Dear Caledonia-Mumford Learning Community,

I hope this letter finds you well. The last fourteen weeks of remote learning was exceptionally challenging but when you have extraordinary students, families and staff like we have at Cal-Mum, nothing is impossible. Our incredible students were successful with remote learning due to the support and motivation provided by their parents and our talented staff. I want to once again congratulate the Caledonia-Mumford learning community for their exceptional effort, stamina, support and resilience.

I am pleased to announce that on June 16, 2020, the Caledonia-Mumford community approved the proposed 2020-2021 school budget by a vote of 882 to 238 (78.8%). Proposition #2, the purchase of one 63 passenger school bus, also passed 876-243 (78.3%). Lastly, two incumbent Board members, John Bickford (999) and Elizabeth Doll (960) were re-elected to the Board for a three-year term. I want to thank our community for your continued support and the District will strive to provide an educational program that will continue to be a source of pride for the community.

Although the graduation guidance provided by the State continues to change, it is apparent that in person ceremony will be possible for the students and parents of the Class of 2020. Unfortunately, due to the Governor Cuomo's Executive Order, which restricts the number of attendees, the ceremony will be closed to the public. The Class of 2020 is a remarkable group of young men and women. This ceremony will provide them with the recognition and celebration they deserve as well bring a positive closure to a challenging school year. Mrs. Callanan Helped Her Students Adapt to Chemistry Lab in their Kitchens

This statement probably describes most high school classes during the Covid. "I had nearly 100% attendance most days starting with the live classes on March 18, 2020. CMCS was off and running with online instruction in two days. My colleagues are passionate and dedicated to their profession."

Chemistry is not an easy course to teach remotely but we did the best we could with creating lab settings in the students' kitchens. Science without true labs was very challenging and not as fun.

I sent home materials so that they could test the pH of common household items. Students found that foods are acidic and cleaning supplies are basic.



We Zoomed in small groups and made isomers of heptane. In their groups they reacted baking soda and vinegar, capturing the carbon dioxide. The bag got cooler so it was an endothermic reaction.

On the last Monday class, the students Zoomed a lab comparing the intermolecular forces of water and another substance they had at home, such as isopropyl alcohol, hydrogen peroxide or vinegar. I sent home pipettes. One of the tests was to see how many drops could fit on the head of a penny – the more drops the higher intermolecular forces.

We celebrated spring Mole Day on June 2 with a song. A mole is 6.02 x 10^23 item (like a dozen is 12). Official mole day is at 6:02 a.m. on October 23, 2020.

Note: This was Mrs. Callanan's final year and certainly a challenging one. Thank you Mrs. Callanan for adapting your Chemistry lessons and labs.

Cal-Mum Teachers Move Instruction from the Classroom to the Living

During this time of emergency remote learning we confirmed what we already knew about our teachers, faculty and staff... they will go to any lengths to support our students.

It was mid March, and as we were planning for a superintendent conference day, we received news that our plans needed to change drastically. In a matter of two days our teachers experimented and refined their practices with online tools such as, Zoom, Loom, Seesaw and Google Classroom. They grabbed everything they could from their classrooms. Our teachers packed their bags with document cameras, computers, manuals and files not knowing what the days ahead would bring. We had no idea that would be the last time we welcomed our students in our classrooms for the year.

Curriculary, we committed to continue moving instruction forward. We wanted to make sure that our students in grades PreK through 12, did not miss engaging in any of our priority standards or school events. We committed to our students

that we would provide the instruction and opportunity to earn course credits and complete their school year with the confidence that they learned the material for their grade level. As the days and weeks went by, our teachers remained thoughtful in their planning and delivery of content. Over the years, numerous school board members, along with village, town, county, and state officials have graciously shared their time and come into the Cal-Mum Government classes and imparted their wisdom and passion for being involved in public service. And even though things looked a little different this spring

Their wise words of advice and service undoubtedly will be remembered by these students in the Class of 2020 as they work to make the world a better place.



News from the Student Support Team:

The Caledonia-Mumford Student Support Team recognizes that we as a community, and particularly our children, are facing unprecedented challenges, and circumstances the likes of which we could have never prepared for. With this in mind, we have been working diligently as a team to be proactive in preparing for the year ahead of us. We understand that our students may return to a school that looks very different than they are used to, but we are working to make sure that no matter what it looks like, it continues to feel like the safe haven it has always been.

While we are a small team, we aim to provide support to all students, and be proactive in our delivery of services. We are mindful that students may return to school having experienced varying levels of stress and trauma surrounding Covid-19 and the quarantine. With this in mind, we are investigating measures to universally assess student social-emotional needs in the fall so that we can provide each student with the individualized support they may require.

