





It's All About the Peanuts







Rangers have always made goals and have fought for what they want to achieve. We all have a passion for something, and for some people, it is their game.





Next year is a new season and the boys hope for a better played, but same family-like season!










Diggin' Up the Season









1991 was the first year that Dance Team was a part of the high school. It was then called Danceline, and had started as a club.




The danceline was very dedicated and spent three and a half hours every night during February to prepare for the State Competition in 1997.


Making Memories

just ourselves in the end we've accomplished that.



informs and entertains its audience in a broad, fair and accurate manner on all subject that affect readers in the areas of academics, community, groups, sports and student life. The entire student body of 1700+ prospective readers constitutes the book's target audience. Secondary audiences include school personnel, community members and scholastic journalism groups. . Coverage . Content focuses on coverage which will meet the wants and needs of the majority of these students, so long as those wants and needs are not contradictory to the principles of scholastic journalism.

 The staff encourages constructive criticism of any part of the book, both before and after publication. However, final authority for the content of the vearbook rests solely in the hands of the yearbook students under the guidance of their advisors. . No material which is libelous, irresponsible and/ or an advocate of illegal activity will be published. No material which the advisors deem in poor taste will be printed. . The content coverage period lasts from the summer before school starts to March, when the yearbook is completed. Events occurring past this date are impossible to include in the yearbook, and are subsequently covered in the spring supplement. . Family and friends are welcome to purchase an advertisement to honor and remember the life of the person lost, and the advertisement will be included in the designated section of the yearbook as the production schedule allows. * Advertising * All advertising accepted by the staff must meet the same guidelines as editorial content. Acceptance of advertising does not constitute an endorsement by the Forester staff, Forest Lake High School's administration, faculty, staff, or students, or the Forest Lake Area School District. . Senior advertisements, ranging in price from \$25 for a twelfth of a page to \$50 for a quarter of a page, are sold from August to December. The Forester staff discourages advertisements which include boyfriends/girlfriends because advertisements cannot be removed or changed after submission. The yearbook staff does not guarantee the safe return of any photos submitted for advertisements. . Client Satisfaction · Because the yearbook is a student production, complete satisfaction is not guaranteed to the purchaser. Refunds will not be given for minor errors such as poor portrait quality, misspelled names, etc. Books returned for refund must be free of damage or writing. Once returned, the book becomes the property of the Forester staff and can be

resold at the current sales price.

The Forester volume 73 was produced by the yearbook staff at Forest Lake High School in Forest Lake, Minnesota. It was printed by Balfour/Taylor Publishing in Dallas Texas. The account was serviced by representative Jessica Youngpeter and sales representative Reida Lazer.

The cover was designed by Maria Kaiser and incorporated three color design which was silk-screened, embossed, and foil stamped onto the oatmeal background. Cover colors used were red 061 and maroon 806, with a quarter bound stitch. Top mylar stamp was antique gold and embossed. The end sheets are printed on rainbow tan parchment with a 4E torn edge. The books 248 pages are printed on 100lb enamel paper stock. The 2011 volume includes 248 in full color.

All body copy was set in Seville 10 pt., headlines in Renaissance 120 pt., captions in Seville Italic 8pt., drop cap Renaissance 24 pt., timeline Times 10 pt.. Layouts were created using Adobe InDesign, Adobe PhotoShop and Taylor tools and were submitted online.

Professional portraits were taken by LifeTouch and senior portraits by Picture Place in Vadnis Heights. Other images were provided by David Bank Studios, EMC publishing, TLC Images, and Jeff Joyer. The 1000 copies of the Forester were sold for \$80.00.










