Celebrating a Successful Start to the School Year


With the first two months of school now complete, I can say with confidence that both students and staff are off to a great start. Students are engaged and experiencing rigorous, intentional and thoughtful coursework, fall sport teams had a great season and our faculty and staff have been working tirelessly on behalf of students.

I am happy to report that we experienced an influx of new students to the district as we started the school year. Originally, we projected 785 students would enter our doors on September 6, 2017. Instead we had 816 students. Students and staff started the new school year with the typical jitters but have settled in nicely.

I am pleased to announce that we have hired several new employees. Andrew Spencer, Class of 2008, has been hired as our high school technology teacher. Theresa Schoff, eighth grade ELA teacher, has joined us from Letchworth C.S.D. Kayleigh Wheeler will teach high school math while Ms. DiTucci remains on her maternity leave. Laura Ward was hired as a part-time

middle school ELA teacher and Lindsay Canon was hired as a part-time high school social studies teacher. Lastly, Dr. Rebekah Chenaille is our new high school principal. Please join me in welcoming our new staff to our Caledonia-Mumford Educational Family.

The Caledonia-Mumford Central School District will develop a comprehensive strategic school improvement plan during the 2017-18 school year. A strategic plan will assist the District in fundamental decisions and actions that shape and guide our district for the next five years. We have contracted with the Warner School of Education at the University of Rochester to facilitate the development of the plan. It is critical that we have a cross-section of the various stakeholder groups to be represented in this very important work. At this time I am looking for two or three community members and parents to serve on the Planning Council. Team Rubicon unites the skills and experiences of military veterans with first responders to rapidly deploy emergency response teams. They are also in Puerto Rico assisting those affected by the hurricane.



Revised Learning Standards & Reduced Assessment Days

Updates from New York State Department of Education, Michele Meyer, Director of Curriculum and Instruction

Our 2017-2018 school year has started with some approvals and adoptions from the New York State Department of Education.

In September, the Board of Regents approved new New York State Learning Standards for the Arts. The Standards for the Arts continue to include dance, music, theatre, visual and media arts.

The standards emphasize four processes common to all art disciplines:

- Creating Students will generate and conceptualize artistic ideas and work.
- Performing/presenting/producing Students will analyze, interpret and select artistic work for presentation.
- Responding Students will interpret intent and meaning in artistic work.
- Connecting Students will synthesize and relate knowledge and personal experiences to make art

Full implementation of the arts standards will occur in the 2018-19 school year.

The Board of Regents also adopted the Next Generation Learning Standards which are the newly revised English Language Arts and





Twenty-first century technology has made a significant impact on our classrooms. Our elementary and middle school students' classrooms have tablets and Chromebooks for them to use throughout the school day. High school students have been issued a Chromebook, which they carry with them throughout the day and take home with them. The positive impact of technology on the way we educate students is preparing them to be successful in college and later in their career. We are all aware of the dangers that exist on the World Wide Web. Caledonia-Mumford Central School has taken steps to protect our students online, both at school and at home, with the use of cybersecurity software.

Students in Grades 3- 10 are using Chromebooks in their classes this fall. Over the summer, teachers were trained in the operation of Chromebooks and in the best practices of classroom use. Junior and senior students will each be receiving a Chromebook soon.

When using Chromebooks in school, all internet use is filtered by iBoss. iBoss is cybersecurity software that filters Internet traffic. iBoss meets CIPA, Children's Internet Protection Act, standards to protect our student from harmful online content.

Freshmen and sophomore students are taking their Chromebooks home to work on school assignments. Juniors and seniors will soon be taking their devices home. In order to keep our students safe outside of school, Go Guardian was selected as software to monitor students' use of school devices. Go Guardian detects unsuitable websites; principals and our technician receive emails daily of this activity. Principals can discuss internet browsing concerns with individual students. If a device is misplaced or stolen, Go Guardian can find the device and pinpoint the location on a map.



According to the New State Education Department website, the standards adopted by the Board of Regents today seek to protect developmentally appropriate expectations and practices for all children, PreK through grade 2. Additionally, for each grade level (PreK – grade 12), the revised standards expand and clarify reading expectations (including guidance around early and emergent reading experiences in PreK – grade 3) to ensure educators and parents better understand the reading expectations for each grade level. The revised standards now provide additional guidance on ways to support students with disabilities and English language learners.

