I am happy to report that the Caledonia-Mumford High School has been designated a Reward School by the New York State Education Department. NYSED has identified 155 Reward Schools (including 18 Charter Schools) in 89 school districts based on test and graduate results from the 2016-17 school year. During the 2016-17 school year, there were roughly 3,300 schools in New York. In other words, this designation places Caledonia-Mumford High School in the top 5% of all schools in New York State. Please join me in congratulating our high school students and staff. I want to also congratulate our entire PreK-12 school program as their collective effort made this designation possible. Lastly, I want to con-

Ten. I want to extend my congratulations to our top students and their parents. This thirteen year achievement has not gone unnoticed and we are proud of your accomplishments.



# The Results are In - Caledonia-Mumford High School Designated a Reward School!



Caledonia-Mumford High School was among 155 schools in New York State to be designated a Reward School for high performance

or high progress. This designation places Caledonia-Mumford High School in the top five percent of all schools in New York. New York State Education Commissioner MaryEllen Elia announced the designations on February 1.

"Congratulations to our high school students and staff. I also want to congratulate our entire pre-k to 12 school program as your collective effort made this designation possible. Lastly, I want to congratulate our entire learning community for sending us awesome students," said Cal-Mum Superintendent of Schools Robert Molisani.

Dr. Rebekah Chenaille became Caledonia-Mumford High School Principal in September 2017 and said she is honored to join with the students, faculty, staff and community in celebrating this recognition.

"Caledonia-Mumford is an exceptional place to learn. Being named a Reward School points directly to the belief system here that all students can reach high academic expectations. It is an honor to celebrate with the Raider learning community our Reward School status," she commented.

New York State Education Department identified the 155 Reward Schools in 89 school districts based on test and graduates results from the 2016-17 school year. During that time period there were approximately 3,300 schools in New York State.

While there were no other Livingston County Schools that received the designation, other nearby Monroe County schools that were named a Reward School include Brighton, Honeoye Falls-Lima, Penfield and Pittsford and Rush Henrietta High Schools.


The Middle and High School Science Clubs are off to a great start! In the fall, the Middle School Club planted chrysanthemums outside the middle and high school offices. Middle school students went geocaching in McKay and Tennent Parks and participated in three forensic labs learning about handwriting analysis, piecing together shredded documents to solve a mystery, and the chemistry of holiday baking.

Many members of the high school club are preparing to travel to Belize in the summer of 2019 in a combined trip with the Spanish Club. They are planning fundraising activities and working toward a possible combined research project with SUNY Geneseo.

As the winter months arrived, the students decided to participate as citizen scientists in the Audubon Society's Backyard Bird Count. Birdfeeders were made from recycled materials and True Value Hardware donated bags of birdseed. For four days

in mid-February, students watched the feeders and recorded the numbers of different species observed. This information, combined with data from across the country, will be compiled to help the Audubon Society learn more about migration, population numbers, how weather is affecting the birds' habits, and more.

The students are working hard to come up with creative activities to build knowledge and interest around science-based topics. We welcome any ideas or expertise from the community, as well.

## Cal-Mum Staff Participates in a Poverty Simulation

Makes

Life add up!

The difficult decisions of "Do I have enough grocery money to feed my family," "How will I pay my rent," "I can't afford to pay daycare but I need to work," "I need a job but I don't have a car," and other challenges are what low income families face on a regular basis.

Unless you or someone close to you has experienced poverty, it's difficult to truly understand their struggles. On February 21, Superintendent's Conference Day, the entire Cal-Mum School staff participated in a poverty simulation to help them gain a clearer understanding of the challenges many of our students and their families are faced with.

"In the 18 years that I have been at Caledonia-Mumford, our district has gone from having one in every 10 of our students eligible to receive the Federal Free and Reduced Lunch Program to today where one in every three students is eligible," said Superintendent of Schools Robert Molisani.

The elementary school gym was transformed into a simulated community of families, friends, merchants, daycare providers, banks, schools, grocery stores, etc. Each participant assumed the role a person living in a low income household. They faced the real life day to day challenges that all families face – only theirs were compounded due to their limited incomes and resources. Examples of the challenges that were role-played included needing transportation to work or school, needing food to feed your family, becoming ill and unable to work, etc.

Staff members said they could feel the stress that resulted from trying to live with these challenges. A debriefing session following the simulation brought forth many comments and concerns from the staff members. The discussions will continue with the goal of developing strategies on how this school district can help support low income students and families in the future.





