DAY OF NURSING

ST. LUKE'S HOSTS DAY FOR BIOMED STUDENTS

Parkland High School Biomedical Science teachers and St. Luke's leader-ship coordinated a full day of nursing career exploration for 75 students who are taking one of four classes that Parkland High School offers in the nationally accredited Project Lead the Way® Biomedical Science Program, a flagship Parkland program that offers hands-on training for students interested in studying science after high school.

The Day of Nursing took place onsite at St. Luke's Sacred Heart campus and kicked off with a panel presentation consisting of nine nurses who all work in different settings. Student teams visited stations that offered practice of nursing skills that included wound care, patient transfer, CPR, EKG, elder care, critical care, personal protective equipment and use of a stethoscope to determine if heart sounds were normal or not. Students also explored a "room of errors" that featured high-tech mannequins attached to monitors.

When students entered the lab, they had just a few minutes to determine what was wrong by spotting as many problems as they could as a team. The workshop concluded with Lisa Storck, DNP, RN, Program Director, School of Nursing, giving an overview of how to become a nurse, the various types of nurses, St. Luke's nurse internship program as well as professional development opportunities that can lead to career advancement and expertise.





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SUPERINTENDENT'S MESSAGE

Dear Parkland Community,

Welcome 2024! We have enjoyed a great school year to date and we are excited for what is to come.

If you came out to the Harlem Wizards, a fall stage show or enjoyed one of our many winter concerts, I hope you will plan to visit us for another event in 2024. Mark your calendar for Saturday, March 16th, as we will be hosting our 2nd Annual Community Resource Fair and Health Symposium that will also include a New Parkland Parent Social. Our entire community is invited to meet agencies that can help during emergencies. People can also mingle with recreational organizations to learn about youth activities that are offered across our region.

Parkland is growing and we have been doing a lot of planning for the future. We spent almost the entire year of 2023

studying options to plan for growth that is predicted for the coming decade. We want to be fiscally responsible in planning and also maintain the buildings that we currently have. After thoroughly considering numerous options outlined by the RPLS architect feasibility study team, we have decided to build an addition at Parkland High School and renovate and expand Orefield Middle School. Advantages to this plan are a quick timeline to complete space that will handle increased enrollment since we will be building on property that we already own. Also, the cost to improve Parkland High School and Orefield Middle School will be far less than new construction projects. The first phase of expansion will occur at Parkland High School. Alloy5 has been chosen as the architect to tackle the design plan and we look forward to sharing what they come forward with in 2024. We are also in the midst of constructing an Operations Center that is housed behind Orefield Middle School on Stadium Drive. The new building will allow us to relocate the offices that are currently in the Troxell Building and some offices from the Administration Center. The building scope was recently expanded and will be approximately 52,000 square feet and will include office, storage and

workshop areas for the Facilities/Maintenance/Custodial, Food Services, Student Services and Technology Departments. We anticipate a December 2024 completion date. Finally, I am happy to announce that extensive renovations at Schnecksville Elementary School are complete. You can see a picture from our ribbon cutting celebration to the right. The background includes the new outdoor learning courtyard and the preserved main entrance from the original building that was constructed in 1930.

On the school safety and security front, we are pleased to announce an upgrade to our security cameras across the District to incorporate artificial intelligence (AI) technology that can detect when a person is carrying a gun or other weapon on campus. Viewing this as an extension of our security team, the new technology monitors our cameras day and night for the threat of a brandished gun within camera views.

In November, Parkland was pleased to host a Senate Education Committee hearing where I testified about how unfunded mandates affect our school budget and in return, our local taxpayers. Ultimately, unfunded and underfunded mandates significantly diminish the ability of school districts to provide the necessary resources to create sustainable instructional opportunities for students. According to the Pennsylvania Association of School Business Officials (PASBO) Education 2021 Deficit Worksheet, the cumulative effect of unfunded and underfunded mandates leaves more than a \$20 million deficit over a 10-year period here in Parkland. We are therefore left with the difficult decision of property tax increases and/or reduction of valuable programming for children. While I spoke about many areas of concern and offered ideas that would save local tax dollars, I will share two examples below:

Transportation - School Districts that transport students to and from school are also required to transport non-public school and charter school students within the district and within a 10-mile radius of the school district border. Transportation must take place in accordance with the non-public or charter school schedule regardless of whether or not the home district is in session. This amounts to a significant additional cost for Parkland. Parkland consists of 72 square miles and borders several municipalities and counties. Our school buses provide service to 44 non-public and charter schools within the 10 mile radius. Only 3 of those schools actually reside in the Parkland School District. In 2022-2023, Parkland spent roughly \$7.7 million for transportation services for 9,911 students, or about \$780 per student. For those non-public and charter school students (618 students), Parkland spent roughly \$2,600 per student for those within 5 miles of the school district border and about \$7,500 per student within 5-10 miles of the school district border. In essence, eliminating this mandate would save Parkland School District about \$2.2 million annually. If the requirement was reduced to 5 miles, Parkland School District would have a significant impact on the Parkland School District budget and Parkland residents.

