
Low Spending, High Achieving

- FY22 OEPP for Palos 118 was at the 28th percentile for Cook & DuPage elementary districts.
- This means that 72% of elementary districts in those counties spend more per pupil than Palos 118.




Palos 118 exceeded state averages in FY2021 when it kept schools open for inperson learning during the COVID-19 pandemic.

Palos 118 has one of the **lower tax rates** of all Cook and DuPage elementary school districts. (44th Percentile)


2022 Elementary Tax Rates - Cook and Dupage

Palos Park Housing Market Trends



What is the housing market like in Palos Park today?

In September 2023, Palos Park home prices were up 15.7% compared to last year, selling for a median price of \$504K. On average, homes in Palos Park sell after 56 days on the market compared to 64 days last year. There were 6 homes sold in September this year, down from 13 last year.

Palos Heights Housing Market Trends



What is the housing market like in Palos Heights today?

In September 2023, Palos Heights home prices were up 31.8% compared to last year, selling for a median price of \$435K. On average, homes in Palos Heights sell after 64 days on the market compared to 55 days last year. There were 13 homes sold in September this year, down from 23 last year.

Palos Hills Housing Market Trends



What is the housing market like in Palos Hills today?

In September 2023, Palos Hills home prices were up 2.0% compared to last year, selling for a median price of \$235K. On average, homes in Palos Hills sell after 46 days on the market compared to 49 days last year. There were 18 homes sold in September this year, down from 30 last year.



➤ Programs and services local school districts are legally required to provide without sufficient state or federal funding to cover their costs.





Since 1982, **699** educational mandates have been legislated in Illinois. Only 4 have been funded.







Deficit Spending to Meet Student Needs




Under PTELL, periods of low inflation lead to decreased revenue growth and contribute to deficit spending.



Operating Fund Balance and % of Expenses




A unique opportunity to address financial challenges without increasing or decreasing property taxes



Recommendation:


- The school district is scheduled to pay off all its outstanding debt in 2024 and will be **debt free**.
- ➤ With voter approval, the school district can **shift approximately \$4.35 million** in future property taxes no longer needed for debt service to its operating fund.
- The school district would **not be asking for more money**.
- This shift will not increase or decrease property taxes.

Use of Funds – Avoid Cuts

- ✓ Eliminate unsustainable operating budget deficits and avoid cuts to programs and services. (\$2.0M)
 - Retain existing programming like at-risk preschool, ALPS, fine arts, extracurricular activities and athletics.
 - Keep class sizes low in primary grades when students are learning to read.
 - Continue to attract young families that contribute to competitive housing market.












Use of Funds – Maintain School Facilities

- ✓ End reliance on short-term borrowing. (\$2.0M)
 - Pay off all existing debt and eliminate future interest costs to taxpayers.
 - Generate enough local funding to maintain school facilities.




Use of Funds – Provide Free Full Day Kindergarten


- ✓ Provide free full-day kindergarten for all. (\$350K)
 - Eliminate current tuition-based program in Fall 2024 (3 years prior to state mandate).
 - Provide funding source prior to state mandated full-day kindergarten beginning in school year 2027-2028.




Continued Reliance on Short-Term Borrowing

- ➤ The school district will become more reliant on short-term borrowing to maintain its school facilities and to cover the shortfall in state and federal funding for mandates.
- ➤ Interest rates are rising, which will increase the cost of future borrowing and the amount of property taxes needed to pay principal and interest on new debt.