## Welcome Home Red Raiders... CM High School connects alumni with current senior students

The connection between Cal-Mum High School and its students does not end with graduation. Students who had recently graduated from Cal-Mum were invited to return for a Welcome Home event on December 20, 2017. High School Principal Dr. Rebekah Chenaille hosted the event with assistance from the student council.

The Welcome Home event was aimed at connecting recent graduates with current senior students to share and discuss information that will help them in their transition from high school to college or the work force. Alumni from all sectors were encouraged to attend: college students, trade workers and military service personnel. The event concluded with lunch for the alumni students and many conversations and embraces with their former teachers.

"The Welcome Home event was exciting for me. My favorite part of it is connecting and reconnecting our past with our future. The bond that we can form and strengthen over time is what makes our schools so awesome. I want our school to stage our students for the future they are dreaming of. That means we have to capture their hopes and dreams and prepare with them. Lastly--- Wow! The Raiders are an impressive group of young people. The brainpower in the room was overwhelming and exciting. You could feel the synergy!" remarked Dr. Chenaille.

There were many ideas shared that morning, including how to juggle a part time job with your college studies, whether to choose a small or large college, getting involved in campus activities, choosing a major and more.

Matthew Hayes graduated from CMCS in 2013 and is in his final year of a five year architectural degree program at the University of Notre Dame.

"I think the more I learn at every stage of my college experience, it's important to come back here and share it. It has been instrumental what I've learned from others before me," he said.

Joshua Roides is a sophomore at the Citadel. He graduated from CM in 2016 and, though the South Caroline military college is very different from his small town alma mater, he felt strongly that he wanted to share with the current high school seniors a very important message.

"No matter how far away you go; whether

it's a small school or a large school or whether you go directly into the work force, it's important to give back. Caledonia-Mumford is still our roots," Roides said.

Another 2017 CM graduate Seth Toland said Cal-Mum administration and teachers prepared him to be able to communicate with his professors at Genesee Community College. College professors typically do not know all of their students personally so if you are looking for that connection you have to forge those relationships yourself.

"One thing I feel like I learned at CM is my

people skills. Everyone here at Cal-Mum was so open with me; my teachers had my back and I always knew I had someone to talk to. It has made me not afraid to talk to my professors," Toland remarked.

Many other valuable topics were discussed like anxiety, depression, pressure to drink, campus safety, sex and exposure to drugs. The alumni offered suggestions and advice on how to get help if anyone experiences those issues.

Dr.Chenaille said the first time event here CM was successful and she will repeat it annually at holiday time.



## Senior Cierra Wells Observes Surgeries in Preparation for Nursing Career

What do you like to do on your days off from school? Senior Cierra Wells likes to be in the operating room observing surgeries. Cierra says the observations are helping to prepare her for a career in nursing and as a surgeon's assistant. On February President's Day recess, Cierra observed valve replacement heart surgery.

Cierra plans to attend either St. John Fisher or Roberts Wesleyan College next September to study nursing. She is the daughter of Christopher and Amy Wells.

Read below about her experiences in the operating room at the University of Rochester Strong Memorial Hospital.

#### Do you plan to enter into the medical field for your career?

"I know for sure that I want to get my RN but also have an interest in obtaining additional training in order to become what's called an RN First Assistant. This would allow me to be the main assistant to the surgeon in the operating room"

#### When did you first observe a surgery and what type?

"I first observed a surgery at URMC Strong Memorial Hospital back in the Fall of 2017. I shadowed a Pediatric Ophthalmologist. The patient was a little child who needed major eye surgery as a result of having shaken baby syndrome. It was pretty sad to see the damage that a child suffered due to an adult. After that surgery, I had the opportunity to shadow that doctor a few more times but was then connected to a Cardiologist at Strong who has allowed me to shadow as often as my schedule permits."

#### Were you nervous and was it what you expected?

"I was a little nervous at first but once I was in the operating room I seemed to just focus on what was going on. It's a very busy environment as you can imagine so there really is no time to be nervous."

#### Did you handle it well or were you at all queasy?

"I would like to say that being a big fan of Greys Anatomy helped prepare me for all of the blood I was going to see but obviously TV doesn't quite capture the reality of a true operating room. I do think machine some of the blood from the patient goes though a hose like tube that eventually goes through a machine that is able to change the temperature of the blood to be either colder or warmer to help prevent organ failure. Due to this machine the temperature in the operating room plays no significant role in the patient's care."

#### What makes you interested in surgery?

The flu is still causing many people to be ill. Visit the school website (www.cal-mum.org) to view flu guidelines developed by the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention.



my experiences of starting with a not so invasive surgery helped prepare me for the open heart surgeries. I have not experienced any feelings of nausea or feeling light headed. At times I find myself freezing but that is only as a result of some of the operating rooms needing to stay at a certain temperature.

