






igh School is often considered to be the place where young minds are molded, strong work ethics are instilled, and most importantly, students learn who they are as individuals.




ACTIVITES












OPE the RAIDE

On September 11, 2001, a tragedy occurred that no one will ever forget, especially our generation. The four hijacked planes that created mass destruction in New York City, Washington D.C. and a field in Pennsylvania sent the media and government into a frenzy. This was Generation X's first large scale encounter with terrorism against our country, and it sent a shock wave through our nation. To turn this into something positive, Principal Mark Robertson challenged the students and teachers to raise money for the American Red Cross. He proposed we try to raise a combined total of \$6,200 in honor of the 6,000 body bags requested by New York City's Mayor Rudy Guliani,

and the additional 200 asked for the victims at the Pentagon. Nearly two weeks later, on Friday, September 21, the high school held an assembly in honor of the overwhelming generosity of the staff and students. As community members, Americans, and as people, together we raised \$19,500 which was directly donated to the Red Cross.

The assembly included the school orchestra, Symphonic Winds, and the Concert Choir combining their talents to generate a sense of peaceful patriotism. Their list of songs included the "National Anthem" and "God Bless America." Local talents, Charlie Ollman sang "I'm Proud To Be an American," and Helen Thul sang "My Country 'Tis of Thee." Leslie

Schwartz, teacher Bill McElrath, and Mr. Robertson shared their thoughts on what we had accomplished within the past week. The check written out to the American Red Cross was given to their representative Myra Helpin at the end of the assembly. The presentation showed that the community should be proud of what was achieved to help the victims of the tragedy that happened the week before. Sometimes bad things happen and people manage to let their generosity shine through and help them heal.







Laying Down the Law







The Wizard of Oz






Styles can start at any age and can change through out life. This year there were more permanent choices in trends; tattoos. They ranged from religious symbols to colorful, imaginative designs.















None of the sophomores knew how quick the next three years would go by. All one could do was tell them to enjoy every minute of it.






Takes Self-Discipline and Determination












A Young Team with Big Dreams


