

I am pleased to announce that on May 18, 2021, the Caledonia-Mumford community approved the proposed 2021-2022 school budget by a vote of 579 to 201 (74.23%). Proposition #2, the purchase of one 63-passenger school bus, passed 605-174 (77.66%) as well as Proposition #3, the purchase of a Driver Education van 666-114 (85.38%).

Lastly, voters elected three board of education members: Incumbent Arnold Rychlicki (436), Jamie Fitch (430) and Michael Balonek (420). Each will serve a three-year term.

I want to thank our community for your continued support and the District will strive to provide an educational program that will continue to be a source of pride for the community.



Four Extraordinary CM Seniors Earn the NYS Seal of Biliteracy

Four Caledonia-Mumford High School Seniors have completed the stringent requirements to earn the New York State Seal of Biliteracy.

In recognition of the increased importance of bilingualism, New York State awards the Seal of Biliteracy. The New York State Seal of Biliteracy (NYSSB) recognizes high school graduates who have attained a high level of proficiency in listening, speaking, reading, and writing in one or more languages, in addition to English.

Congratulations to these Class of 2021 Seniors earning the Biliteracy Seal Carly Cohen Summer Lin Emerson Martelle Sebastian Kresge

"I am very proud of the four students that will be receiving the NYS Seal of Biliteracy upon their graduation, as well as two graduates in 2020 who were the first students to achieve this recognition. This award has not been easy; students had to work very hard in a very difficult year since the majority of the process happened in the spring of 2020 at the start of the pandemic," said Mrs. Romaguera, CM High School Spanish teacher who spearheaded the development of this prestigious program.

Senior Sebastian Kresge will receive his diploma at the June 25, 2021 commencement ceremony. He says this about also having earned the Biliteracy Seal.

"I took on the extra work to earn my Bi-Literacy Seal so that when I graduate my diploma will stand out, as It will show that I am really a bilingual speaker. At home, my family speaks both Spanish and English. I normally speak to my dad, brother, and sister in English, while I speak to my mom in Spanish," Sebastian said.

The goal of the Seal of Biliteracy is to promote the advanced study of languages in high schools and to recognize that our society is diverse and multilingual. The Seal of Biliteracy celebrates the achievements of our multilingual students and prepares them with the 21st century skills that many employers and universities seek. Mrs. Romaguera adds that the program helped change the students' view of the world and the lives and issues of others, as well as the importance of learning a language.

"I'm always looking for ways to build intrinsic motivation in my learners; the concept of a Biliteracy Seal excited me. It is a great incentive for my students to continue their language study beyond the two years most students complete in high school," Mrs. Romaguera commented.

Carly Cohen will graduate from Cal-Mum High School with a NYS Regents Diploma and a Biliteracy Seal.

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"I took on the extra work because I love a challenge and I felt as though if I didn't take all of the (Spanish) courses available, then what was the point of taking them to begin with? I wanted to finish the entire Spanish path that was offered to me. Plus, Mrs. Romaguera is the most supportive teacher in the school and I love working in her classroom," explained Carly.

In addition to English, Cal-Mum High School 2021 graduate Summer Lin speaks her family's native Chinese Mandarin but says she wanted to become fluent in a third language.

"I wanted to earn my Biliteracy Seal because of the job opportunities that it brings and I enjoy learning about new languages and cultures so becoming fluent in Spanish is something I always wanted to achieve. Now I am able to speak three languages: English, Spanish, and Mandarin Chinese. The topic of my culminating project is how global warming is affecting Spanish-speaking countries," Summer commented.

Mrs. Aminta Romaguera began developing the Seal of Biliteracy program here at Caledonia-Mumford in 2019. She created the projects and scoring rubric that fulfills all of the requirements outlined by the NYS Education Department. The Caledonia-Mumford Central School District Biliteracy Committee is comprised of a World Language teacher, an English Language Arts teacher, an English as a Second Language Teacher, a School Counselor and an administrator.

Caledonia-Mumford High School students interested in pursuing the NYS Biliteracy Seal must complete the following requirements: • Maintain a grade point average of 85 or higher in the courses electives Spanish IV and V. (Students must submit examples of their classwork to the Cal-Mum Seal of Biliteracy Committee for review). • Maintain a grade point average of 85 or higher in English classes II and I2 (Students must submit examples of their classwork to the Cal-Mum Seal of Biliteracy Committee for review).

• Present a culminating Spanish project to a panel comprised of CMCS teachers and administrators. Students must speak Spanish throughout their presentation. Present a culminating English project to a panel comprised of CMCS teachers and administrators. Note: Congratulations to 2020 graduates Alice Barefoot and Jada Gerber, the first two Caledonia-Mumford High School graduates to earn the NYS Biliteracy Seal.

