





High school is all about being yourself. But for a select few, it is about pretending to be someone else. These students are the actors and actresses of the school plays.

It is not as easy as one may think to act like someone else. Many hours of long work and memorization go into just the auditions. And going through auditions does not even mean the actor will make the final cut!

More than fifty students tried out for the fall musical this year, and twenty auditioned for the oneact play. Depending on the size of the play, between twenty and forty students usually get onto the cast.

Junior **Caitlin Sapa** has acted for many years through Youth Performing Arts (YPA). The fall musical, *Hello Dolly!*, was her second high school performance. "I don't get very nervous before auditions," **Sapa** said. "But if it's a main part, I do feel a little nervous. It all depends on the part," she added.


Sapa also talked about preparing for auditions. "I would read the script many times," she explained. "Then I would practice it in front of my family. For *Hello Dolly*! I also had to practice my singing voice!"

Senior **Todd Arrigoni** also had a part in *Hello Dolly!*. It was his first high school play, but surprisingly he was not too nervous for tryouts. "If I mess up in an audition, I just keep going. I don't delay the performance," he stated.

Mr. Timothy Newcomb, who has been directing plays for nine years, gave a few tips for someone wanting to get into acting. "Make sure you choose a character that suits your ability," Newcomb advised. "Memorize the script, but also practice the emotions and actions of the character. You must be willing to take risks. But most importantly, come to the auditions prepared!"
































breakin' it down

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

















EXPLORING THE OPTIONS students excel in advanced studies

nce a student has taken all of the "normal" high school classes that are available, what is left? Must he choose from courses that do not interest or challenge him? Or is there another option that can be explored? For such a student there are three choices: College in Schools, Advanced Placement, and Post Secondary Education Option.

College in Schools, or CIS, is a great way for students still in high school to get ahead of the rest and start getting some college credits taken care of. This year there were 351 total students enrolled in the CIS program. That is nineteen percent of our student body that is getting college credits before they graduate from high school. When Senior Jacob Lipp was asked what it is like being in a CIS class he responded, "The class is a little more difficult, but other than that it's pretty much the same as any other class!"

Advanced Placement, or AP classes are basically the same as regular classes except they move at a faster pace with more rigor. The classes are meant to challenge students and help keep interest levels high. Senior Eric Chmielewski strongly felt his AP class

was worth it. "You have to commit a lot more time to the class, but colleges like to see students in these classes. Free college credit doesn't hurt either," he said. This year, one-fourth of our students were enrolled in at least one AP class.

For students who want to travel beyond the walls of our school, Post Secondary Education Option, or PSEO. is the preferred choice. Students go to an actual college for part or all of a regular school day, earning college credits right alongside traditional college students. A variety of schools participate, such as Century Community College, Anoka-Ramsey Community College, and the University of Minnesota. The average number of students enrolled in the PSEO program is twenty-four.

While the traditional school setting more than meets the needs of most of our students, the ability to enrich one's education further is important. With alternatives like CIS. AP, and PSEO, students explore a wider variety of challenging courses.

"It is a lot different from high school! There is a lot more individual work with more lectures and much less class time to work on homework," stated Senior Thomas Kubes. "It was tough starting not knowing anyone, but when you can get college credits while the school pays for tuition and books...What's there not to like?"




New Exposures



Scientists discover soft tissue, including blood vessels and cells, in a 70-million-year-old fossilized **Tyrannosaurus Rex** thigh bone.

Michael Jackson is acquitted of child molestation, conspiracy and alcohol charges that could have sent the singer to prison for nearly 20 years. NEW POPE

Following the passing of Pope John Paul II, *Cardinal Joseph Ratzinger* of Germany was elected as the 265th reigning Pope and sovereign of Vatican City.

Sheehan followed her protest with a three-week bus tour to Washington, DC, where a rally of over 100,00 people marched in rotest of the war in Irag

Terri Schiavo's husband, Michael, squares off against his in-laws, the Bush administration, and thousands of protesters to remove his wife's feeding tube. After her death, Terri's autopsy confirms her doctors' prognosis that the vegetative state in which she had lived for fifteen years was irreversible.
