Thomas J. Drury D.D., L.L.D.

Bishop of Corpus Christi.

Bishop Drury was born in Ireland in 1908, the sixth of twelve children.

At the age of fifteen the future bishop came to the United States. He did clerical work for a time, and then became business manager of an iron works firm.

In 1929 he entered the seminary at Webster Grove, Missouri. He graduated in 1935 and was ordained for the diocese of Amarillo.

In the more than ten years in the Amarillo diocese, Bishop Drury became active in many religious and civic groups. He also edited the diocesan newspaper. He served at Sacred Heart Cathedral as assistant, rector, and as pastor.

After a year as a military chaplain, Father Drury was sent to the Archdiocese of San Antonio. He served there as moderator of the Spanish-speaking program, and as a director of the program of Catholic Action.

After another tour of duty as a chaplain, he returned to his diocese in 1955. In 1961 he was consecrated the first bishop of the new Diocese of San Angelo, Texas. He was transferred to the Diocese of Corpus Christi on July 21, 1965.

Father Edwin is a native Corpus Christian. He attended the Academy for four years. After completing his studies for the priesthood at New Subiaco Abbey, Subiaco, Arkansas, Father Edwin was ordained on May 26, 1956. He did graduate work at the University of Saint Louis, where he earned a Masters degree in Education. The new priest came to the Academy as a teacher in 1958. He became Principal in 1962.



FATHER SYLVESTER SCHAD, O. S. B.

Father Sylvester was born and raised in Lindsay, in north Texas. He attended Subiaco Academy, in Subiaco, Arkansas. Father Sylvester made his philosophical and theological studies at the Seminary at Subiaco, where he was ordained in 1938. He has been at the Academy since 1954.

Today it's really more than a hobby, it's a challenge, it's an opportunity to serve his community. Secretly, we think he likes to do it. We are told he also eats his own cooking.