This year also marks our first year of a multi-year transition process of the New York State P-12 Science Learning Standards adopted by the Board of Regents in December 2016. This school year will focus on raising awareness and building capacity of educators and stakeholders across the state.

In June 2017, The Board of Regents announced its decision to reduce the number of days of student testing on the grades 3-8 state assessments in English Language Arts (ELA) and mathematics from three to two. This change takes effect beginning with the tests that will be administered in spring 2018 and applies to grades 3-8. Schools are also encouraged to begin discussing, piloting and implementing computer based assessments for our students taking the NYS Assessments in grades 3-8.

The State Education Department will continue to work with BOCES District Superintendents, school superintendents, the Staff and Curriculum Development Network and teacher centers to develop and provide guidance on professional development for teachers to implement the new standards as well as the computer based assessments. http://www.nysed.gov/



Senior Braedan Lynn Speaks of His Life Changing Experience with Spanish Club in Costa Rica

Last summer the Cal-Mum High School Spanish Club traveled to Costa Rica. Twentyeight students and seven adults including chaperones and parents spent seven days in the country visiting several cities and participating in many different activities.

Senior Braedan Lynn was so positively impacted by his experiences in Costa Rica, that he was compelled to write about it in a letter to the Caledonia-Mumford Board of Education. Braedan wanted the board members to learn the value of international trips for students so that they will support future trips abroad.

"The trip was truly incredible and an unforgettable experience," Braedan wrote.

Bradean found it difficult to choose what parts of the trip he enjoyed the most. He talked about staying in a small bungalow in the middle of the rainforest amidst a thick jungle.

From there they traveled to a small village called Tortuguaro where he and the other students interacted with the locals, bartered for goods, asked questions and exchanged kindnesses with each other.

"To me, this was one of my favorite parts of Costa Rica, the people. They were all very kind and seemed to be genuinely content. Never once did I feel unsafe or unwelcome," said Braedan.

He shared another memorable experience in his letter. The Cal-Mum group spent their final night in Costa Rica with their tour guide's family. It was a relaxed visit – they played soccer in an open field with children in the neighborhood.

"We played soccer with children of a foreign land that didn't even speak our language, yet we all came together and just had fun. Afterward I sat down outside Odir's (their tour guide) family home and thought of the beauty of human beings. With all of the hatred in the world, here there was love and happiness among strangers. I wished that every person could have felt what I felt at that moment and saw what I saw. This was the type of experience that changes lives; I know this because it changed mine," Braedan commented.

Spanish teacher and club advisor Aminta Romaguera said International trips are a remarkable experience for students, providing an enriching cultural learning experience that exceeds classroom lessons. She is planning another trip abroad in summer of 2019.

Teen Drivers Participate in Safety Program



Usually when teens go to Minnehan's Fun Center in Lakeville, it's to have a good time driving the bullet cars on the race track and playing miniature golf.

On Aug. 1, Caledonia-Mumford High School driver education students were among more than 100 students from four Livingston County schools that spent the afternoon at Minnehan's participating in a series of driver safety stations as part of the 8th Annual Advanced Driver's Education Safety Program.

Cal-Mum driver education teacher Mr. Lee Staley said the driving simulations that are presented at the program are valuable to new drivers and cannot be learned in the classroom.

The interactive stations included safety education information in construction zones, passing and no passing zones, aggressive drivers, distractions, DWI/DUI, seatbelt use, rollovers, lane changing, adverse weather conditions, proper following distances/blind spots, and traffic stops by law enforcement.

Law enforcement officers from the Livingston County Sheriff's Office and NYS Troopers as well as other volunteer professionals provided education and safety training at the stations.

The program is organized by York Central School driver education teacher Dennis Bzduch. Students from Livonia, Caledonia, Perry and Keshequa Central Schools participated.

According to the Center for Disease Control and Prevention, motor vehicle crashes are the leading cause of death for U.S. teens, accounting for more than one in three deaths in this age group. Driver education instruction in high schools and safety programs such as the one at Minnehan's are effective strategies at improving teen's safe driving.

Instructional Technology is Transforming Student Learning

When integrated into the curriculum, technology can transform learning.

Our October 6, 2017 Superintendent's Conference Day focused solely on further integrating technology into the classroom with the goal of enhancing student learning. Director of Curriculum and Instruction Michele Meyer developed the technology development day, which consisted of 40 sessions for teachers and staff on various technology applications that support and enhance classroom learning.

