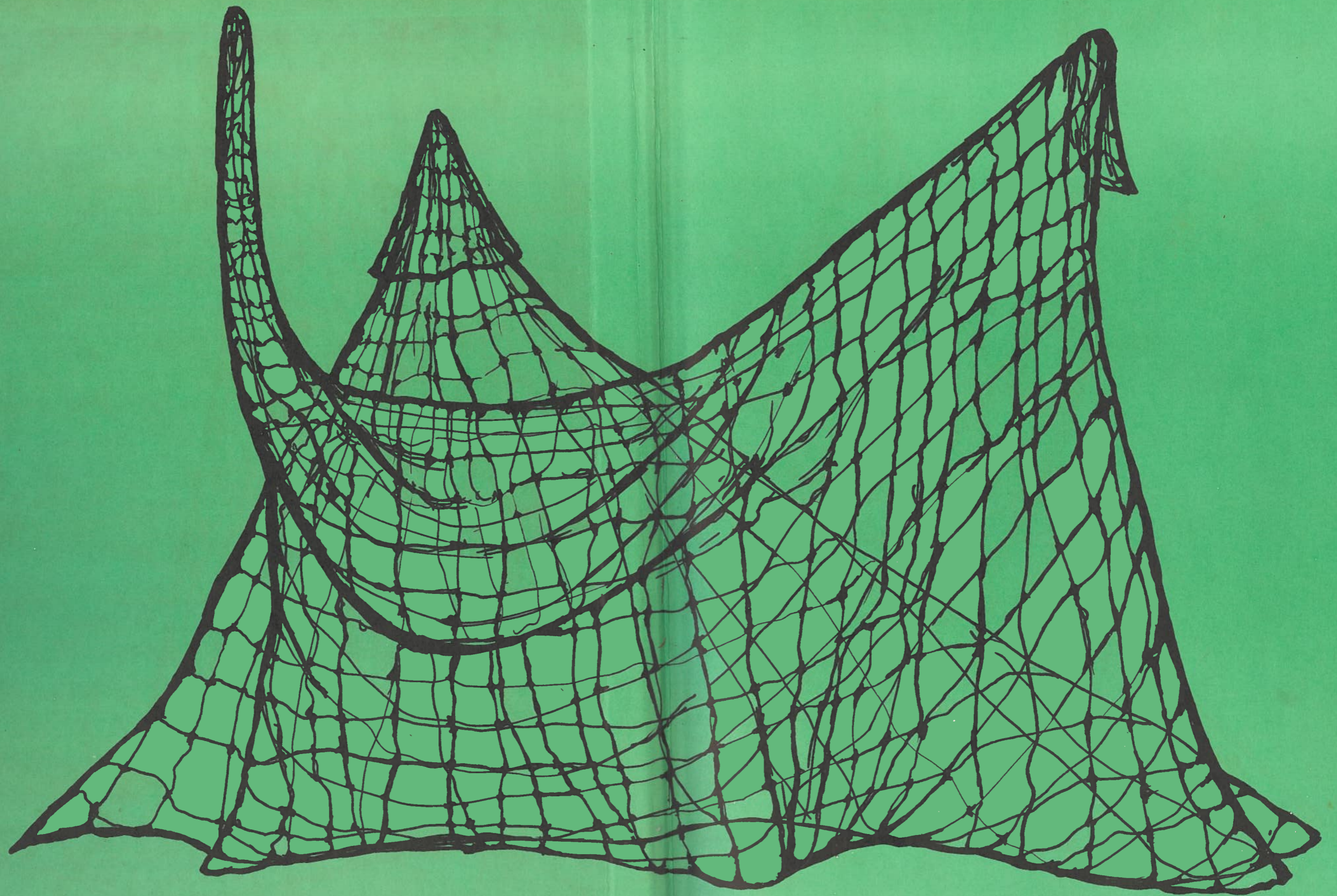

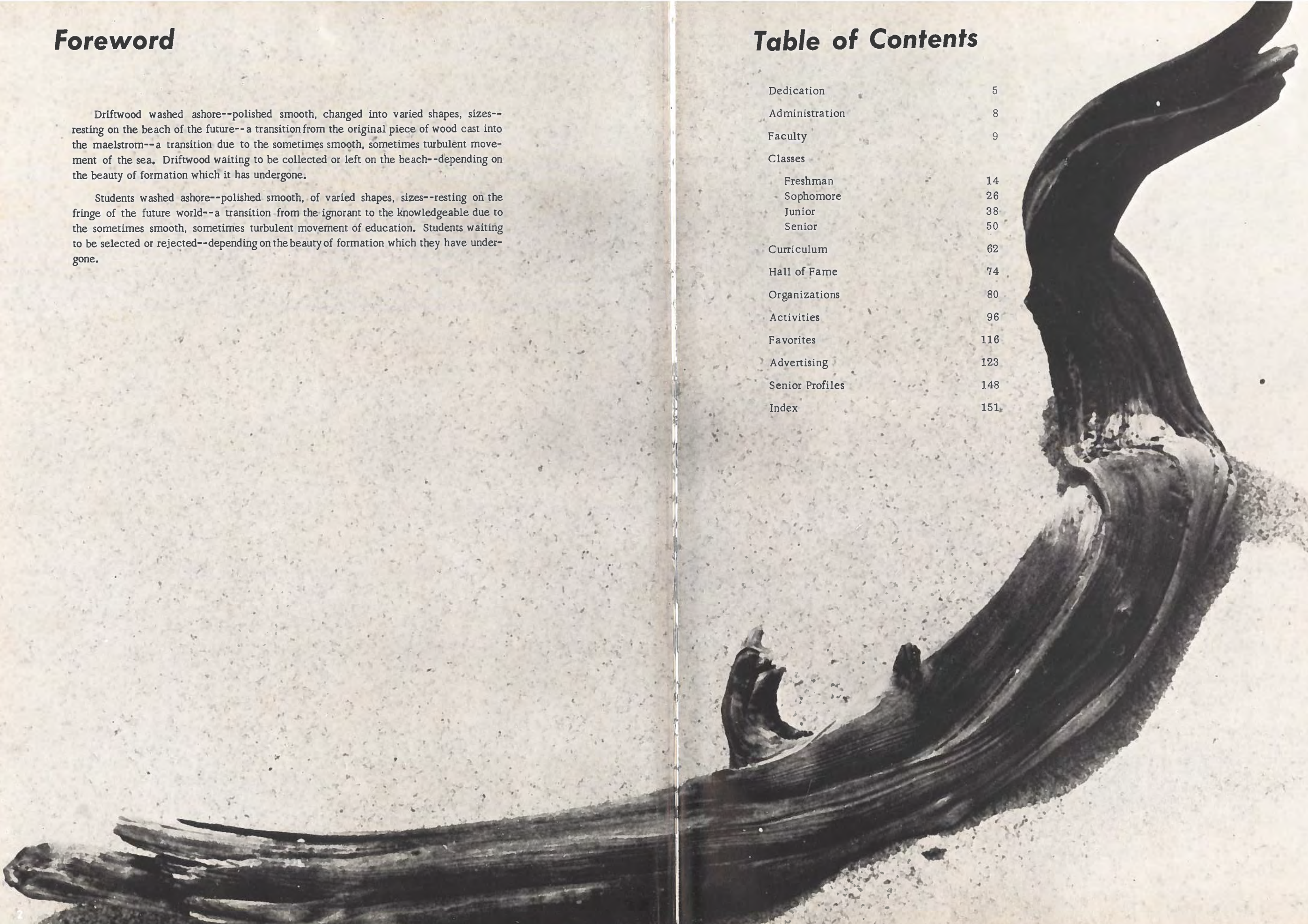
Foreword

Eyes open wide, minds searching for reasons, mathematical symbols in the forefront click together as Sister Anna Maria, mathematics instructor, walks into the classroom.

This picture could have been changed to a hospital corridor if Sister had not met a group of missionary nuns from Texas. From the meeting came her decision to become a teacher in Corpus Christi rather than to follow her original decision to become a nurse.

At that time in the locale of Sligo, Yeats County, in the western part of Ireland, Sister didn't know whether she had a vocation or not, but she was attracted to the life and to the idea of giving herself to the service of others. She decided to try so that she would know - and she is still with the community after 38 years.

Sister was 18 when she entered the convent. She taught in mission schools for approximately five years. The last 30 years have been spent in teaching general math, algebra I, algebra II, geometry, general science, bookkeeping, and Religion at Incarnate Word Academy.

Our decisive nun takes pride in the fact that she is the only charter member of the original staff of Christopher College. Her teaching career in college work began there in 1958.

Modern math left her in the dark at first, but after summer courses she is now an ardent promoter of the new methods as she feels that they make "traditional math more meaningful, more enjoyable, more challenging to the student. The discovery method, which is part of the new approach, is very thought provoking." But she adds: "It is intended to supplement and clarify the traditional math, not replace it."

