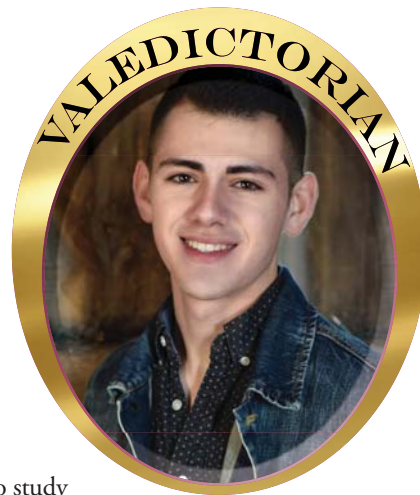
Valedictorian Cooper Cohen

Joseph Butler is the 2018 Salutatorian. His successful high school career is highlighted by a variety of challenging academic courses and participation in athletics and music.

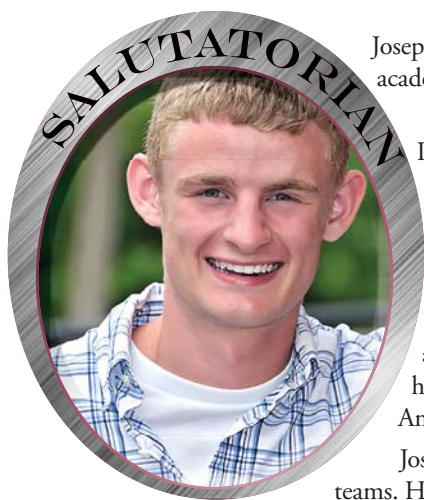

A Message from Superintendent Robert Molisani

Caledonia-Mumford Central School Mission

The Caledonia-Mumford Central School District, in collaboration with our community, takes pride in providing safe, comprehensive and rigorous educational experiences, in order for all students to graduate as ethical, responsible, life-long learners, who are college and career ready.

Caledonia-Mumford Capital Project 2019



Our District has a strong history of providing quality programs and facilities for our children. On September 18th of this year the Caledonia-Mumford Central School District residents will be voting on a **no additional tax impact** capital improvement project. The project is another step toward enhancing our buildings and programs for current and future students by focusing on health and safety improvements and the replacement of aging infrastructure items. The goal is to protect investments already made by our community as well as to prepare our facilities to meet future needs in a fiscally responsible way.

The Board of Education has been working towards creating a project that addresses the District's current needs while simultaneously being good stewards of the district's money. The outcome thus far is a robust project encompassing many different facility and program updates. The project will focus on critical issues that require immediate attention, including partial roof replacement at the Elementary and Middle/High Schools. The auditorium will also see upgrades to the sound, lighting and rigging systems and the Elementary School gymnasium will receive new bleachers and the refinishing of the gym floor. Other project highlights are scheduled for the Hamilton Field Athletic Complex, including increased drainage, the installation of a shock pad, synthetic turf replacement and track resurfacing.

The \$3.6 million capital project is not expected to require additional taxes on the part of our community. There will be two community meetings held in the coming weeks. These meetings will include a presentation of the details of the proposed project with a question and answer session to follow. We encourage all district residents to attend the informational presentation to learn the specifics of this proposed capital project and what it can do for our community. We believe you will find that the proposed project will only improve the Caledonia-Mumford Central School District and positively impact our community as a whole.

Engineering Design Students Present their Capstone Projects

Students in Mr. Andrew Spencer's and Mr. James Wolbert's Engineering Design and Development class presented their capstone projects to a panel of engineering specialists on June 5, 2018.

The students worked in teams to design a product of their choice. Matthew Zehler and Bryon Carroll developed The Clog Stopper, a device that unclogs the chute of a snowblower. Joseph DiStefano and BreAnna Putney developed The Battery Buddy, which warms a battery during and prior to use and results in extended battery life. Tanner Nothnagle and Ryan Pelkey developed Smart Shopper, a collapsible tri-wheeled cart that can neatly hold multiple shopping bags. Jason Bundschuh, Ian Lenhardt and Kyle Raniewicz developed Fan Friend, a system that can be attached to a computer to catch dust and particles before they are captured by the fan filter.

A panel of engineers critiqued each product presentation and provided valuable feedback to the students. The panel included Kelly Robbins, Continuous Improvement Engineer at Coopervision, Inc.; Michael Scholl, Sr. Fabrication Manufacturing Engineering Manager at Delhi Corporation; Jamie Wolbert, Architectural Designer and Project Manager at Mitchell Design & Build; Spencer Read, Vice-President and Senior Project Manager at Mitchell Design & Build and Michael Benedict, Vice-President of Operations at Air Systems Balancing and Testing, Inc.

