Accountability and flexibility are hallmarks of Gwinnett County Public Schools' success. Key to that success is ensuring that each school community understands the progress being made by its schools, as well as what plans will drive improvement. Each school creates a collaborative Local School Plan for Improvement (LSPI) to increase student achievement results, with targeted goals based on the four strategic priorities within the district's <u>Blueprint for the Future</u>: *Empathy, Equity, Effectiveness, and Excellence*. All schools across the district will focus on goals **2A- Multi-tiered**Systems of Support and **2B- Opportunity and Access.** However, schools are required to select one goal from each of the other strategic priorities for the 2022-2023 school year. LSPI goals are dynamic, like our schools, and are updated to reflect changes that occur in schools. Multiple data points are used to determine areas needing improvement and to identify specific, measurable, annual objectives. Key Performance Indicators (KPIs) are the way we will measure success for each goal. Schools then determine how to use research-based strategies to achieve these goals, using flexibility as needed. The LSPI development process involves teachers, parents, students, and community members, so the entire school community has the opportunity to be involved in conversations about school improvement.

- 1. The GCPS 1:1 device initiative has been initiated, with all students receiving a Chromebook for use at school and at home.
  - All Richards Middle students have been issued Chromebook devices (/08/22) and protective sleeves for use at home and school.
- 2. Extracurricular clubs and activities have been expanded for students to have greater opportunities for engagement, connection, socialization, and enrichment.
  - As mentioned in goal one, student clubs and extracurricular activities are in full swing, with the addition of multiple new clubs this school year. Last year the school had 11 clubs and we have added 5 clubs, bringing the number to 16 clubs.
  - Students have interviewed for the C5 Georgia Student Leadership Program. 11/22
  - Latino students from Richards Middle attended the Annual Latino Youth Leadership Conference at Emory University in December. 12/3/22.
  - 6th grade students have participated in the field trip to Junior Achievement BizTown at Discovery High School to explore a simulated economy and learn how businesses and organizations function to provide goods and services, and jobs for people in our society. 10/12-10/21/22)
- 3. The school's "Computer Science for All" initiative enters the second year with a Discovery Cluster vertical team of educators leading the work. A new Richards' Robotics Team is a key highlight of this work.
  - Richards Middle Computer Science teachers and administrators have participated in multiple Discovery Cluster Vertical Team PD (09/13/22; 10/18/22; 11/29/22), to continue implementation of the Computer Science for All initiative and planning for the Cluster Stem Night in January (01/24/23).
  - The new Robotics Team competed in several multi-educational level competitions in the first semester, concluding with the middle grades competition at Brookwood High School on 01/21/23.
- 4. An updated GCPS student behavior support plan is being implemented, allowing for additional behavioral interventions to help decrease suspensions and tribunals. Restorative Justice Training for all teachers will also support this strategy.
  - Teachers, counselors, parapros and administrators have received their first training in Restorative Justice Circles (9/29/22), with the challenge of implementing circles in their classes at least once by the end of this semester.
  - Advisement classes are facilitated by teachers each week on Monday's to support the school's SEL and character education efforts for students.
