

A Message from the Superintendent

Dear Community Member,

On May 20, you will be asked to vote on the 2014-2015 New York Mills Union Free School District budget. Our proposed budget for next year is \$13,150,675; which is a 1.96% increase over the 2013-14 budget of \$12,898,455. The 2014-2015 estimated tax levy increase is 2.98%, which is below the allowable tax levy limit of 3.0516% for New York Mills Union Free School District.

Our Board of Education, administrators, faculty, and staff have worked collaboratively to develop a spending plan that addresses the educational needs of our children and respects the school community's financial capacity to support this plan. In addition to fixed increases in health insurance, payroll, and other contractual obligations; we must budget appropriately for the continued implementation of the Regents Reform Agenda. This includes sufficient funding for teacher and administrator professional training and curriculum development; technology platforms and services to support student assessments and teacher/principal evaluation systems; and data management and analysis services through BOCES. In addition, it is necessary that we add certified paraprofessional staff to assist with instruction in our 12:1:1 Special Education classrooms.

We have also reduced district spending by \$142,459 through the following cost-savings: reconfiguration of transportation department supervision, one teacher retirement, reduction of health teacher full-time equivalent due to enrollment, discontinuation of Initial Response Team service, contract with BOCES for part-time school physician services, and reduction in clerical staffing during school vacations.

There are two propositions you will be asked to vote on this year. Proposition 1 includes the 2014-15 budget and a five-year lease of up to \$16,750 per year for one 70-passenger bus as we continue our

long-standing bus leasing cycle. Our Board Transportation Subcommittee and transportation staff are currently taking a second look at leasing versus buying buses for future years; however, leasing has worked well for New York Mills due to our small geographic size and relatively low mileage.

The second proposition is for the establishment of a Capital Reserve Fund for the purpose of minimizing the cost to our taxpayers of future school district renovations and/or construction. We are currently planning a potential project to address repairs, renovations, and safety/security concerns. The Board of Education and district staff continue to work with

our architects to review and revise a preliminary list of project items previously generated by the Buildings & Grounds Committee.

Last, but certainly not least in importance; voters will elect two new Board of Education members for one five-year term each. Four candidates: Mr. David Comenale, Mr. James Fellone, Mr. Jonathan Fiore, and Mr. Steven King are running for two open seats on the New York Mills UFSD Board. We thank Mr. Gary Markowicz and Mrs. Gail Rice for their service as Board members during the last five years and wish them well in their future endeavors. Board membership is certainly a meaningful way to make

a difference in the lives of our school district's children!

Voting on the 2014-2015 New York Mills Union Free School District's proposed school budget, propositions, and Board Member election will take place on Tuesday, May 20, 2014, from noon until 9:00 p.m. at Beekman Gymnasium. Thank you for your continued involvement in our school community and your support for the education of our K-12 students.




Budget (Proposition 1)

To vote upon the adoption of the Budget of the School District for the fiscal year ending June 30, 2015, which will include one(1) five (5) year lease of up to \$16,750 yearly for one (1) 70 passenger bus, for which the required funds shall be appropriated and the necessary real property taxes shall be raised by a tax on taxable property in the District, which will appear as Proposition No. 1 - Budget on the voting machines.


Capital Reserve (Proposition 2)

Resolved that the Board of Education of the New York Mills Union Free School District is hereby authorized to establish a Capital Reserve Fund pursuant to Section 3651 of the Education Law (to be known as the "2014 Building Capital Reserve Fund"), with the purpose of such fund being to finance construction, reconstruction, improvement and equipping of school buildings and facilities; such capital costs being of a type that would be eligible for financing under the local finance law, and costs incidental thereto, the ultimate amount of such fund to be \$1,000,000, plus earnings thereon, the probable term of such fund to be 10 years, but such fund shall continue in existence until liquidated in accordance with the Education Law or until the funds are exhausted, and the sources from which the funds shall be obtained for such Reserve are (i) an initial deposit of \$450,000 to be transferred from the existing Repair Reserve Fund, and (ii) amounts from budgetary appropriations from time to time, and (iii) unappropriated fund balance made available by the Board of Education from time to time, and (iv) New York State Aid received and made available by the Board of Education from time to time, all as permitted by law.

Tax Levy Increase

The tax levy increase for 2014-15 is projected to be 2.98%.

Note: Rates are estimated based on current information available. Final equalization rates will not be set by the State of New York until August. In the two previous years, the final tax on true was actually lower than projected at the time of budget development.

Tax on True

The tax on true value for the district in 2014-15 will be approximately \$22.40.

Absentee Ballots

Absentee Ballots are available. Those interested can apply in person daily from 8:00 a.m. to 4:00 p.m. or by mail. Applications for an absentee ballot must be received by the District Office by May 19, 2014.

Voter Eligibility Requirements

A voter must meet the following eligibility requirements to vote in school elections:

- Be a citizen of the United States.
- Have been a resident of the school district for a minimum of 30 days prior to the vote, including those who rent. Section 2018-C of the Education Law may require all persons who vote to provide one form of identification or proof of residency.
- Be at least 18 years of age.