Engineering Design and Development is part of the Project Lead the Way series of pre-engineering courses through Rochester Institute of Technology.

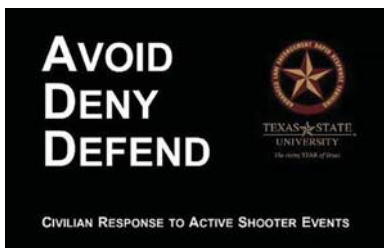

Staff Receives Active Shooter Training



As part of the district's safety plan, Caledonia-Mumford teachers, staff and administrators attended an emergency response training workshop on May 11, 2018 that was conducted by the Livingston County Sheriff's Office. The training, entitled, Civilian Response to Active Shooter Events, or CRASE, is part of the Advanced Law Enforcement Rapid Response Training, or ALERRT, developed by Texas State University in 2002.

Livingston County Sheriff Sergeant Aaron Galvin instructed the CRASE training at CMCS. Galvin explained that although the training title says active shooter, the strategies presented in the training could be applied to any emergency situation.

The CRASE emergency response program uses the Avoid, Deny, Defend concept, which provides strategies, guidance and a proven plan for a person's best chances of surviving an active shooter event.

Galvin explained to the staff attending the training what it means to Avoid, Deny and Defend oneself in an active shooter event. Avoid simply means that if at all possible, avoid coming into contact with the shooter by having a predetermined exit plan in mind from any room or situation you are in. If you are unable to avoid the active shooter, then deny the shooter access to yourself and or your location by barricading yourself inside a room – place barriers between the shooter and yourself. If you cannot avoid the shooter nor deny the shooter access to yourself, then defend yourself – have a plan of action to aggressively fight back your attacker.

The CRASE training is part of the district's overall safety plan, which also includes various drills that occur during the regular school day.

Senior Autumn Jeffery Earns Girl Scouts Highest Honor – the Gold Award



Senior Autumn Jeffery has earned Girl Scouts highest honor, the Gold Award. Autumn was the only Girl Scout in Livingston County to achieve the honor for this year.

"I truly believe that scouting has made me a well-rounded individual with a good heart," Autumn commented.

Autumn's project to fulfill the requirements of the Gold Award was her construction of two little free libraries, which were placed in the communities of York and Cal-Mum. Little libraries are wooden outdoor enclosed shelves that contain donated books. They are placed in areas where children can easily access the books for reading. Autumn said she chose this project because of her own love of reading.

The Gold Award is the highest achievement within the Girl Scouts of the USA, earned by Senior and Ambassador Girl Scouts. Only 5.4 percent of eligible Girl Scouts successfully earn the Gold Award.

