

MYTH: All the languages in the world are of equal difficulty.

REALITY: Although many languages are very similar, each one has a different level of difficulty. Depending on what your native tongue is, a language can be hard for some, while at the same time be easy for others. A person who has grown up speaking Spanish all his or her life will find it easy to learn a language like Italian. Some languages are more difficult than others. It is important to start early and be committed to sticking with it long-term.

How Your Child Can Save \$4000 by taking Dual Credit French 4

The World Language Department is excited about the addition of Dual Credit French 4 to our offerings. Since our French curriculum aligns with that of UW-Green Bay's French program, we are able to offer students in French 4 high school credit and college credit at the same time. Here is how it works.

At the start of the school year, all students in French 4 have the option to either take French 4 for just one (1) high school credit or high school credit AND three (3) college credits. The college credits align with French 202, a fourth semester French course at UW-Green Bay. If students select dual credit, they enter into agreement with UW-Green Bay for French 202 and pay the course tuition of \$300. A typical credit costs \$328 but we are offered a reduction of \$100 per credit. If at the end of the school year, the student has earned an A or A/B combination, they will be awarded 3 credits PLUS 11 retro-active credits!

That's right – a total of 14 college credits for \$300!

Students who earn a B or B/C in the course will still be able to earn a total of 8 college credits. Credits earned will appear that summer on the student's UW-Green Bay college transcript. Those credits can transfer to other institutions of higher learning. We use the side, transferology.com to verify which universities across the country accept transfer credits from the UW system.

Currently there are 29 students enrolled in Dual Credit. If each student earns an A or A/B, they will earn 406 college credits with a potential savings of **\$92,000**. Those credits can be applied towards university graduation requirements!

2023-2024 Full-Time Open Enrollment Regular Application Period for Wisconsin Public Schools

INFORMATION FOR PARENTS

YOU MAY APPLY FOR OPEN ENROLLMENT FROM FEBRUARY 6 - APRIL 28, 2023.

What is Public School Open Enrollment?

Wisconsin's public school open enrollment program allows parents to apply for their children to attend a school district other than the one in which they live. Applications may be submitted to up to three nonresident school districts if the pupil wishes to attend a brick and mortar school. There are no limitations to the number of open enrollment applications that can be submitted to a virtual charter school.

How and when may parents apply?

The open enrollment regular application period for the 2023-24 school year is from February 6-April 28, 2023. The application period closes at 4:00 p.m. on April 28, 2023. Late applications will not be accepted for any reason.

Parents may apply online at https://dpi.wi.gov/oe.

Can I apply to a virtual charter school under open enrollment?

A pupil may only open enroll to an online/virtual school if: (1) the school has been created as a virtual charter school that meets the requirements of the charter school law [Wis. Stats. 118.40 (8)] or (2) the pupil is required to physically attend school on a regular basis in a school located in the nonresident school district on the days that school is in session. Other important things to know about applying to virtual charter schools:

- A virtual charter school is not homeschooling. Pupils attending virtual charter schools are public school pupils.
- You must know the nonresident school district in which the virtual charter school is located.
- You must know your resident school district to apply.
- A list of virtual charter schools may be found at https://dpi.wi.gov/parental-education-options/charter-schools/virtual-charter-schools.

Can parents appeal if an application is denied?

Parents whose applications are denied may appeal to the DPI within 30 days of the denial. State law requires the DPI to uphold the school district's decision unless DPI finds that the decision was arbitrary or unreasonable. The DPI's decision may be appealed to circuit court.

Who may participate in open enrollment?

Pupils in kindergarten to grade 12 may apply to participate in open enrollment.

Open enrollment for prekindergarten, four-year-old kindergarten and early childhood education is limited. Parents should call their resident school districts to find out if their preschool-aged children qualify for open enrollment.

Can an application be rejected?

Nonresident school districts may deny an application if regular or special education space is not available for the pupil; special education or related services are not available; or if the pupil has been referred for a special education evaluation but has not yet been evaluated. Nonresident school districts may also deny an application if the pupil has been expelled during the current or preceding two years for certain violent conduct or if the pupil was habitually truant from the nonresident school district during any semester in the current or previous school year.

If there are more applications than spaces, pupils must be selected randomly, after giving preference to pupils already attending school in the nonresident school district and siblings of currently-attending pupils.