Sister received her BA degree from Incarnate Word College, San Antonio, and her MA from the University of Notre Dame. She is a member of the National Council of Teachers of Mathematics, and is an officer of the Coastal Bend Council of Teachers of Mathematics.

As a freshman sponsor for 20 years, Sister "likes young people and enjoys working with them. I like to teach them. They keep me young."

To Sister Anna Maria with her soft Irish brogue, young in heart and in mind, we dedicate the 1967 AURORA.

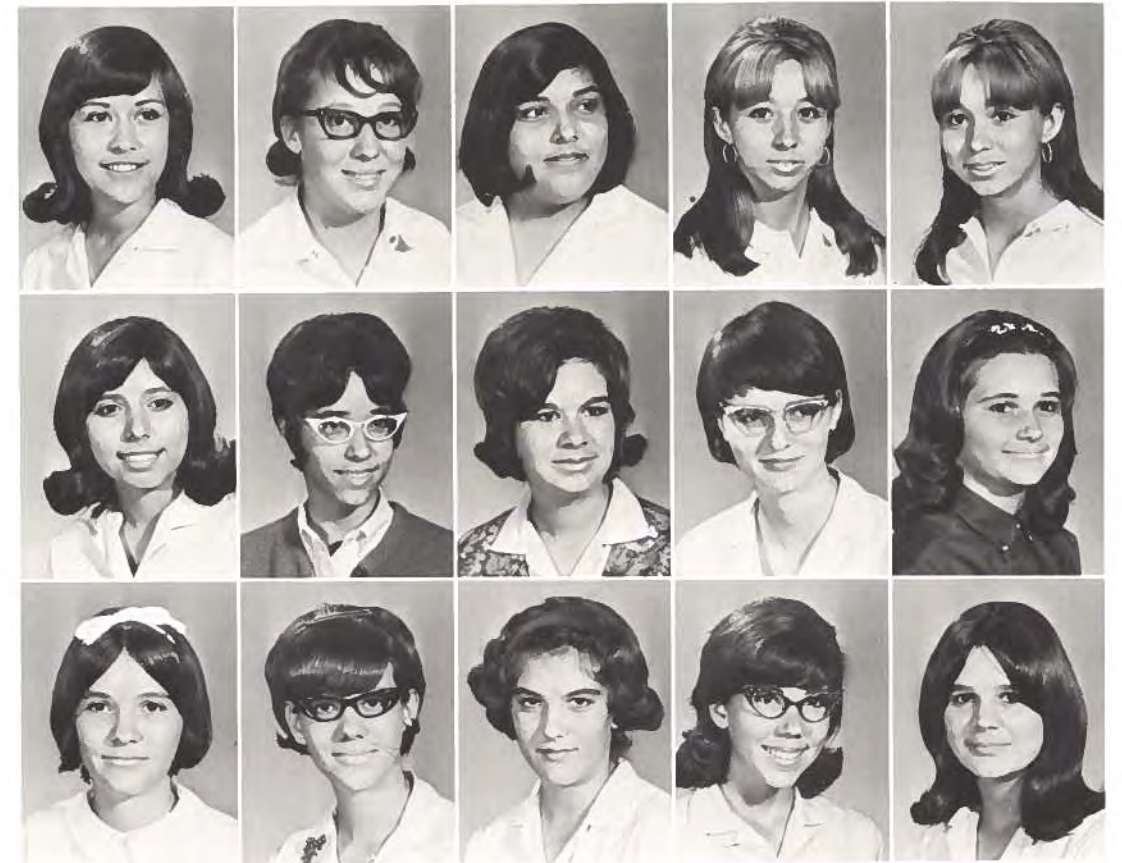