Two presenters from the Genesee Valley Educational Partnership and 20 of our own teachers facilitated the sessions. One hundred staff members participated in the various technology sessions that were offered throughout the day.

Afterward, many teachers called it one of the most useful and productive conference days they have had. Some of the most popular sessions expressed by the teachers were Google training, evidence-based vocabulary instruction, Go Guardian (Internet filtering for Chromebooks) instruction and various educational applications.

One classroom application that teachers are finding to be very valuable for their students is Nearpod.

"It is an amazing tool that is available on any web-enabled device. It's a slide presentation with the capability to gather information,

formatively assess your students, move non-linearly through your lessons and track student participation by allowing your students to use the tools they are drawn to," said K-12 Instructional Coach Julie Corbelli.

Many teachers have incorporated Nearpod into their classrooms. Hear what second grade teacher Ms. Lisa Wells said about Nearpod.

"I love using Nearpod with my kids in the classroom because all are engaged throughout the whole lesson. I also like that I get immediate feedback on whether or not they are meeting their learning targets. The kids love it and were very excited to show their parents," Ms. Wells commented.

Students also love using Nearpod. This is what sixth grader Donald Peet says about Nearpod.

"I think Near Pod is good because it helps students give constructive criticism on other peoples' work and not just keeping to themselves. They are open to helping other kids improve without knowing who it is or who did it."

Our district will continue to focus on integrating computer applications that prepare our students to become college and career ready in the 21st century.

Fall has arrived and so has a consistent routine at Cal-Mum Middle School. The first five weeks of school were filled with pre-assessments, goal setting, and learning routines and procedures. Now students are diving into studies and buckling down. Be sure to review your child's progress report and discuss any low grades or missing assignments. You can meet with the Team anytime from 9:00 a.m. to 9:30 a.m. (*A* Days 8th and 6th Grade meet and *B* Days 7th Grade meet) – just call Jinny Mancuso at 538-3482 and ask to meet with your child's teachers. As a reminder, each student was given an agenda at the beginning of the school year. Students should be keeping track of their nightly homework assignments and projects in their agendas. This is a great communication tool between school and home.

October was Bullying Prevention Awareness month. During our class meetings, students focused on ways to prevent bullying, how to stand up for themselves if being bullied, and what to do if they witness bullying.

As the middle-school principal, a big part of my job is to help parents support their children emotionally as well as academically. Here is some advice for parents of preteens:

- **Help your child manage homework time.** Encourage your child to aim high and always do his/her best work.
- Show interest in your child's studies by talking with him/her daily about what they are learning and doing in school (don't take nothing for an answer!).
- Discuss ideas and feelings about school, studies, and activities. Be realistic about what your child can and should be able to do.
- Find out what your child should be learning, how he/she is progressing, and how you can help. Be a full partner in your child's education.
- Be sure that your child attends school on a regular basis. Even if he/ she is absent for illness or another valid reason, they need to keep up with his studies.

- Encourage your child to pursue interests and make friends through extracurricular activities.
- Know your child's friends. Who does your child hang out with?
 Follow up on any suspicions that you may have. It is better to be
 safe than sorry at this time of your child's life. Know where your
 child is at all times.
- Make it clear that they must follow school rules and policies. Teach
 them to respect people as well as property. Help them know right
 from wrong and what they must do when negative temptations
 come their way.
- Encourage your child to get to know the counselor (Jinny Mancuso) and to maintain contact throughout the middle-school years. Not only will the counselor be invaluable in supporting their academic path, Mrs. Mancuso also is one of many potential adult role models for your child.
- Consistently acknowledge and reward efforts at school. While we
 here at Cal-Mum Middle School have a lot of motivation programs, parents need to recognize their child's successes too. When
 your child works hard, your acknowledgment motivates them to
 persist.

None of us are perfect and we sometimes make mistakes in raising our children. But your child needs your love and respect. A pre-teen needs to become independent, responsible, and self-sufficient to succeed in most of their endeavors in school and at home. The best way to help them in all aspects of development is to try to ensure that their emotional needs are consistently met. Your understanding, common sense, adult judgment, and good sense of humor can make these middle-school years a joy for both you and your child.



March 2017 started our inaugural season of Girls on the Run (GOTR) for Caledonia Mumford Elementary School girls in grades 3-5. GOTR is a program for girls in grades 3 - 5 that encourages girls to recognize their individual strengths and celebrate connections with others. Each season is specifically designed to enable girls to gain a better understanding of who they are, and what's important to them, the value of teamwork and healthy relationships and how they can have a positive impact on the world.