Some school districts establish waiting lists to fill unused spaces, but others do not.

Can a resident district prevent a pupil from leaving?

A resident district can deny a pupil's application for an invalid application (early or late application or missing information), ineligibility due to age (too young or too old), or if the resident district does not offer the same type of prekindergarten, four-year-old kindergarten, or early childhood program as the nonresident district or the pupil is not eligible for the program in the resident district. These are also reasons that a nonresident district can deny an application.

Must pupils reapply every year?

Once a pupil is accepted into a nonresident school district, the pupil may continue to attend that district without reapplication except that:

- The nonresident district may require a pupil to reapply one time at the beginning of middle school, junior high or high school.
- A pupil may be returned to the resident school district if the special education required in a new or revised IEP is not available in the nonresident district or there is no space.
- A pupil who has become habitually truant in the nonresident district may be returned to the resident district.

Is there a cost for parents to participate in the open enrollment program?

There is no tuition cost to parents for participation in open enrollment. Parents of open enrolled pupils may be charged the same fees as resident pupils.

Who is responsible for transportation?

Parents are responsible for transporting their children to and from school.

If transportation is required in the IEP for a child with a disability, it must be provided by the nonresident district.

School districts may provide transportation to open enrollment pupils if they wish. Usually, if transportation is provided, parents must transport the pupil to a location in the nonresident district.

Low-income parents may apply to the DPI at the end of the school year for partial reimbursement of their transportation costs.



Can a parent select a specific school in the pupil's nonresident school district?

Yes. A parent may request a specific school or program in the nonresident district. However, assignment to the requested school or program is not guaranteed and your pupil may be assigned to a different school other than the one requested. It is up to each nonresident district to determine a pupil's school assignment.

Can an open enrolled pupil participate in sports and other extra-curricular activities in the nonresident school district?

Open enrolled pupils have the same rights and responsibilities as resident pupils.

Inter-scholastic athletics are governed by the Wisconsin Interscholastic Athletic Association (WIAA), which has rules concerning transfer pupils. Parents should check with the school district's athletic director about eligibility.

IMPORTANT OPEN ENROLLMENT DATES

February 6 - April 28, 2023

Parents must submit applications online or directly to the nonresident school district.

June 9, 2023

Nonresident school districts must send notices of approval or denial via US mail or email. If the application is approved, the school district must notify the parents of the specific school or program to which the pupil is assigned. If the application is denied, parents have 30 days to file an appeal.

June 16, 2023

Resident districts must notify applicants if the application is denied. If the application is denied, parents have 30 days to file an appeal.

June 30, 2023


Parents of accepted applicants must notify the nonresident district if the pupil will attend the nonresident district in the 2023-24 school year. If the parent fails to make this notification, the nonresident district may refuse to allow the pupil to attend the district.

ACT Updates

The University of Wisconsin System has suspended the ACT requirement for all UW colleges and universities **for the classes of 2023, 2024, and 2025**. Many other colleges have also waived the ACT requirement for the foreseeable future. A strong ACT score can still help with admission to college and scholarship placement. Since most schools are now "test optional", students can choose not to use a score if they are not pleased with it. Students will choose if they wish to include their ACT scores as part of their application. Visit the websites of your colleges for more information.



It's Financial Aid Time!

FAFSA: To apply for financial aid, the Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA) must be filled out online. Be sure to register for a FSA ID # at https://fsaid.ed.gov/npas/ BEFORE filling out the FAFSA form! Contact your college to find out their campus-specific financial aid priority deadline. UW system schools have priority deadlines ranging from now through February 1. Find more information about earning money for college on the "Paying for College" link on the Student Services website. **FSA ID:** Seniors and their parents BOTH need to create a FSA ID to be able to complete and submit their financial aid application. Many colleges and universities will be closing their admissions process in the coming months. Technical college programs, especially, fill quickly on a first come first serve basis. Seniors considering applying to college for the fall of 2023, but who still need help with the process, should stop in to see their counselor today!

Seniors & Juniors - Western Career Coach Meetings

Our Western Technical College Career Coach will be available once a month in the Student Services Office, to meet with students about WTC options, application process, requirements, and more. The next opportunity to meet with the WTC Career Coach at OHS is on Tuesday, April 11, 2023. The WTC rep will also be at OHS on May 9, to assist students with registering for classes for the fall 2023 semester.