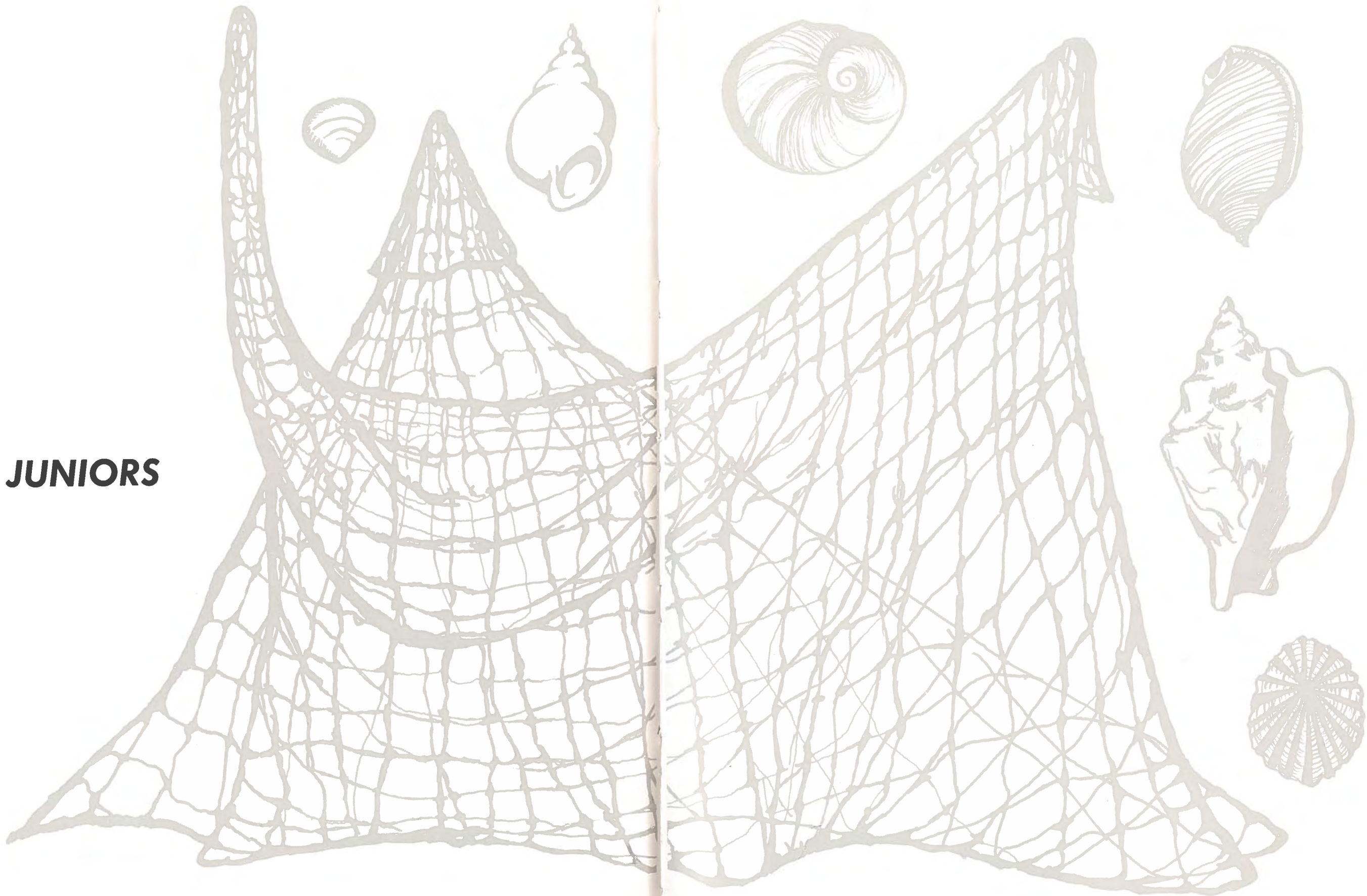

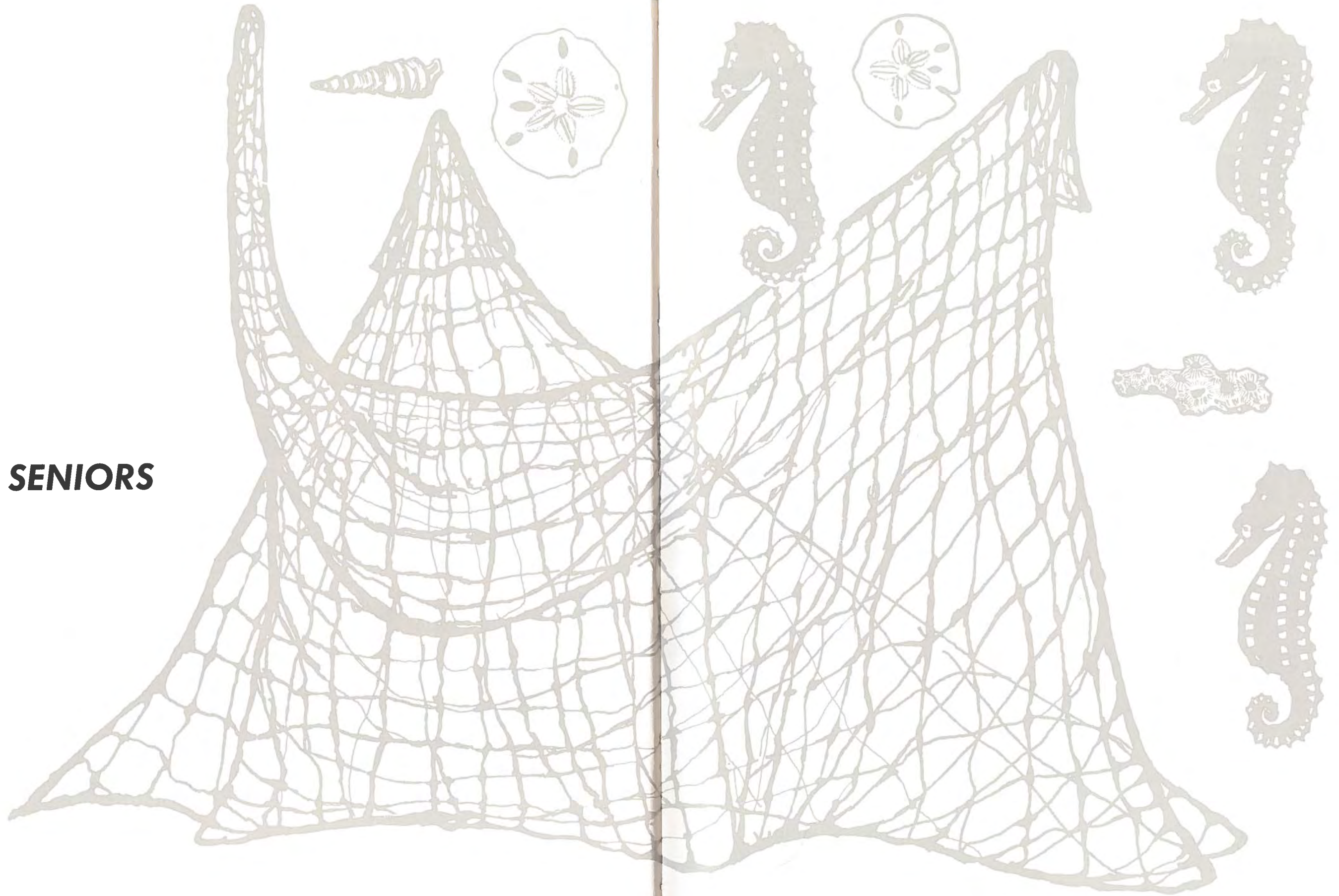

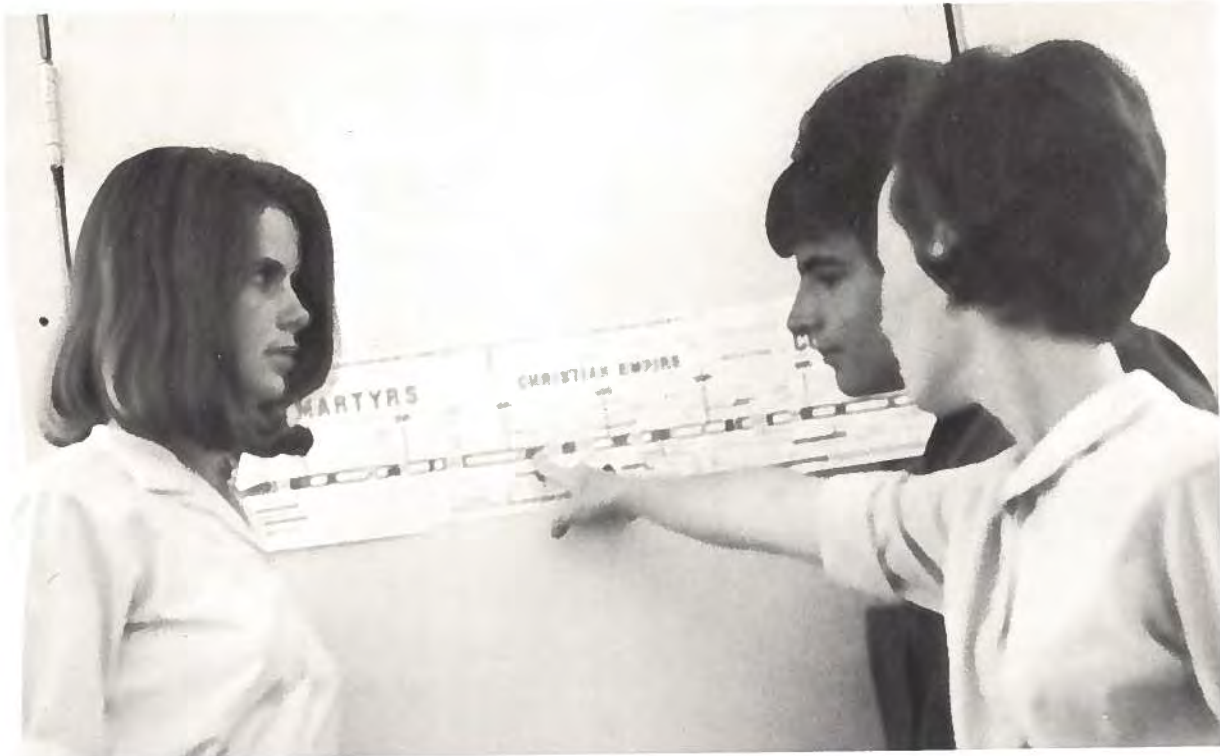

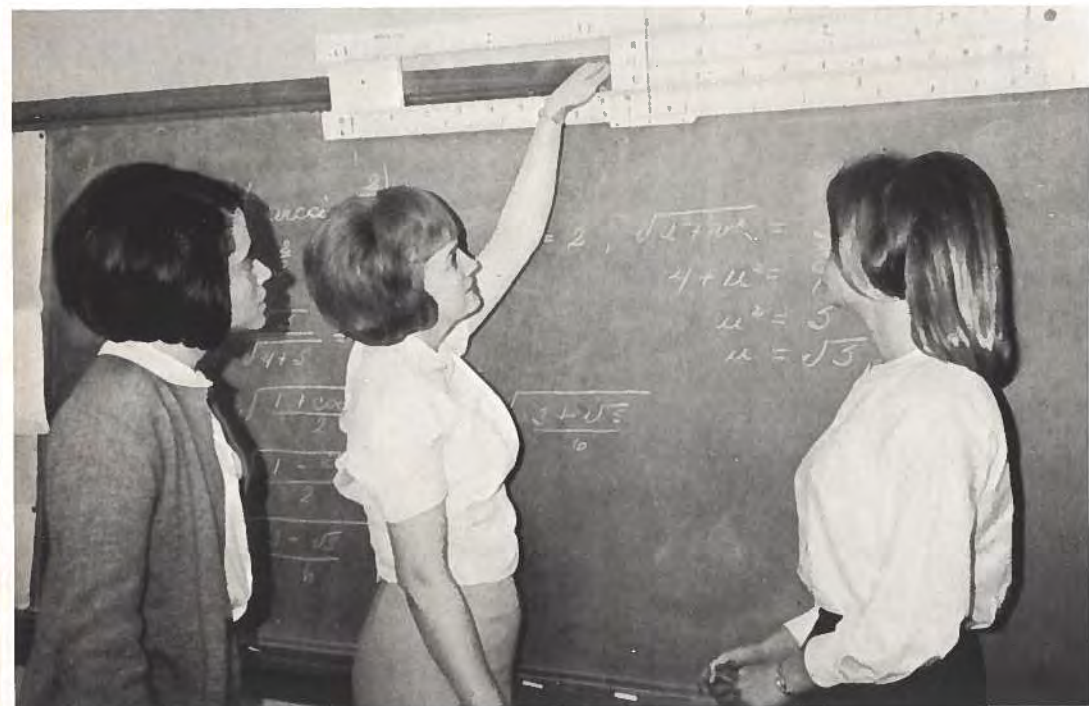

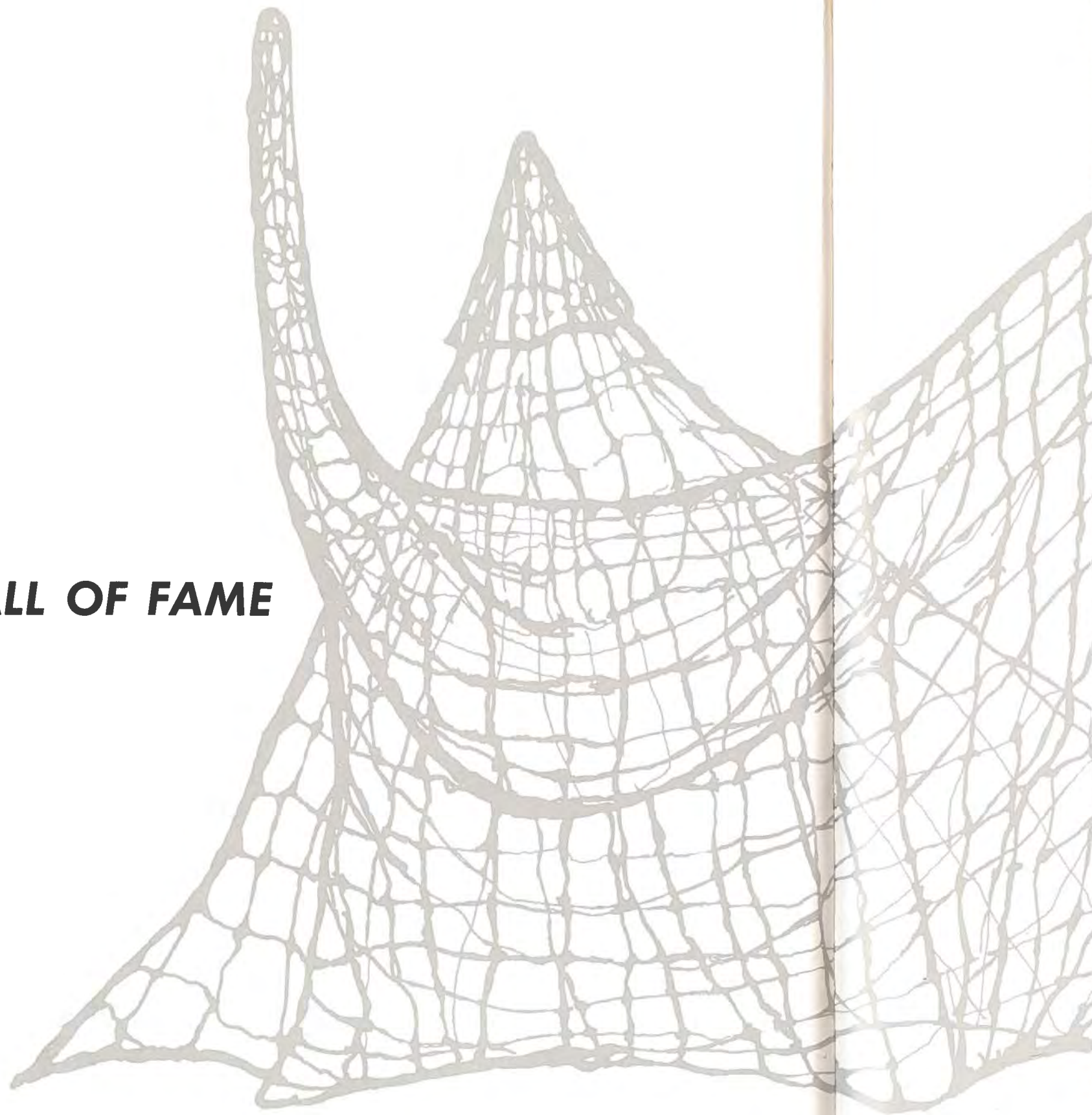

