HB251

HB251 Laurens County School-to-School Transfer Requests. The Laurens County Board of Education, in compliance with House Bill 251 (HB251), has developed a process giving Laurens County parents/guardians the option to request that their children attend any Laurens County school in the system, based on space availability. In accordance with the law, Laurens County has developed a process for parents to exercise the school transfer option and a process to determine space availability. Fraud, Waste, Abuse and Corruption

Complaint Procedure

Any individual, organization, or agency (complainant) may file a complaint with the Laurens County BUE if that individual, organization, or agency believes and alleges that the LCBUE, GA Dept. of Ed., or any agency or consortum of agencies is violating a federal statute or regulation that applies to a program under Title I, Part A of the Elementary and Secondary Education Act of 1985 (ESSA). The complaint must allege a violation that occurred not more than one year prior to the date that the complaint is received, unless a longer period is reasonable because the violation is considered systemic or ongoing.

As part of its assurances within the ESSA program grant application and pursuant to Section 9306 within the Title I, Part A of the ESSA the laurens County 806 has adopted and posted local written procedures for the receipt and resolution of complaints alleging violations of law in the administration of covered federal programs.