#### Tell us about the recent observation over recess?

"My recent experience in the OR was watching another valve replacement. This was actually my second time watching this type of surgery. The first surgery that I got to watch was very interesting as I got to see the valve up close after they removed it. During a recent shadowing experience, I got to watch a patient have a coronary bypass. This surgery was very interesting to watch as I also got to see an actual vein being removed from the patient's leg. "

#### Tell us something about a real surgery that most people would never know? "During some heart surgeries when

a patient needs to go on a bypass

## Be Our Guest...Class of 2018 Hosts Senior Citizens




## Middle School Students Volunteer for Camp Good Days and Special Times

Poet Sherry Robbins has one rule when working with students in the classroom... you must not use boring words. Robbins is a poet, teaching artist and freelance writer. She has been a visiting artist in Cal-Mum Elementary classrooms for 21 years. This year Robbins worked in both fourth and fifth grade classrooms.

"The idea is that we play with words and poetic tools in grade 4, and then dig a little deeper in grade 5 with forms and poem models," she commented.

Robbins teaches creative writing and poetry in schools, community groups, art agencies, for social and medical services and through BOCES programs.

"I am passionate about poetry and about kids. Being able to help them find their authentic voices, and the power and fun that comes from free expression, is so rewarding," Robbins said.

#### **Students Obtain a Poetic License!**

At the conclusion of her classroom workshops, Robbins grants each student a poetic license and students are cautioned that they must never commit the violation of using boring words!

"Let it be known that here on the bridge between star shine and clay you have the right to operate any and all poetic devices at speeds up to and including 100 wpm. This license may not be revoked for any reason other than the prolonged and willful use of boring language."

Seven years ago Robbins was working with the students in a fifth grade classroom on becoming a superhero. She saved a poem written by one of the students – Xzaveis King, now a Cal-Mum High School Junior.



The book is dedicated to her grandsons David and Daniel, both students at Caledonia-Mumford Elementary School.

"I began researching seahorses and realized that most people weren't aware of the qualities of a seahorse and that children had no place to learn about them. I began to look at other sea creatures that are little known. I wanted to give children the opportunity to learn about and know some of these creatures," Gleichauf said.

Gleichauf recently visited Cal-Mum Elementary school to read *Horses of the Sea* in each of her grandson's classrooms. The children



were gathered on the rug around her as she read the words on each page of the book and showed them the colorful illustrations. The students loved hearing the story of sea horses and they were captured by the bright and bold water color illustrations on the pages. They asked many questions that resulted in a lot of learning about sea creatures, which was Gleichauf's goal in writing the book. It was clear that she not only loves writing children's stories, she also loves reading them to children, and they certainly loved listening. Gleichauf will return to Cal-Mum Elementary School on March 5 as a guest author during the school's weeklong Parents as Reading Partners festival.

With the success of *Horses of the Sea*, Gleichauf has a second book in the series about unusual sea creatures scheduled to be released in September 2018.

## CMCS Board of Education Recognizes Mary Hamilton for 50 Years of Teaching

When Mary Catherine Davison Hamilton walked from her home on Lehigh Street in Caledonia, down to 99 North Street to start kindergarten at Caledonia Elementary School in 1949, little did she know that she would spend the vast majority of her life there.

The Caledonia-Mumford Central School Board of Education recognized her at their February 27 meeting for her 50 years of teaching service to the district.

"Nothing I am more proud of than being part of Cal-Mum," Hamilton said.

Mrs. Hamilton graduated from Caledonia-Mumford High School in 1962 as the class Salutatorian. She was hired in 1968 by then Superintendent of Schools Dr. Frederick Hinsdale to be a substitute teacher.

She eventually taught full time as a social studies teacher, retiring in 2000, but not for long. A few years later she again began substitute teaching at CM and for the last 13 years she has been a tutor for many Cal-Mum students.

Family and friends at Cal-Mum recently surprised her at school with a cake to commemorate her 50 years of teaching. She received a Red Raider sweatshirt with the sleeve embroidered HAM - 1 + 49, reflective of her vehicle license plate of many years, HAM 1.

Mrs. Hamilton comes from a long line of maroon and white Red Raiders. Her mother Helen Davison, husband Tom Hamilton and children Monica, Kate and David are all graduates of CMCS. Now she is proud to watch the next generation of Red Raiders in her family do great things; granddaughter Lily Johnson is in fifth grade and grandson Oliver Johnson is in sixth grade.



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