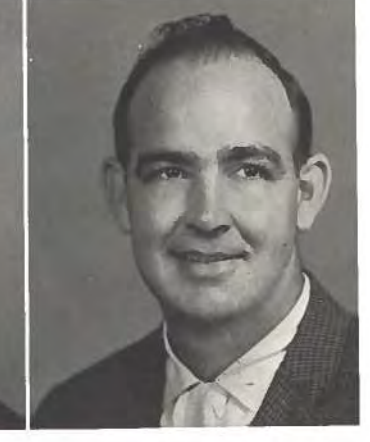

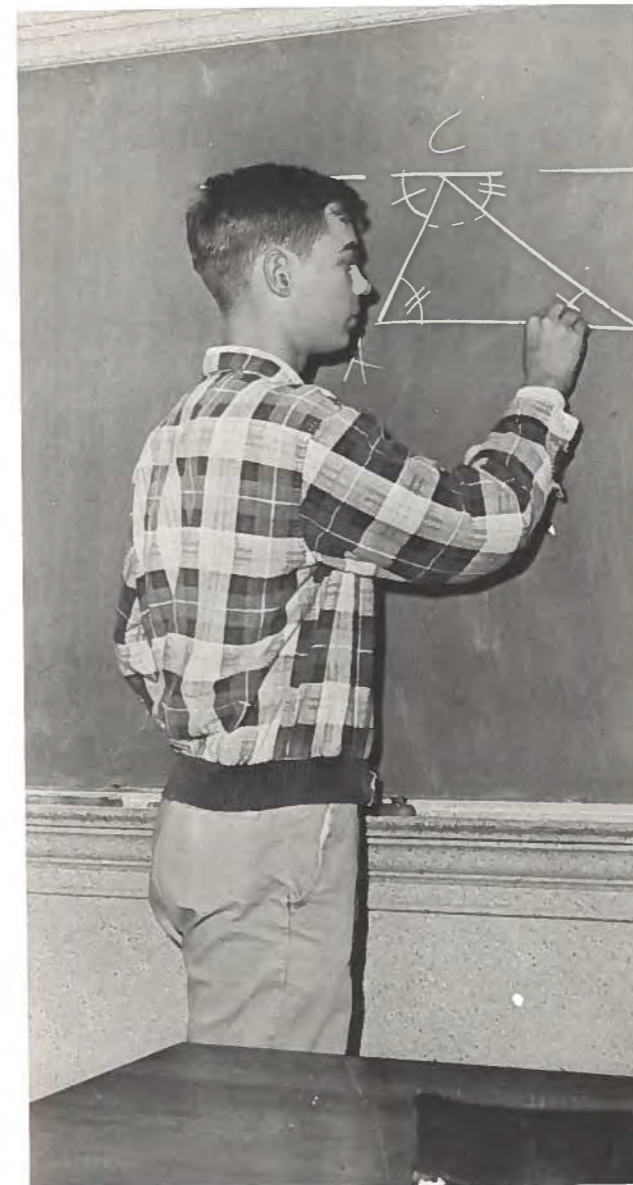

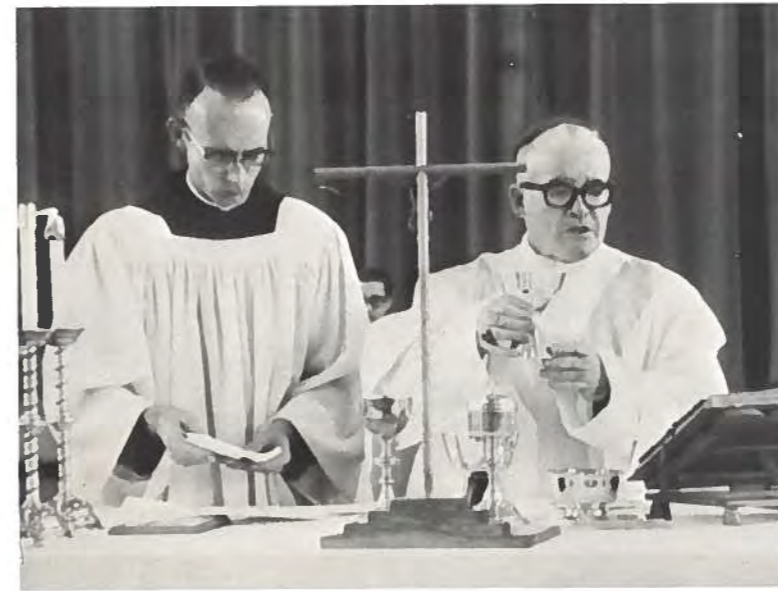

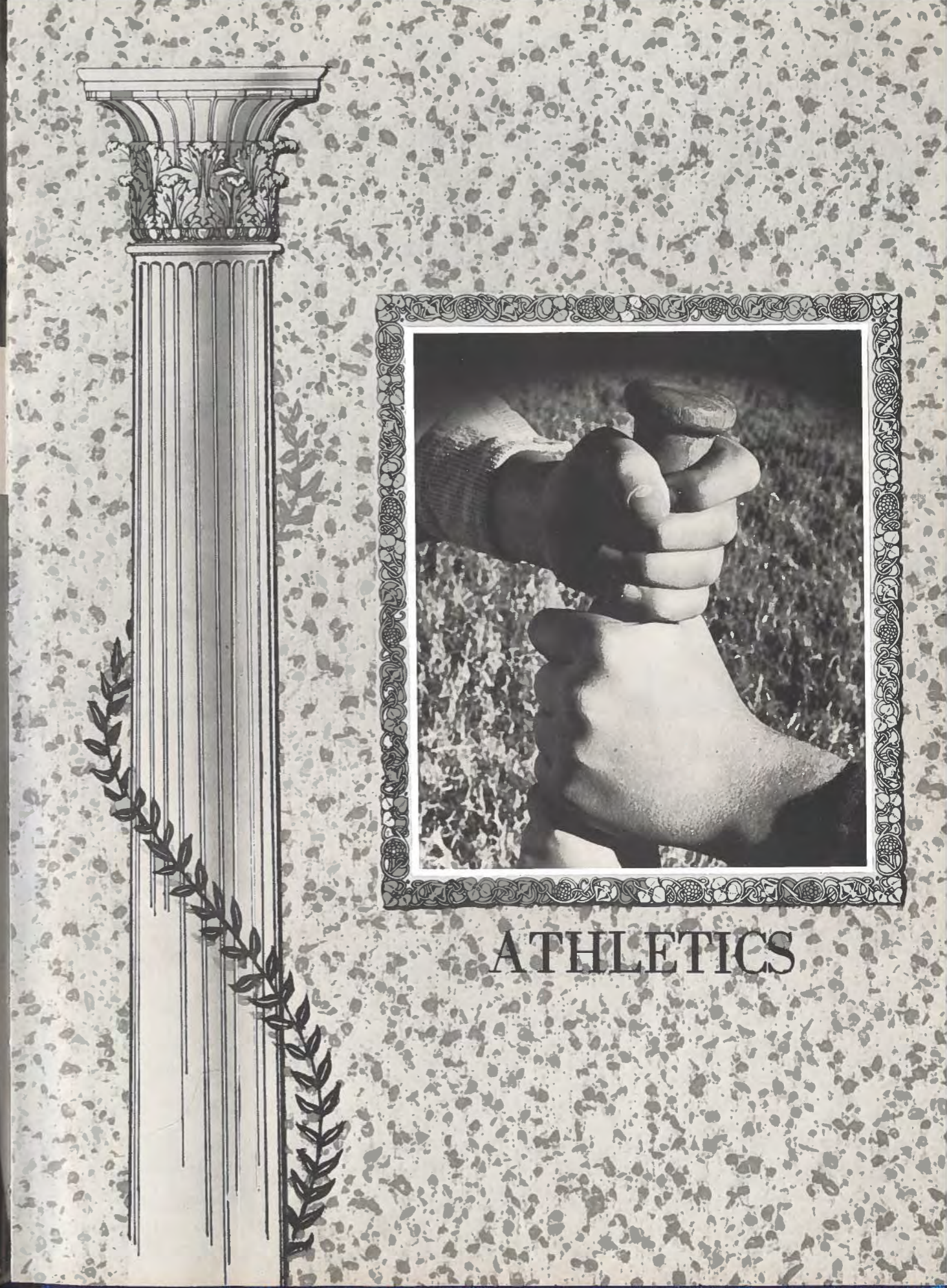

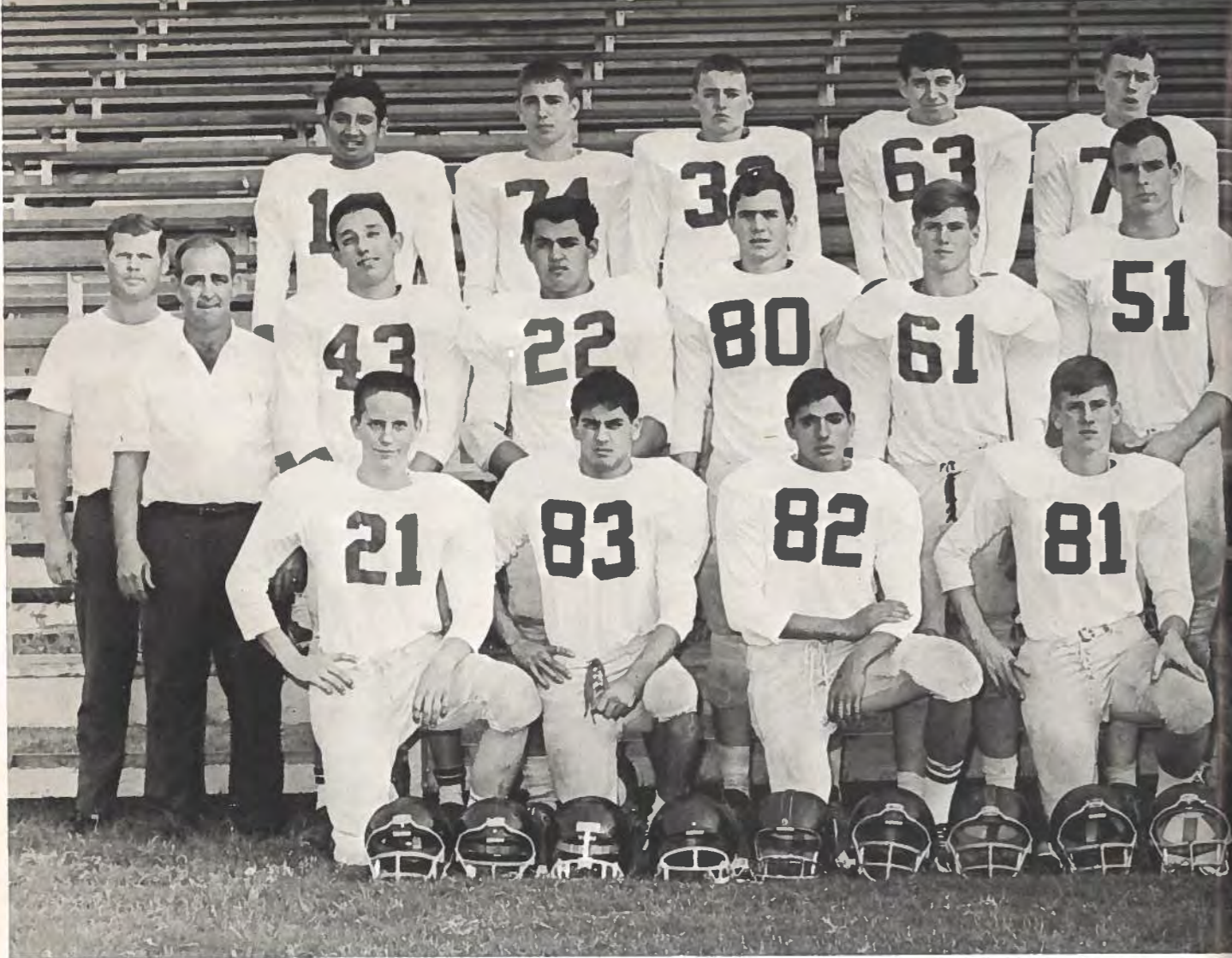

On September 24 Hebbroville inundated the Cavaliers, 43-0.

Against Los Fresnos the Gents won a moral victory, though they lost the game. The Falcons had scored 149 points in four games before meeting the Cavaliers. Los Fresnos prevailed, 18-6, but the Cavaliers showed they could move against real opposition.

