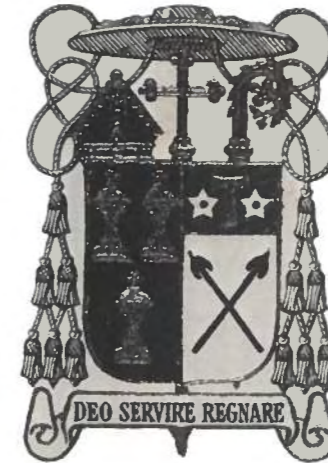

In the many jobs he has held--parish priest, newspaper editor, chaplain in two wars--he has demonstrated an ability tempered with compassion and a deep understanding of people.

His career has been one of praise from people in different walks of life: a Cardinal, a businessman, an Air Force general, shoe-shine boys, civic leaders, laymen and women, non-Catholics, fellow priests, school children, servicemen--and now, religious leaders of other faiths in the Corpus Christi area.

To Air Force men he is the "little bishop." To citizens in Amarillo he is "Father Tom." Whatever the name or title, Corpus Christians want to meet, to know, and to share in his humanitarian spirit.

To this man of ACTION, we dedicate the 1966 AURORA.

## Scope of Creativity Limitless

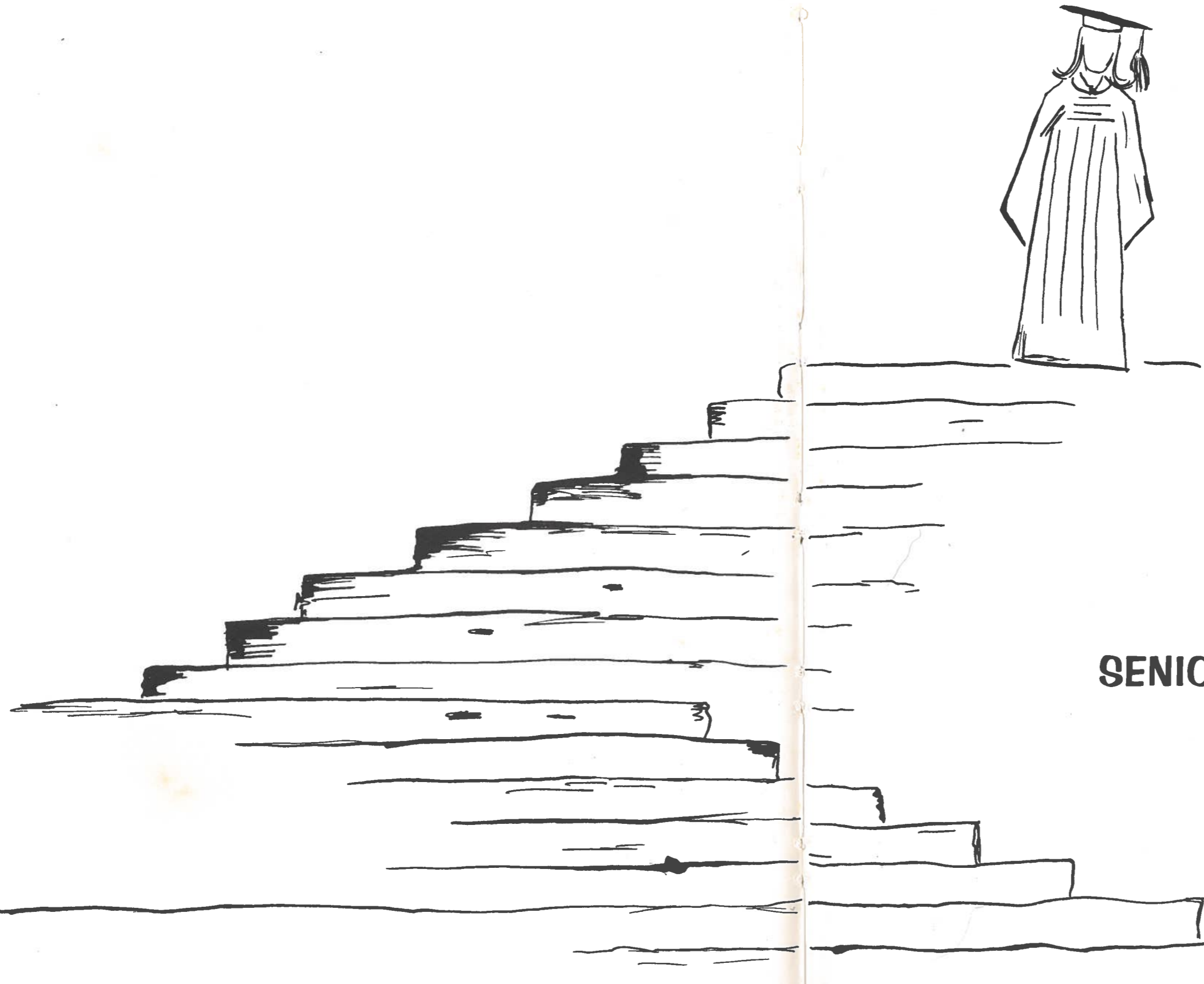

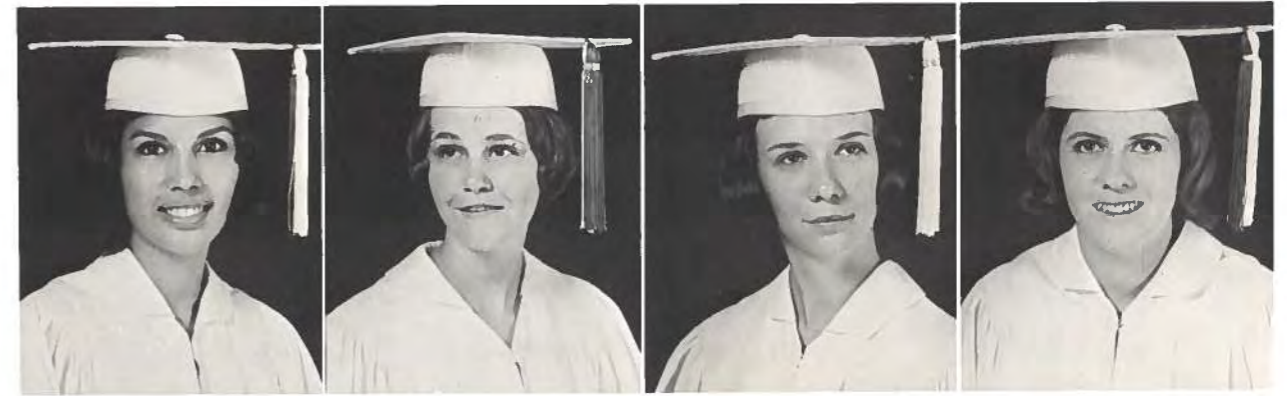

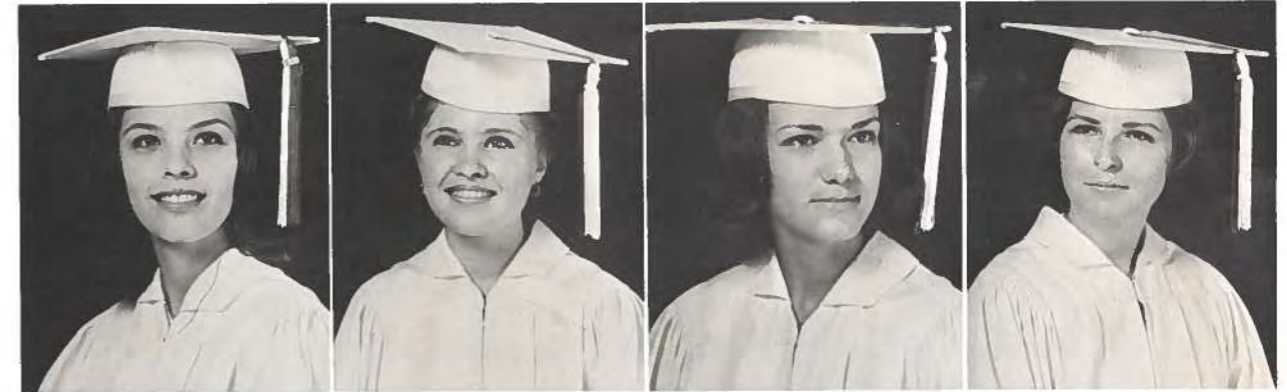

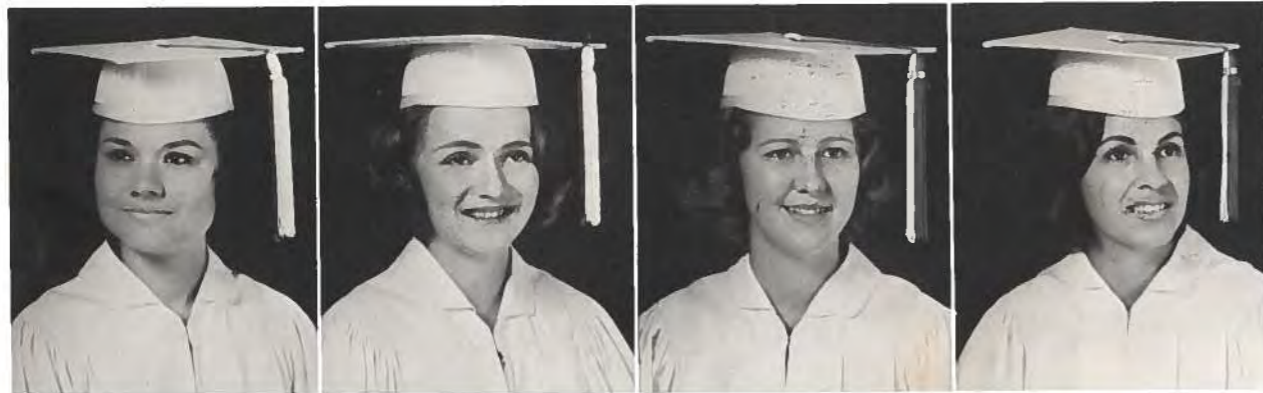

That cool, cool, green water invites "teens".