Changing Courses in the Senior Year?

College admissions offices often get phone calls from students who want to change their senior year courses. Often these phone calls come after the student has been admitted. They tend to sound something like this.

- "I've already been admitted, so I'd like to drop my math class."
- "I don't want to work so hard my senior year anymore. I will be working hard in college, and I'd like a break."
- "They admitted me. Can they really reverse that?"
- "Admission is like a contract, right?"

The resulting conversations are sometimes difficult for a senior to hear. They tend to go like this:

Your admission was based on the premise that you successfully completed the courses that were included on your application for admission. The admission office is counting on you to complete those courses, learn that material, and maintain good academic status. They admit the type of students they know will be successful at their campus, and they admitted you in part because of the courses you were going to complete your senior year.

If you wish to make a change to your senior year courses during or after the admission process, it is imperative that you contact the admission office first. Talk about your plans with them. If you have been admitted already, you should seek approval from the admission office to change your senior year schedule. If you haven't been admitted yet, ask them whether your anticipated course change may affect your admission decision.

Each summer, admission offices compare final high school transcripts to the senior year courses they assumed each student was going to complete. Also each summer, admission offices have the horrible job of rescinding admission to students who changed their senior year schedule and no longer meet the conditions on which the admission was based. That hurts everyone involved.

Yes, admission is like a contract. The admission office needs to uphold part of that contract by reserving space for the student and preparing for the student to attend. And the student needs to uphold the other part by finishing out the academic year as expected.

Upward Bound Available to OHS Students

UW La Crosse provides a unique and FREE opportunity for our students to prepare for higher education. Upward Bound provides tutoring, college visits, advising and a summer program to assist students in college preparation. Students participating in the summer program can earn one high school credit from the experience.

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Juniors - It's Time to Schedule Campus Visits

While it's important to meet with admissions counselors and take the official campus tour, it's also helpful to take your own personal tour. Pick up a campus newspaper to see what's important to students and soak in the environment. If you don't feel like the school is a good fit, it may be a difficult place for you to find success. Register to Retake the ACT

If you are interested in retaking the ACT, please register at ACT.org. The following are tips to help students complete the registration process:

- Students go to ACT.org to create an account, register and pay for the ACT test
- To "Create a New Account" answer the following questions this way:
 - Answer NO to "Have you registered for the ACT before?"
 - Answer YES to "Have you tested before?"
- Find your ACT ID# on the top of your ACT score sheet
- Plan to register at least a month in advance of the test date to avoid late fees!
- Decide if you want to take the writing test or not. Most schools do NOT require the writing test. Remember, all juniors will take the writing test at OHS in the spring.
- Give yourself at least 45 minutes to complete the registration
- Decide which 4 colleges/universities you want FREE score reports sent to. It's better and easier to do this now to avoid extra steps later.
- Be prepared to upload a clear headshot photo to the website. Students without a picture are NOT allowed to test!
- Fee waivers are available for students who qualify see your school counselor if you need one.
- Print your admission ticket, and keep it somewhere safe you will need it to be admitted to your testing room.

Eligible for Free or Reduced Lunch?

Any student who has participated in, or has younger siblings who have participated in the free or reduced lunch program should reapply each year, **even if they do not eat in the school cafeteria.** Many opportunities are available to students participating in this program such as fee waivers for tests, like the ACT, and scholarship/grant programs. OHS Counselors often confidentially inform students of these opportunities, but only know who is eligible based on this program.

Applications for the School District of Onalaska's Free and Reduced Lunch Program are available in the main office or online. Names of students participating in this program are kept confidential.



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

Recipe of the month

Garden Salad with Homemade Ranch Dressing

Serves 12

Ingredients:

- 8 cups romaine Lettuce (or other favorite lettuce) washed, dried and torn into bite sized pieces
- 2 cups raw vegetables, like carrots, bell peppers, mushrooms, red cabbage and sliced onion diced or sliced into small pieces
- 1 cup light mayonnaise
- 1 cup buttermilk
- 1 Tablespoon dried parsley
- ½ teaspoon garlic powder
- ½ teaspoon onion powder
- ¼ teaspoon salt
- ¼ teaspoon pepper
