

Emergency "Go Home" Drill

Dear Parents and Guardians;

On Tuesday, November 24, an Emergency Go Home Drill will be conducted at every school within our Oneida-Herkimer-Madison BOCES area. New York State Education Law requires that we hold this drill each year at least 15 minutes before the normal dismissal time. The purpose of the drill is to prepare students, staff and parents for an emergency that would require us to immediately send all students home. The fastest way to evacuate the building and safely transport students home (or to an alternate safe location) is via our school buses.

You and your child should have a set plan for a safe drop-off within the school district if we need to send all students home in an emergency. Please talk to your child about your plan before Tuesday, November 24 so that there is no confusion on that afternoon. Also, for grades K-6 students, it is important to send a revised "Emergency School Closing Plan" to school if your emergency drop-off location has changed. There will be no parent pick-ups from school during this drill. In a true emergency, parent pick-ups would not be possible in most cases. Below is the schedule for this year's drill:

1:55~p.m. - Grades 7-12 students and staff will evacuate the building. All grades 7-12

students will board buses at that time. No parent pick-ups will be accommodated on November 24. Students scheduled for after-school activities may **remain on their bus** and will be returned to school after the drill concludes.

2:45 p.m. – Grades K-6 students and staff will evacuate the building. All grades K-6 students will board buses at that time. No parent pick-ups will be accommodated on November 24 and there will be **no K-6** YMCA Child Care Program that day.

Thank you for your assistance with our annual Emergency Go Home Drill. We anticipate a smooth and speedy dismissal on Tuesday, November 24. Please feel free to call your child's school office if you have questions or concerns. There will be no school on November 25 – 27 due to the Thanksgiving break. Enjoy your Thanksgiving holiday!

Dear Parents and School Community Members,

Education has certainly been at the forefront of our local, state, and national news media during this past year! I am sure that you have heard or read about the controversy surrounding the New York State Common Core assessments and the high number of test refusals (commonly referred to as "opt outs"). In fact, New York Mills UFSD was referred to numerous times due to our 77% refusal rate on the 2015 grades 3-8 NYS Math and English Language Arts assessments. I am well aware that many school community members are very proud of our test refusal numbers. In fact, some are even now organizing their efforts to increase the test refusal rate to 100% this year. Although I respect parents' right to make choices for their children, I feel compelled to let you know that I do not agree with the decision many of you made to "opt your children out" of the assessments this spring.

Our students will face an extremely challenging job market when they complete their schooling. The Common Core standards and assessments are indeed more difficult than our previous standards, but this is by design. We are asking more of students today in order to prepare them for college, careers, and citizenship in an ever changing, more complex global community than baby boomers faced when we reached adulthood. Although I do not agree with using students' scores on state assessments to evaluate teachers at this increased level of correlation, I do believe that we should test students on the curriculum we teach. I also believe in administering standardized assessments throughout the state in order to ensure that every child receives the same guaranteed curriculum. The only way to be sure that all schools address those same Common Core standards is to administer state assessments to every child in every school. We have been unable to accomplish

this due to test refusals. I know that our students and parents love their teachers, which is why many of you have chosen to refuse the test for your children. You are standing in solidarity with them on this very difficult and emotional issue. I also love our teachers and principals, but the purpose of public education is to prepare all students for their future; and I believe that test refusal does not serve our students well in this regard.

I am asking parents to rethink your position on test refusal this year and instead of "opting your children out" of the state assessments, to encourage them to do their very best on the tests, as well as every other assessment and assignment they encounter at school. That is how we will together prepare them for the challenging, yet exciting future that awaits them. That is how they will get ready for Regents exams, the SAT's, and the rigor of their life's work that awaits them.

Thank you for reading and considering my view on this complex and highly controversial issue. I wish only the best to each of you as we continue to collaborate to provide the best possible education for every child of the New York Mills Union Free School District.

Responsible Use of Social Media

When information becomes available online through oversharing and poor decision making, issues can arise that can impact your child's reputation and safety. With the consequences from texting while driving to cyber bullying, from stolen identities to computer hacking, online information can be gathered oftentimes with dangerous and life changing consequences.

However, we may not be fully aware of the impact our online reputation has and how it can potentially affect our plans for the future. College admission officers may view the social media use of prospective applicants when deciding admission or scholarship awards. Recruiters in business may also do the same to screen applicants for potential employment. The importance of effective communication from an early age, in regards to the importance of responsible use of social media, needs to be an on-going conversation.

- Discuss the importance with your child of posting information online that could potentially damage their reputation.
- Encourage empathy and civility with your child when communicating online.
- Periodically inquire about the social media sites your child is using. Ask about how they found out about them and what makes them interesting to them.
- Support the idea of thinking not just before you click, but more importantly thinking before you create.
- Be a role model; avoid venting or complaining in your own posts, especially about people or organizations that may inadvertently view them.
- Discourage oversharing. The world does not need to know where your child is at all times.
- Always secure your profile using passwords of alphanumerical or special characters. Remember to periodically change passwords too!
- Discuss the concept of being a friend both on and off line and highlight the dangers and potential risks of creating "friends" on social media.
- Periodically review your "friends" and delete those you feel may be untrustworthy.
- Understand and educate yourself with the application and importance of privacy settings.
- Discuss the importance of not posting personal information online that could potentially lead to identity theft or open your child up to predators. (i.e., age, birthdate, graduation date, address, driver license number, social security number, school, etc.)
