
In this three year experience we call high school, everyone changes. No one leaves the commencement saying they are the same person who walked in those doors as a sophomore.




GAME Annihilate Anoka






the district's superintendent, fully supports these new ideas of Robertson.



Many new changes were made to improve the technology. The six million dollars that came from the bond issue helped the school purchase many new computers. There is now a computer in every class room. The school also added new printing and network capabilities and three computer labs.

The bond issue also allowed the school to buy a phone for every room, which will help with safety issues and allow teachers to talk to parents privately.

Video monitors and video cassette recorders were added to each room with a broadcast channel. Capital improvement money was used to help improve the auditorium. Lights, curtains,



and a new sound board were installed in the auditorium.

District funds helped buy half a dozen surveillance cameras to monitor student behavior.

The new technological advances provided additional benefits to students. The Internet became accessible in every class. With the additional computer operation skills, students were better prepared for the real world.

Paul Karlsson summed it up the best, "Additional software and additional hardware will make it much better for the students. I'm excited and looking forward to it."
















cial events.












Coaches were a very important aspect to the team as far as confidence and constructive criticism. Larger numbers of students and the variety of categories made the need for coaches a priority.







The 1997 season was cut short due to a tough region seeding. In the first playoff game, the Rangers faced Elk River in a nail-biter. Elk River














Overall, the boys swim team had a productive season with many great achievements.














Colophon

Volume 60 of the Forester Yearbook contains 208 pages with a sixteen page supplement. They were formatted with a 9 x 12 layout. 1150 total books were printed by Taylor Publishing Co., Dallas, Texas. The pages were printed on eighty pound enamel paper. The main type face used in the book was Athena. The cover was a computer generated picture with a four color process lithocote finish.

Approximately 1,800 students were pictured in the book. Twenty-six ads which raised an estimated \$1,750. We added an additional \$5.00 to the price of

the book due to an increase of color pages. The cost was raised to \$40.00 for the "Early Bird Special" and \$43.00 for the set price. An extra 250 books were ordered for those who wished to be placed on the waiting list at the price of \$45.00. The total cost of the book was approximately \$42,000.00.
