In the 2nd Grade Classroom

The 2nd grade team will work with students and their families to . . .

- ◆ Meet in person or virtual and communicate with parents throughout the year.
- ◆ Provide reading level appropriate books for students to read on their own.
- ◆ Monitor student progress with updates to parents through Parent Square, phone calls or e-mails.
- ◆ Make sure each student gets the help he/she needs as soon as it's needed.
- ◆ Send home literacy learning materials.
- ◆ Use a variety of teaching methods in reading to ensure that students of all levels can be reached.
- ◆ Make sure students understand assignments, their purpose, and what they will learn from them.
- ◆ Use support for students to work independently towards their reading goals.

At Home

Hopeville school parents joined staff to develop ideas about how families can support students' reading ability and comprehension.

- ◆ Encourage my child to read everyday.
- ◆ Participate in any workshops (when I am available) that are offered by the school.
- ◆ Ask the teacher how I can help my child throughout the year.
- ◆ Check and maintain student communication folders, Parent Square and planners on a daily basis.
- ◆ Provide my child a quiet homework area (if possible) and show them how to organize.

Students at School and at Home

- ◆ Ask for help from my teacher and family if I am having trouble doing my work.
- ◆ Use my Chrome Book for assignments, do my homework, and turn it in on time.
- ◆ Read on my own and/or with my family every day.
- ◆ Look up words I don't know in the dictionary.