The Student Support Team has also provided families with information on how to have meaningful and healthy conversations with their children around the subjects of race and social injustice. As questions will arise within families, it is crucial for our families to have these powerful and honest conversations in order to learn and grow together and the team is available to support as needed. We offer the following information to support conversations, (adapted from the Yale Center for Emotional Intelligence). The full document with supporting resources is available on the school website.

Remember that it is never too late to start this conversation and you do not have to get it right the first time.

- It's okay not to know something.
- Really listen.
- Honor all feelings.

• Learn alongside your kids.

- Start with self-awareness.
- Discuss the challenges.

Members of the Student Support Team are available on campus throughout the summer, should questions or concerns arise. Please call the Elementary Office (538-3481), the Middle/High School Counseling Center (538-3445), or your building counselor or psychologist to set up a time to talk in the summer. We understand that right now our students are looking to the adults in their lives to give them a sense of hope and security. None of us have all the answers, but together we can make a difference. That's the Cal-Mum Way!

Cal-Mum Central School and Cal-Mum Community *We Have Always Been in this Together*

If the Caledonia-Mumford Central School District had a nickel for every time the word *unprecedented* has been used in the past four months, we would be wealthy. Unprecedented is the only way to describe the events that have happened around the world and right here in our world of Caledonia-Mumford, during the Covid-19 pandemic.

From all of us at Caledonia-Mumford Central School – we cannot think of anyone we would rather be quarantined with than the Red Raider family and community!

Students were sent home on Friday, March 13, 2020. Staff reported on Monday, March 16, 2020 for a meeting with Superintendent Robert Molisani who notified everyone that our school, and schools across the state of New York, were officially closed in an effort to flatten the curve of Covid-19 Coronavirus.

The classrooms were empty, the chairs were put up on the desks, the lights were out...but the learning continued. Without skipping a beat, teachers, staff, students, parents and the community came together to accomplish what had never been done before...100 percent remote learning. None of us could have imagined that day that remote learning would continue until the end of the 2020 school year.

The history of Cal-Mum School has proven repeatedly that when challenges arise, the community and school partner to accomplish what is best for our children. We are all in this together!

In the 1850s a wood frame building was erected on the north side of Main Street, Caledonia, to educate students. Ninety-four pupils attended school in the upper room and 70 younger pupils attended in the smaller lower room. There was one teacher for each room.

In 1876 that building was torn down and replaced with a brick structure, which additions were made to as enrollment grew in numbers. That building is the current Big Springs Museum. With community support, classes were added as well as

improvements to the building. Athletics were added, bringing much pride to the school and community. Here is an excerpt from the school history files:

"Additions were made to this building in 1904 and 1913. Homemaking and commercial subjects were added. A full time music teacher was hired and improved lighting and heating facilities were completed. Men were added to the faculty and athletic activities began. The Caledonia baseball team became Livingston County Champions in 1925 and the football team played through the season undefeated.

The school paper, The Elm, printed its first issue in 1930 and in 1931 the school colors changed from orange and purple to our familiar maroon and white.

All of this advancement in the way Caledonia's students were educated could not have happened without a dedicated and supportive Caledonia community.

And an excerpt from an unsigned editorial in the local newspaper....

"The high school building of a town is usually pointed to with pride by every interested citizen and is given a place of prominence and importance in the laying out of a village."

From the Caledonia High School Catalogue, August 16, 1897....

"The people of Caledonia have good reason to be proud of the building, which the school now occupies. It is modern in equipment and furnishing, well lighted and heated. Much credit is due the Board of Education and all others who have worked for improvements, for the most excellent results accomplished."

In 1938 construction on the present elementary school, located at 99 North Street began and again, the school and community joined

Pupils Parade to New School, Ceremony Marks Cornerstone

"The community and Board of Education were proud of their accomplishments and construction on the new school was finally underway. The district planned an impressive ceremony to mark the laying of the cornerstone of the new building.

On a warm June afternoon in 1938, the Caledonia High School Band led a parade of pupils from the present school on Main Street to the construction site of their new building on North Street.

The program at the new site included the band performing "America the Beautiful," an invocation by Rev. D.C. MacLeod, remarks by a PWA representative (the branch of the federal government supplying aid for the project), and a speech by School Superintendent J.C.Foote, Jr. Harry Annin, President of the Big Springs Historical Society presented a sealed box containing historical documents, a copy of the Caledonia Advertiser, Ainodelac, and the signatures of every pupil of the Caledonia School District No. 5.

The box was sealed in the cornerstone of the community's new school. School officials hoped the new building would be ready in September 1939 for the start of the new school year, however the long awaited new Caledonia School opened in October 1939 with the largest student population in Caledonia's history.

Here we are in 2020 facing a world pandemic and again, Cal-Mum School and community joined together to ensure that education of our students remained the focus, and together, learning was accomplished through our physical separation from the students.

Thank you Cal-Mum students, parents and community for partnering with us through this season. We are all in this together!
