McKinney Vento: Homeless Education



Leading minds to learning, hearts to compassion and lives to community service.

McKinney Vento Act

The White Bear Lake Area School District is guided by the McKinney-Vento Homeless Assistance Act (2001-Title X, Part C, of the No Child Left Behind Act-725) defining homeless as individuals who lack a fixed, adequate nighttime residence.

It includes individuals and youth who are:

- Sharing housing of other persons due to loss of housing, economic hardship or similar reason
- Living in motels, hotels, cars, public spaces or campgrounds
- Living in shelters or transitional housing units.
- Unaccompanied youth who are not in the care of a guardian





Educational Rights

Under the McKinney Vento Act, children in homeless situations have the right to (NCHE National Center for Homeless Education):

- Immediate enrollment, even if they are missing records required for enrollment such as a birth certificate, proof of residence, previous school records or immunization records
- Attend the local school or the school of origin depending on what is in the child's best interest (school of origin is the school the child attended when he/she was permanently housed or the school in which the child was last enrolled)
- Receive transportation to and from the school of origin, when possible
- Have access to the same programs and services that are available to other students
- Free Reduced Lunch Program
- Title 1 Services

Tips for Parents

- We encourage you to reach out to your child's education team (principal, teachers, counselors, psychologist or school social worker).
 We can assist you with getting connected to community resources and agencies that may be able to help
- Continue to keep the building staff informed of changes in address so that we can help facilitate setting up transportation to ensure that your child is able to attend school regularly
- Let the teacher/school know the best way to reach you (phone or written notes) to ensure ongoing communication regarding your child's academic progress

Tips for Teachers

- Maintain a short written list of classroom rules and procedures
- Maintain homework/school supply kits. Contact your McKinney Vento Building Coordinator for supplies.
- Plan for accommodations for homework. Students may not have access to computers or other tools to complete assignments
- Inform the McKinney Vento Building Coordinator if a student is not attending school on a regular basis