Civics, Science Demand Probing Minds

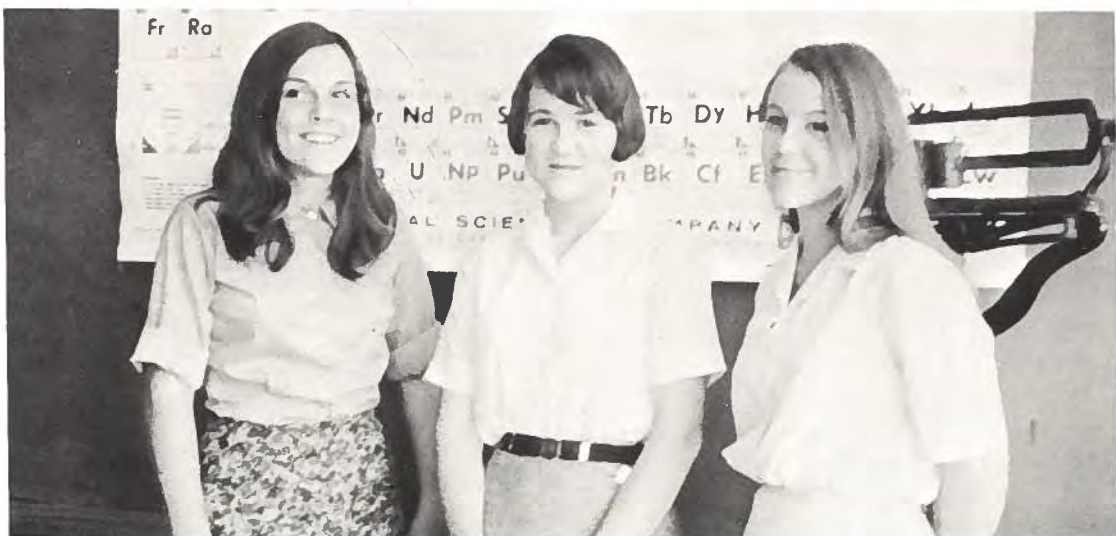
One of the main duties of Civics Club members is the raising and the lowering of the flag daily.