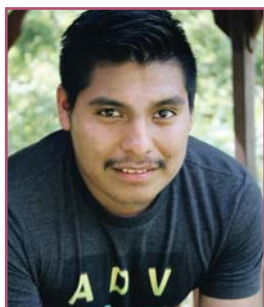

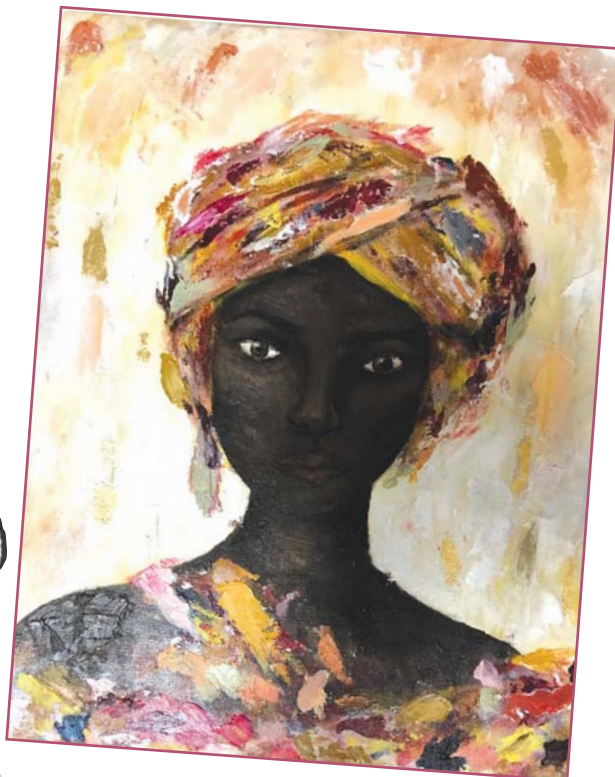

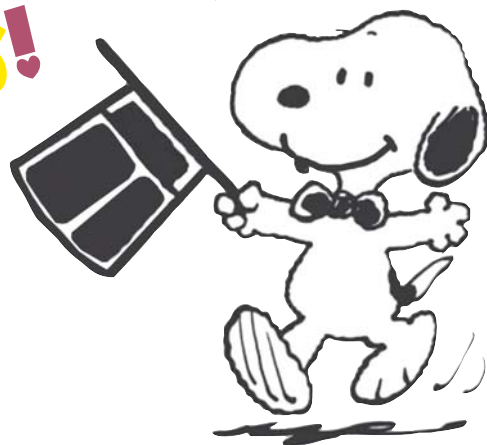

Girls on the Run is so much FUN! We are wrapping up our second season of Girls on the Run (GOTR) here at Caledonia Mumford Elementary school and we have had a wonderful time. If you are not familiar with Girls on the Run, we inspire girls to be joyful, healthy and confident

using a fun, experience-based curriculum which creatively integrates running. Over a period of 10 weeks, girls in the third through fifth grade participate in a twice weekly program like no other. Designed to allow every girl to recognize her inner strength, the Girls on the Run curriculum inspires girls to define their lives on their own terms. Throughout the season, the girls make new friends, build their confidence and celebrate all that makes them unique. And, finally, the girls explore how they can positively connect with and shape the world.

Each season the girls utilize their connections through the communities they are a part of and choose a part of that community to serve in what we call a community impact project. The spring 2018 season required a lot of compromise but the girls chose to have a yard sale to raise money for the local fire departments and donate any unsold items to two local churches. They collectively raised \$350 to be split evenly between Caledonia and Mumford Fire Departments, and had a couple car loads of clothes, toys and books to donate to our local community!

Our season commenced on June 10 with a 5K fun run at MCC; completing a 5K gives the girls a tangible sense of achievement as well as a framework for setting and achieving life goals.

What Memorial Day Mean to Me

Valor, duty, honor. These words echo within each of us when we think of Memorial Day. We remember loved ones and community members that gave us everything they had by laying down their lives in foreign countries for people that they had never met, or never would have met. Their sacrifice was given because they believed in this country and all that it stands for; the least we can do is honor their bravery and heroism by remembering them, that their names might live on after their time on this Earth is done.

I have too often heard from my friends that when they think of Memorial Day, all they can call to mind are picnics, days free from school, and feeling obligated to watch the parade and subsequent ceremony. Yes, the parade can seem long (I march in it every year), and yes, the speeches may seem dry, but there is another layer to this day. Few of us can imagine what it feels like to march in a hostile country, not knowing if we walk through a village of friends or a trap laid by enemies. None of us know the feeling that comes with the realization that we are dying, that friends and loved ones will need to carry on without us. Then, amazingly, those brave soldiers are elevated beyond the level of our imaginations.

In his Gettysburg Address, President Lincoln stated that on that battlefield, "The brave men, living and dead, who struggled here, have consecrated it, far above our poor power to add or detract." His words still ring true, but they miss a vital aspect of the whole truth. The soldiers who give up their lives do not only hallow the ground on which they fought, but they also hallow their names, for those who remember them will pass on their stories and deeds to future generations and they are recognized as the heroes they were.

My personal memories of Memorial Day are things that we all likely have in common. Relaxing with loved ones, being outside in the fresh air, enjoying the first inklings of summer.

What is often forgotten in the memories is that all of this is possible because of those who sacrificed their happiness and time with their family for us to be safe. Though the vast majority of soldiers never know us personally, they still give up their lives for us. I can only guess at why they do this, but if I were forced to give voice to my hypothesis, I would say that it is because they believed in the ideals for which the United States stand. "Freedom and justice for all" is possibly the most compelling promise made by this country. It is the promise of a decent life for families; the possibility for children to grow up and become not only great, but good. I believe that the second purpose of Memorial Day is to remind us of why our fallen fell. They fell to preserve our ability to live and grow under the values of this country.

These basics of Memorial Day no longer seem so basic; everywhere, people forget why it exists and those brave soldiers we now remember. We must strive to preserve within ourselves the memories of our honored dead as well as the reason for their sacrifice. I know that everyone here knows what Memorial Day is and what it means, but will your children or grandchildren really understand? It is our duty to convey our understanding to them.