Cyber Charter School Tuition Formula - By far the largest mandate impacting school districts across the Commonwealth are charter schools, specifically cyber charter schools. School districts are required to make tuition payments to charter and cyber charter schools for each of their resident students enrolled. The current formula requires school districts to pay a tuition rate calculated based on the home school costs, not for that of the Charter. There is little accountability or transparency in regard to the funding mechanism. In Parkland, during the 10-year period from 2013-14 through 2022-23, Cyber Charter School enrollment increased by 221 students, or 124%. During that same period, the total Cyber Charter Tuition increased by \$4.9M, or 241%, as a result of more students enrolled in Cyber Charter schools and the Cyber Charter Tuition rates increasing during the 10-year period. Cyber Charter Tuition costs represented 1.5% of the District's total expenditures in 2013-14 and 3.2% of 2022-23 budgeted expenditures. From the period 2013-14 to 2022-23, Special Education Cyber Charter School enrollment increased by 50 students, or 152%.

In closing, I am happy to share the good news that Parkland was able to acquire land next to Cetronia Elementary School. While there are no set plans for the property, it does allow Parkland to consider expansion of the Cetronia Elementary school property for future use and has eliminated the neighborhood concern for the proposed land use that was voiced at several of our School Board meetings last year.

On behalf of all of us here in Parkland, I wish you a wonderful 2024!







BUILDING THE TEACHER PIPELINE FROM WITHIN

LCTI OFFERS NEW FUTURE EDUCATOR TRACK

Amara Barker is a PHS student interested in studying to become an elementary teacher while Mai Kavachery is a PHS student interested in teaching English as a Second Language at the Middle or High School level. Both have had the opportunity to explore the world of teaching possibilities within Lehigh Career and Technical Institute's (LCTI) new Future Educators program that is being piloted this year under the direction of teacher Kathy Khanuja. Both students started out in LCTI's Early Childcare Program, but were tapped to be the first students in a program that dives deep into K-12 education, including learning about pedagogy and the ability to take dual enrollment courses at Lehigh Carbon Community College (LCCC) that will ultimately put them closer to their goal of obtaining a teaching license.

In March, the Pennsylvania Department of Education (PDE) announced that career and technical education (CTE) entities could apply to create new programs to prepare students for careers in K-12 education in response to a looming teacher shortage across the Commonwealth. This program, authorized by PDE, aligns curriculum and standards for teacher training programs to federal guidelines and opens up new federal funding opportunities to schools that offer this career pathway. LCTI quickly sought to expand its Early Childcare program and the new funding pathway has allowed Ms. Khanuja to teach her regular English classes in the morning, and then spend her afternoons working with Amara and Mai, either by taking them to local districts to conduct observations, or helping the students work on career research and teaching pedagogy projects. Two days per week, the students go to LCCC to take dual enrollment courses that include Foundations of Education, Introduction to Special Education and Careers in Education.

While the program is currently only open to seniors, Director of Career & Technical Education Darin Van Norman is hopeful that the program will include more students in the coming years. "That way, our students will be able to take more credits towards an Associate Degree in Education which provides a foundation for continued study toward a bachelor's degree that is required for obtaining a teaching license for K-12 public schools in Pennsylvania."

Other plans for the future of the program include developing a mentorship program for the students that will involve certified teachers. LCTI is also interested in competing in an Educators Rising Career and Technical Student Organization competition that would require writing and designing a lesson plan, writing and presenting a book, and writing about the moment a person decided they wanted to be a teacher. PHS Teacher and Future Educators of America Club Advisor Julie Wood has served as a guest speaker to the program and has also invited Ms. Khanuja to introduce the program to club members. She is helping to spread the word to students about its existence along with PHS counselors.

Both Mai and Amara agree that the best part of the program has been witnessing a lot of teachers who are really passionate about their jobs and how much they care about students. Mai is thrilled to be taking college-level courses that will enable her to become a teacher faster and less expensive than if she did not participate in this program. She is receiving college credits at no cost since her enrollment at LCTI offers free dual enrollment credits with LCCC. She said that getting to meet ESL teachers who have discussed their career pathways has been helpful. Amara is enrolled in college courses full-time while finishing her high school diploma. She stated that she loves helping Ms. Khanuja with her 9th grade English class and interacting with her students. Through observations done at many schools this year, she can see herself loving various areas of education across middle and high school.

Parkland is not immune to the teacher shortage concerns that run rampant across the state. Human Resources Director Pam Kelly has been utilizing a Parkland Education Foundation grant for the last few years to help foster conversations between teachers and students about careers in education. She organizes student and teacher lunch-and-learn sessions that enable students to listen and learn from Parkland teachers who are eager to share the benefits of the profession. She stated, "The LCTI program is a wonderful opportunity for students to explore teaching. I hope we see these two very impressive students back in a few years looking to return to Parkland as educators."