Two Graduates Earn Dual Degrees

C ommencement represents the culmination of four years of homework, studying and tests in high school. It is one of the most important and memorable events in a teen's life. Now imagine that at the same time that you receive your high school diploma, you also graduate from college with an Associate Degree. Cal-Mum Seniors Rowan Nothnagle and Abigail Richter earned their Associate Degrees from GCC while in high school at Cal-Mum. They will receive their NYS Regents diplomas from Cal-

Mum High School at commencement on June 25, 2021.

Caledonia-Mumford Central School graduates Abigail Richter and Rowan Nothnagle both completed their college degrees from Genesee Community College while in high school. They officially graduated and received their degrees in Liberal Arts and Natural Science in May 2021, one month before they receive their NYS Regents Diploma from Cal-Mum High School.

Rowan and Abby are two of the three Cal-Mum graduates to complete the Accelerated College Enrollment or ACE program at GCC. Cal-Mum Class of 2019 graduate Brendan Gardner was the first Cal-Mum High School student to graduate the ACE program.

Rowan and Abby joined hundreds of students from surrounding schools who took a test in sixth grade to determine their eligibility for the ACE Program. The top scoring 50 students were offered entrance into the program.

Online classes started for them in seventh grade and they were also on the GCC campus at least one time per week, after their school day ended at CMCS. Once they entered their freshman year of high school, Abby and Rowan were spending for hours one night per week at GCC and then coming home to complete homework assignments from their Cal-Mum High School classes. Weekends for Rowan and Abby were spent doing homework for both their ACE and Cal-Mum classes. While other high school students were enjoying summer vacation, these students were taking college classes.

"I almost quit a few times in my middle school years of this program but I stuck with it because I saw the end. I saw myself in my senior year walking at graduation and getting my Associate Degree after six long, hard years of work," Rowan commented.

Abby said the extra workload of college classes in addition to the homework and projects from her Cal-Mum course load made it a challenging six years. Abby continued to be involved in numerous extracurricular activities and sports at Cal-Mum High School.

"This was a significantly cheaper way to earn college credit than if I were to wait until I was in college. Since I am attending the University at Albany, all of my credits will transfer and I will be able to graduate with a Bachelor's Degree in two years if I want to," Abby said.

The Covid-19 pandemic forced GCC to move all of its classes online. For Abby and Rowan, this meant they would spend several hours a day online attending their high school classes over Zoom and later in the day, completing their college assignments online as well.

As their goal of earning a college degree while in high school has been achieved, both Abby and Rowan say they are proud of their accomplishment.

"I was not scoring a touchdown on Friday nights or making three-points on the court; I was working towards an Associate Degree and representing Caledonia-Mumford as a school with brilliant students. I represented Cal-Mum throughout this program with pride and I feel like I made the school proud by working hard and showing just how smart our students at Cal-Mum are," Rowan said.



The presentation of the distinguished Robert C. Freeman Citizenship Award comes with great pride for the Caledonia-Mumford Central School District.

The recipient of the 2021 Robert C. Freeman Citizenship Award is Emma Efing. Congratulations Emma. Your name is among many other outstanding Red Raiders who have carried on the ideals of leadership and good citizenship in their careers and in their communities.

The award is given to a member of the Senior class who exemplifies outstanding citizenship. The award honors the late Mr. Robert C. Freeman, who spent the majority of his life here at CMCS, as an outstanding and well respected student, athlete, teacher, guidance counselor and coach, both within the walls of Cal-Mum School and in the community. He placed a great deal of emphasis on good citizenship and his leadership was an inspiration to all who worked with him, studied under him or knew him.

Mr. Freeman entered Caledonia Elementary School as a student in 1918. In high school he played Caledonia High School football from 1929 – 1932. In his sophomore year, Mr. Freeman played on the infamous and historic 1929 football team whose season record was 9-0 and whom no opponent had scored upon.

After graduation from Caledonia High School in 1932, Mr. Freeman attended and graduated from Niagara University. Mr. Freeman returned to

his beloved alma mater to teach history in the newly opened Caledonia High School building, located at 99 North Street.

His career was cut short by his three year service in the U.S. military at the start of WWII. He returned to Caledonia High School to resume

teaching history and also went on to assume the role of guidance counselor. Mr. Freeman became the head varsity football coach for the newly centralized Caledonia-Mumford Central School. He coached the team for 10 years before becoming principal of the junior-senior high school.

Students, faculty and the community held deep respect for Mr. Freeman for his firmness and fairness, realizing his motivation was the wellbeing of the students and the school. He was admired as a great man, a great coach, a great American and above all else – a truly great Red Raider.

Your character and commitment to citizenship have earned you a place next to so many before you who strived to make Cal-Mum great. 