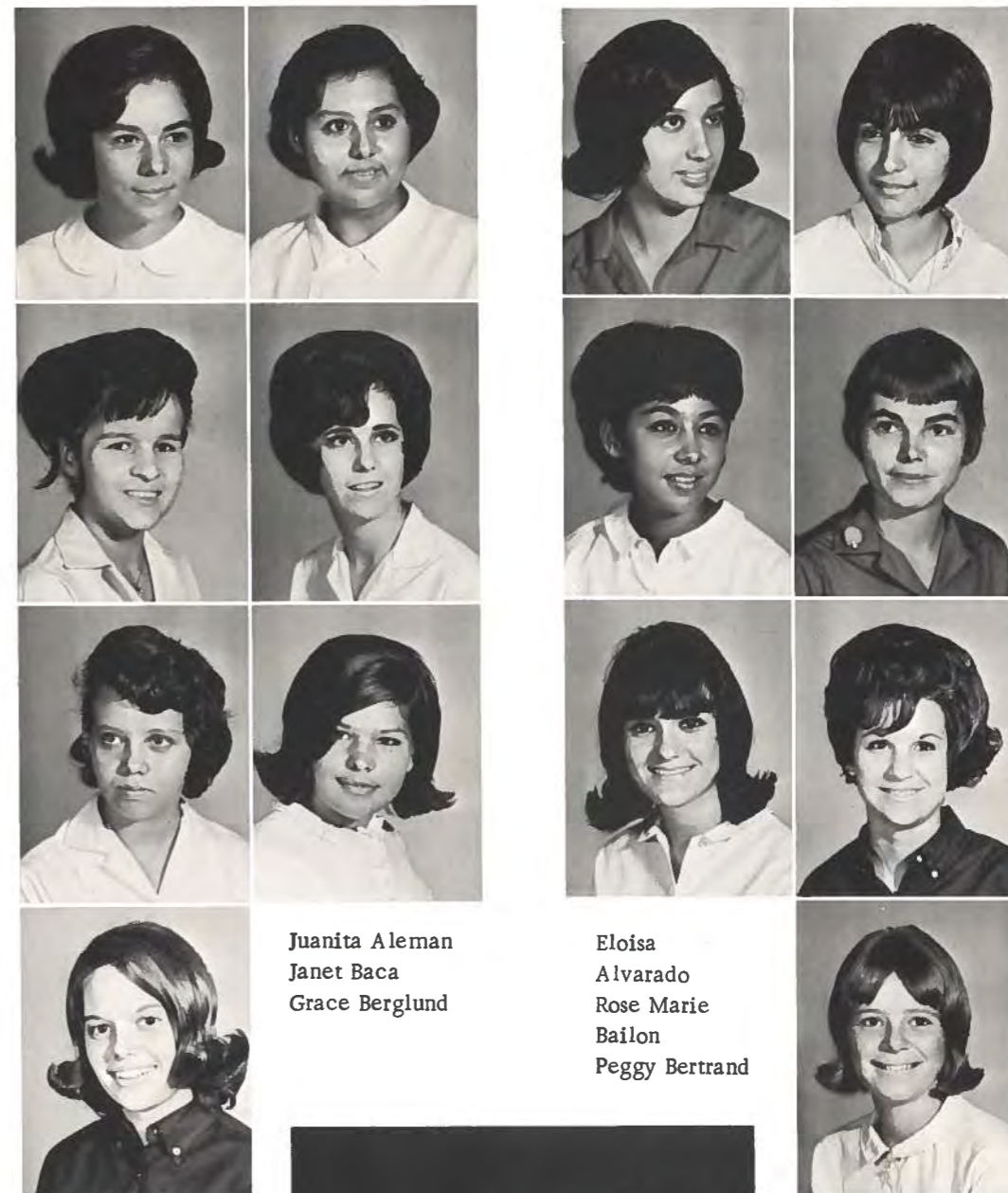

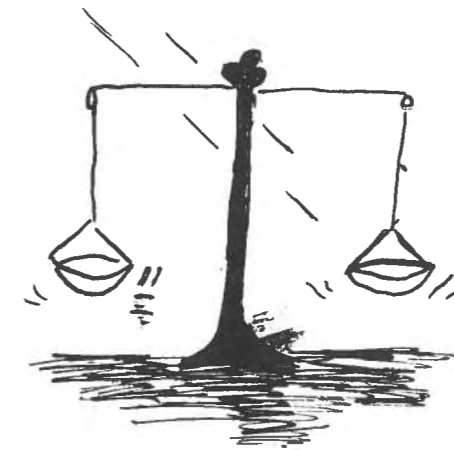

