# SHOVEL READY PROJECTS

The district's Shovel Ready Committee has been working for the past 10 months in preparation for the bond passage. Out of the twelve construction projects, six projects are ready for contractors to bid on at the following sites: Bridges Community School, Roosevelt Elementary, Washington Elementary, Eagle Lake Elementary, Center for Learning and Dakota Meadows Middle School.

What is "Shovel Ready?" Shovel Ready means the construction drawings, project specifications, and bidding documents are completed. The district will start the building permit and bidding processes in November and December of 2023, award contracts in January and February of 2024 so materials can be ordered, and construction could start as soon as March at several of the sites.



Dakota Meadows Middle School is one of 6 "shovel ready" sites. The plans for the secure entrance, special education classrooms, new pool and auxiliary gym/storm shelter are completed, allowing the district to host a pre-bid walk-through with contractors in early December and award contracts in January. Weather permitting, work is planned to start as early as March.





Sites receiving secure entrances will have small additions added to their updated main entrances. Washington Elementary, shown below, is one example of a building that will have their office space bumped out allowing their entrance to be secure. This bump out and extension will allow for more student support services space in the building.





# MAPS - HOPE SQUAD

## What is Hope Squad?

Hope Squad is a program that focuses on peer-to-peer intervention to help prevent youth suicide. Hope Squad is made up of students who are nominated by their peers because they are good listeners, easy to talk with, and people who are able to bring a struggling peer to a trusted adult. Over the course of the school year, Hope Squad leaders will learn skills and lessons to help build a community, but more importantly, build their school community. "Hope Week" is also being planned by leaders and will bring awareness and activities to buildings continuing to bring focus to suicide and suicide prevention. Why Hope Squad?

Students are still going to talk about things surrounding youth suicide, so why not give our Hope Squad leaders the tools and resources to help their peers when they need it most.