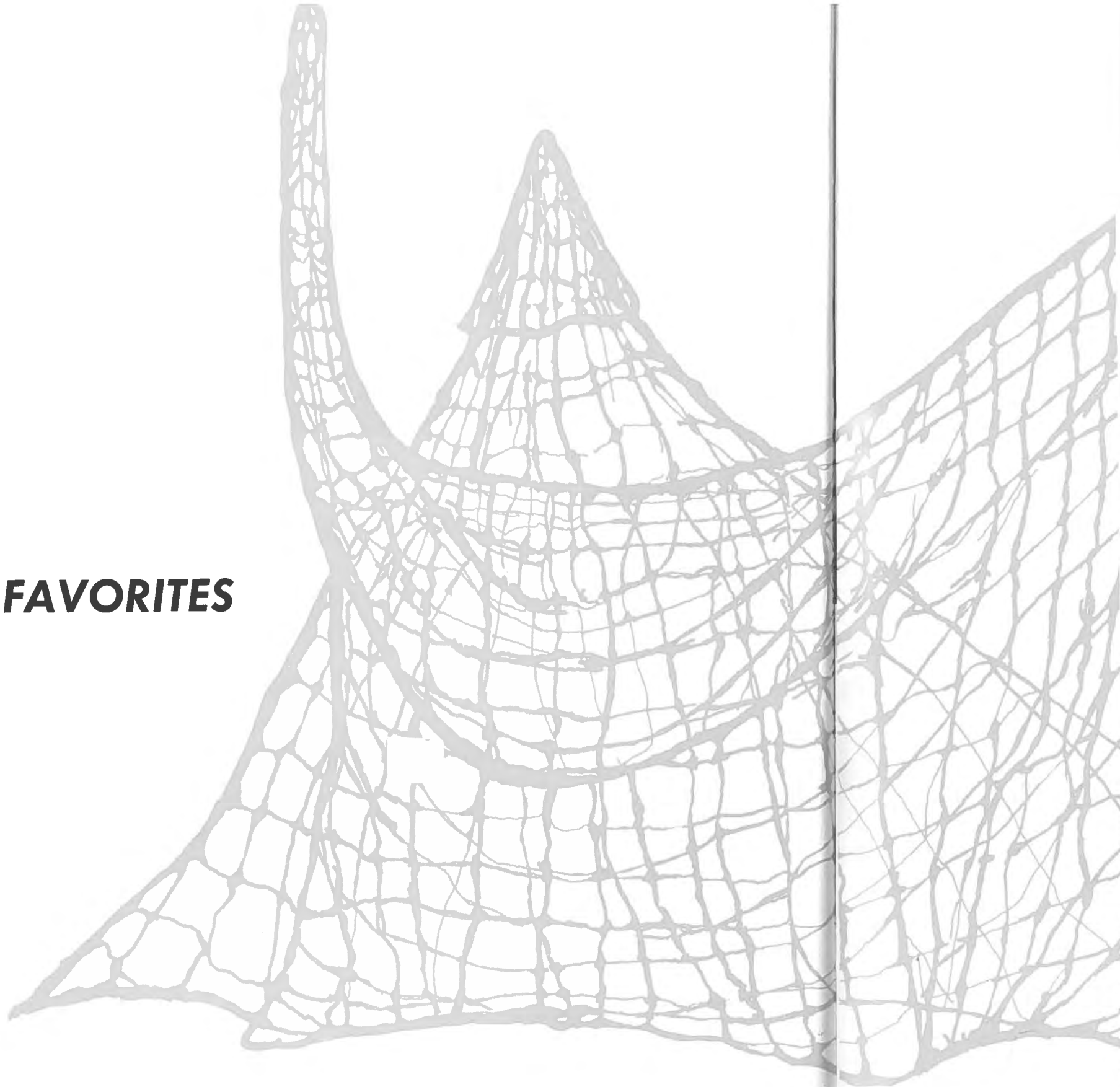