IRONTON TURNS 100 YEARS OLD

NEW NATIONAL JUNIOR HONOR SOCIETY

The National Junior Honor Society (NJHS) is new at SMS this year under the leadership of teacher Angelic Schneider, principal Jude Sandt and assistant principal Amanda Abdelall. The mission of NJHS is to elevate the school's commitment to the values of scholarship, service, leadership, character and citizenship and help middle-level students develop the knowledge and skills to become well-rounded student leaders in their school, community and beyond. Eighth grade students at SMS were invited to apply to be part of the organization if they had a 4.0 GPA from sixth and seventh grade. Additionally, invited students were then required to submit an application indicating how they have demonstrated the fundamental principles of scholarship, leadership, service, character and citizenship. Ninety-eight students qualified with GPA scores and eighty-five students were inducted into the society. High school students from the High School's National Honor Society participated in the induction ceremony and high school orchestra members played the procession. NJHS inductees are required to complete 10 hours of service to SMS via peer tutoring of 6th and 7th grade classes, setting up Student of the Month events, teacher appreciation activities, a breakfast event for an upcoming orchestra parent presentation and more.

NHS has been a long-standing service club at Parkland High School where there are currently 276 members. Once accepted, members work together to help tutor fellow students, participate in various charitable fundraisers, assist with several elementary school endeavors and maintain their own outstanding grades. NHS members are required to complete 10 hours of tutoring for high school and/or middle school students as well as participate in NHS-sponsored activities and/or School District-sponsored events.

TEN PARKLAND STUDENTS NAMED

2024 NATIONAL MERIT SEMIFINALISTS



















The National Merit® Scholarship Program is an academic competition that recognizes the 50,000 highest Preliminary SAT/National Merit Scholarship Qualifying Test (PSAT/NMSQT®) scores in the nation out of approximately 1.5 million students who take the test each year. Of the 1.5 million entrants, approximately 50,000 with the highest PSAT/NMSQT® Selection Index scores qualify for recognition in the National Merit® Scholarship Program as either Commended Students (about 34,000) or Semifinalists (the highest 16,000).

The following nine Parkland High School students were selected as Semifinalists in the 2024 National Merit Scholarship Program. These scholastically talented seniors have an opportunity to continue in the competition for 7,600 Merit Scholarship awards worth \$33 million. They are pictured left to right from the top as follows:

YECHAN CHO is President of the Asian Language and Culture Club and the Tri-M Music Honors Society at Parkland High School. He also is the Vice President of the Orchestra. Yechan participates in the Parkland High School Math League, the Varsity Tennis Team, Future Business Leaders of America and National History Day. He is a Lehigh University High School Scholar and in his time at Parkland, participated in the PMEA State Orchestra and the National History Day State Conference. Yechan plans to attend the University of Pittsburgh in the fall and will major in Electrical and Computer Engineering.

LUCAS DEE is President of the Parkland High School Math Honor Society and the Interact Club, as well as Vice President of the Math League. He is also the Treasurer of the Tri-M Honors Society and the PHS Band and is a section leader in the band. At Parkland High School, Lucas participates in orchestra, honors orchestra, advanced honors orchestra, Strolling Strings and the Physics Club. Lucas is an AP Scholar with Distinction and was inducted into the National Honor Society, the French Honor Society, and the Science National Honor Society. In his spare time, Lucas is a volunteer at LVHN, Parkland CARES and The Kindness Project. He is undecided about where he will attend school in the fall, but plans to study pre-med as an Applied Math major.

THOMAS GILCHRIST is President and Captain of the Varsity Scholastic Scrimmage team at Parkland High School, as well as Editor-in-Chief of the Literary Magazine and Captain of the Varsity tennis team. While at Parkland, Tommy was inducted into the National Honor Society, the Math Honor Society, the Science Honor Society, the Spanish Honor Society and the Social Studies Honor Society. He also participated in Physics Club and National History Day where he was a National Finalist. He won First Place in the Scholastic Scrimmage International 3-2-1 Competition and is a PBS39 Scholastic Scrimmage Tournament All-Star. In his spare time, Tommy enjoys filmmaking and playing the piano. He is a Lehigh University High School Scholar and a Moravian University Dean's Scholar. QASIM MIRRANI is Vice President of Science Olympiad and the Math League at Parkland High School and previously was a representative for the Math Honor Society. Qasim is a member of National Honor Society, the Science National Honor Society and the Math Honor Society. He won an AP Scholar with Distinction title and a Gold medal in the PA Media and Design Competition. He participated in Scholastic Scrimmage and was a Junior Varsity Quarterfinalist in the National Academic Championship, as well as placed first nationally in the 2023 3-2-1 Competition and placed third nationally in the 2022 3-2-1 competition. Alexander also placed second at states for the PA Future Business Leaders of America competition in the Coding & Programming category and is an AP Scholar with Distinction. Ideally, he would like to attend Cornell University in the fall and study Computer Science.



participate in authentic problem solving and STEM-based learning experiences while growing fresh, local food. The students have been learning about important science concepts like PH and photosynthesis in a hands-on way as they tend to the hydroponic garden. They are also helping families in need. Both middle schools distributed fresh lettuce in weekly snack packs as part of the Parkland REACH program that aids families struggling with food insecurity. They were excited to be able to add fresh food to the weekly snack pack. The fork farms will continue to produce more than 375 plants each month.