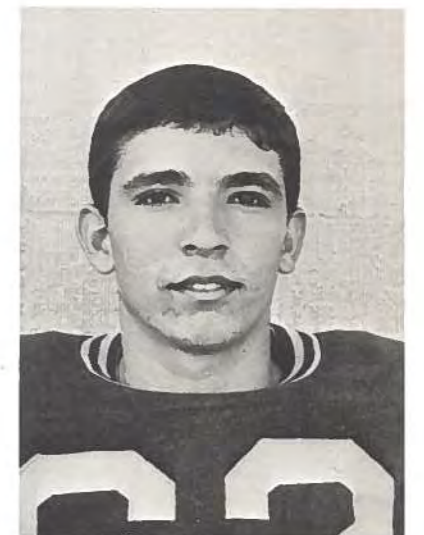

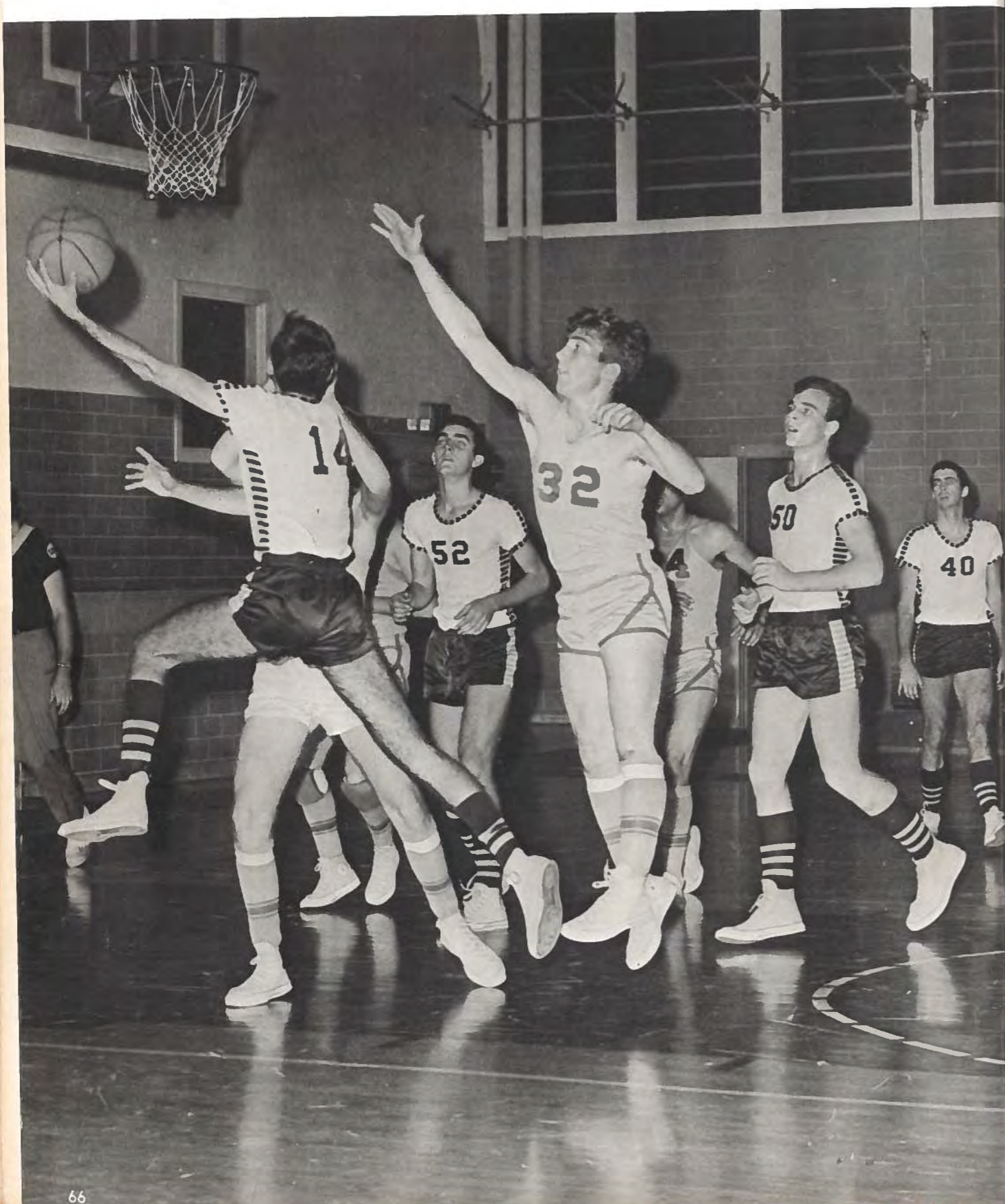