We at GOTR believe that every girl is inherently full of power and potential. By knowing they are the leaders of their lives, these are the girls who will change the world!

During the spring 2017 season our GOTR team consisted of 12 girls and four coaches and met two nights a week, one-and-a-half hours per night for 12 weeks. We worked with a fun, experience-based curriculum which creatively integrated running to inspire the girls to be joyful, healthy and teach the six C's: Confidence, Character, Care, Connections, Competence and Contribution. Physical activity is woven into the program to inspire an appreciation for fitness and healthy habits. We all learned a lot about ourselves and the many communities that we belong to; this included organizing a community impact project where we gathered donations for the Cal-Mum backpack project.

Each season culminates with a GOTR 5K event, ours was at Monroe Community College on June 10 where there were over 1,080 GOTR girls that ran along with many friends and family from the Rochester area. This celebratory, non-competitive event provided the girls with a sense of accomplishment and assisted with instilling the value of goal setting.

Students participate in an at-school acting workshop led by the RBTL. Thank you, Mrs. Parisi and Mr. Bulter for setting this up for our students. The second play attended by our fifth graders was The Money Tree at Nazareth College.

Fourth Graders Experience a Native American Longhouse

Fall in fourth grade is full of new learning experiences. Our students have been fortunate enough to have gone on a couple of field trips. The first trip was to Ganondagan in Victor. Ganondagan is a NYS historic site situated on a hilltop that in the 1700s was a village of over 2,000 Haudensaunee Native Americans. The site has a replica longhouse complete with traditional goods found in a longhouse. The site also hosts a museum and theatre. The trip was enriching as it complimented our Social Studies and Language Arts units.

Our second trip was to our Genesee Country Village Museum. Our next Social Studies unit focuses on Colonial America and the trades of that time period. Students visited a variety of shops to interview the tradespeople. Specifically they interviewed the printer, blacksmith, cooper, potter, cabinetmaker, storekeeper, farmer and school master. They asked each about the skills and education needed to become each tradesperson. Students also asked about the years needed as an apprentice and the tools required of the trade. Having the opportunity to visit and interact with people of our past brings learning to a deeper, more comprehensive level.





Second Grade Students are Excited to Use Technology in Class

If you ask a second grader what he or she likes about school they will probably say something about lunch or recess! But if you push them a little bit, they may tell you they like tablet time. Tablets or more specifically...Chromebooks are really cool!

Children are using their Chromebooks to read, write, to tell stories, video tape themselves and respond to literature, they are answering multiple choice questions, and they are even taking virtual field trips.

Computers are very important to second graders and their teachers. So important that they spent a day learning how to use/ promote technology in their classrooms.

With all this new technology at our fingertips we still find it beneficial to use traditional tools to extend our learning and our experiences. We spent several weeks estimating in centimeters

and meters and using rulers / meter sticks to measure objects in our classroom. These experiences allowed us to understand math problems that required us to compare two lengths and find the difference between them.

This year we were all fortunate to enjoy a stellar fall. The warm weather allowed us to find an abundant amount of Monarch caterpillars to observe in our classroom. We were able to watch the caterpillars as they changed from pupa to chrysalis and finally to adult butterflies. We released several adult butterflies in the hopes that they would make the long trip to Mexico so they could enjoy the warmer weather.

We went back in time and took a wonderful field trip to The Genesee Country Museum.

While we were there we learned about many skilled trades and what school was like in a one room school house.

First grade

New Words, Bigger Numbers and Learning about the Human Body

The first graders are off to a great start this year! The children have been busy learning new procedures, and developing classroom rules and expectations. We have been working on new tricky words and are learning to read more of these words every week. They are getting really good at segmenting and blending words and are becoming more fluent readers!

In math, the children have made significant progress towards fluency with addition and subtraction of numbers to 10, and enjoy working in their math journals daily to solve word problems using the read-draw-write process. A great way for the children to continue practicing their reading and math at home is by logging into their I-Ready accounts. Please ask your child's teacher if you don't have their log-in information.

Our fable read-alouds contained moral lessons which helped develop critical thinking and also allowed the children to reflect on



their own experiences. They also had a basic introduction to the human body and learned the fundamental parts and functions of the five body systems: skeletal, muscular, digestive, circulatory, and nervous systems.