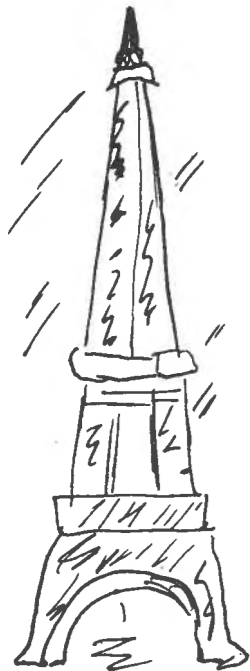

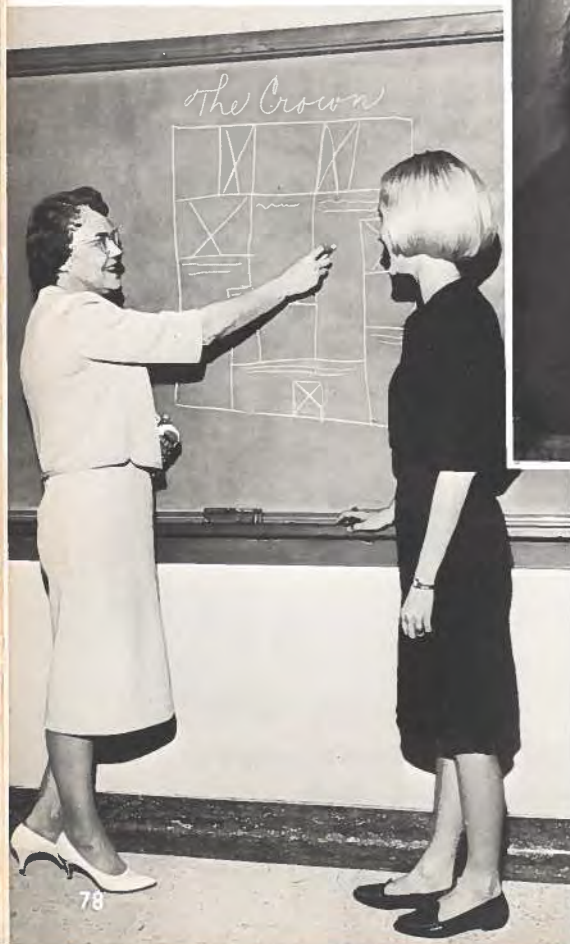
