





- I. District issued credit cards shall be used prudently and <u>only</u> for official school business. Credit cards are District property.
- II. The Superintendent shall be issued a District credit cards. In limited circumstances, the Superintendent may designate the issuance of a credit card to a user of the credit card other employees or Board of Education Members to assist with their job responsibilities. No individual is authorized to utilize the District credit card without the prior authorization of the Superintendent (Regulation 4600.1).
- III. The District shall establish an annual credit line maximum not to exceed \$25,000.
- IV. Accountability
 - A. Credit card users must submit expense reports (<u>Regulation 4600.2</u>) timely immediately so that expenses incurred on each credit card shall be paid in such a manner as to avoid interest charges. All credit cards are to be stored in a secure manner.
 - B. Any expense paid with the credit card shall be documented by both a vendor receipt, describing in reasonable detail the good or service received, and a credit card receipt. In the case of an online purchase, a confirmation or receipt must be printed at the time of purchase and provided to the Business Office.
- V. Use of the school credit cards signifies acceptance of and adherence to all school policies.
 - A. Unauthorized, <u>unreasonable</u>, or personal use of the credit card <u>will require that</u> the user repay to the District the amount charged in full, and any resulting fees and charges.
 - B. Unauthorized, unreasonable or personal use of the credit card may result in the credit card being revoked and/or disciplinary action up to and including legal action.

- Reporting Periods: you will receive your child's report card in December, March, and June. Parent-Teacher conferences are held in December. Please refer to the district calendar for specific dates.

Performance Levels

4: Exceeds the learning standard. Consistently demonstrates а thorough in-depth knowledge and understanding and application of skills extended concepts, and standards. Performance is characterized by self-motivation and ability to apply skills with consistent accuracy and independence and high level of quality.

3: Meets the learning standards. Student performance demonstrates an understanding of the knowledge and skills expected. Student demonstrates consistent application of skill. Student independently applies the standards.

2: Partially meets the learning standards. Student performance demonstrates a partial understanding of knowledge and skills expected. Student is progressing toward understanding; however the skills are not yet mastered. Student needs assistance to use standards.

Dear Faculty and Staff,

I hope that you have been enjoying this beautiful summer with your family and friends As usual, many people have been hard at work in the district during the last eight weeks; interviewing and recommending new staff to the Board, attending trainings, completing curriculum work, attending CSE meetings, finalizing schedules, checking in supplies and textbooks, beginning athletic practices for fall sports, and preparing the buildings and grounds for the new school year. I have enjoyed seeing and talking to some of you as you attended meetings, workshops, Computer Camp, worked in your classrooms, or when you just stopped in to say hello (some of you with your beautiful children in tow!). Thank you for all you do in the summer to set the stage for student success when September comes. Many people have no idea that teachers and staff are still focused on education during the summer months; we know better!

My summer learning included a Leadership Research Institute with area superintendents, and a subsequent workshop with our building principals. Our time together included small and large group discussions about <u>The Coming Jobs War</u>, a book by Jim Clifton, the Chairman of Gallup. The main premise of the book is that everyone hopes for a good job more than anything else in this world; therefore, countries, cities, communities, and schools must focus their efforts on the creation of good jobs as a top priority if the U.S. is to maintain its place as a world leader. Chapter 10 of the book is titled, "K-12 Schools – Where Entrepreneurs are Created." It includes a Gallup student poll that can be used to assess grades 5-12 economic behavioral metric, i.e. their personal levels of hope for their future. I encourage you to explore the book (or at least chapter 10), the student poll, and the general concepts for yourself to see if they resonate for you; they certainly captured my attention. If you are interested in reading <u>The Coming Jobs War</u>, your principals and I each have a copy.

I also spoke with the media multiple times this summer; including The New York Times, The Syracuse Post-Standard, and our own Utica Observer-Dispatch, WKTV, and WUTR on behalf of the Board of Education and school district. The majority of these interviews centered on our high percentage of test refusals, the grades 3-8 New York State assessment results, and the Board's "Resolution to Oppose High Stakes Testing". Our new Commissioner of Education, MaryEllen Elia visited Utica earlier this week and I was asked to take part in a group meeting with her to discuss current educational issues: the Common Core Curriculum, NYS assessments, test refusals, APPR (Annual Professional Performance Review Plan), requests for hardship waivers, the effectiveness of the Special Education inclusionary model, and the impact of the tax cap were some of the topics we covered. I will share more about this meeting at our upcoming Superintendent's Conference Days in a few weeks.

Please see your building principal or immediate supervisor for specific instructions if you are unsure of which meeting(s) you should attend. All faculty and staff will attend the first day; the second day is for faculty only as we will focus on instructional planning and required changes to our Annual Professional Performance Review Plan for teachers and principals. On both mornings, a continental breakfast will be available at 7:30 a.m. and we will start promptly at 8:00 a.m. in the auditorium. Lunch will be provided on both days as well so that we may continue the flow of work and learning throughout both days. Following the completion of our required trainings and organizational meetings on September 2nd and 3rd, school will begin for students on the following Tuesday, September 8th. Have a wonderful Labor Day weekend prior to the big day!

I look forward to seeing you on the morning of Wednesday, September 2nd for our first Superintendent's Conference Day. In the meantime, enjoy the remainder of your summer and feel free to call or e-mail us if you have questions or need additional information prior to the opening of school.







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Total Cohort Results in Secondary-Level U.S. History and Government after Four Years of Instruction


