Lafayette College Professor Awarded \$75k

Michael Bertucci, a scientist and chemistry professor at Lafayette College, recently became one out of eight people in the country to receive the \$75,000 grant from The Camille and Henry Dreyfus Foundation. Earlier this month, the organization announced that the grant would be awarded to a successful project done on the effects synthetic peptides have on bacterial communication. According to the foundation's website, the award was designed to honor young faculty in the chemical sciences who have created an "outstanding independent body of scholarship" and are deeply committed to education with undergraduates.

Bertucci, along with several of his graduate students, began this study by using a strain of bacteria called Streptococcus gordonii. This bacteria is found in the mouth, but when spread into the bloodstream, is responsible for bacterial endocarditis. Bacterial endocarditis is a rare and severe inflammatory disease that may lead to oral infections and issues in the heart. For almost 70 years, doctors have struggled to find preventable measures.

Bertucci's ultimate goal was to create a molecule that could reduce the negative effects of the bacteria. The results Bertucci gathered from his research could have potentially life-saving consequences.

Yftah Tal-Gan, a chemistry professor at the University of Nevada in Reno, assisted Bertucci in the study. Students from Bertucci's lab had the opportunity to travel to Reno, Nevada to study alongside faculty and postdoctoral students. When Bertucci was interviewed, he revealed how proud he was of his students and how he was honored to serve as a mentor to them because he knew they are capable of doing great things. The money awarded to Bertucci will be put towards research opportunities for Bertucci's student research team to travel and take part in higher-level research.

The EPA Presents a Desire to Remove Lead Pipes from the



The Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) proposes its requirements to push forward with the total removal of lead pipes from US water systems. A mandate requiring water systems across the country to replace millions of lead service lines has been discussed through the agency. The rule would boost progress toward the Biden administration's ultimate goal of removing 100% of America's lead pipes.

Lead exposure can cause severe health risks, especially in children, and can be extremely harmful to developmental health. The most common form of exposure to lead poisoning is through lead pipes. Long-term lead exposure can put adults at higher risk for cancer, strokes, kidney disease, and other harmful conditions. It is infamously harmful for children as even low levels of lead can negatively affect a child's growth and development (US Centers for Disease Control and Prevention).

"We cannot survive without water. Yet for millions of homes, for millions of children, their water has been delivered by a poisonous straw," Dr. Mona Hanna-Attisha, a pediatrician and clean water advocate, said during a briefing hosted by the EPA. The EPA has boosted this project as a priority due to the dangerous and long-lasting effects lead exposure has had on adults and children.

Lead pipes have been banned since the 1980s. However, hundreds of the pipes were never replaced. According to the EPA, there are an estimated 9.2 million lead pipes still in service. The two states with the highest proportions of service lines that require replacement, with more than a quarter of the state's pipes containing lead, are Illinois and Rhode Island. New Jersey (14%) and Michigan (11%) are also considered "states at risk" for potential lead issues.

Oklahoma Man Executed for 'Self Defense'

Phillip Dean Hancock of Oklahoma was executed on November 30, 2023, for two counts of murder in 2001. There is much controversy around this decision due to Hancock's reasoning. According to Hancock, the murders were an act of self-defense.

In 2001, Hancock entered an Oklahoma City home, unarmed, where Robert Jett Jr. and James Lynch lived. Jett and Lynch were both in outlaw motorcycle gangs and lured Hancock into Jett's home. Hancock claimed that the two men, Robert Jett Jr. and James Lynch, attacked him. After he was attacked, Hancock grabbed Jett's pistol and shot and killed both of the men.

The attorneys for the state did not believe Hancock due to his testimony not aligning with physical evidence. Hancock is the fourth incarcerated person in Oklahoma to be executed this year, and he is the 11th person to be executed since they resumed in October 2021. There are no more scheduled executions in Oklahoma for this year.

Hancock's attorney released a statement saying, "This was a clear case of self-defense and the Governor and the state ignored a wealth of evidence showing that Phil was fighting for his life." Others are expressing that Hancock deserved to be executed for his actions. Assistant Attorney General Joshua Lockett, who cited a witness, stated, "Chasing someone down, telling them you are about to kill them, and then doing it is not self-defense".

AI Technologies Advancement in Healthcare

AI technology is growing larger each day and is starting to make its way into daily life for society. AI has also been able to make its way into healthcare and may be helpful to doctors in hospitals and pharmacies.

There have been a few cases where AI has shown the ability to properly help a stroke patient and expand health treatment. The AI can scan the patient's brain, detect the presence of a stroke, and classify the type of stroke that the patient is experiencing. With this type of technology, doctors are able to know what actions to take to effectively help the patient. The use of AI in the medical industry has already led to a decline in failed attempts to save a patient's life.

AI has also been able to detect Dementia, Alzheimer's, and other memory disorders in a person through their speech patterns using a system called CongoSpeak. CongoSpeak was created at the University of Sheffield by researchers in the United Kingdom. It has been proven to have a 90% accuracy in identifying Dementia and Alzheimer's, which is just as accurate as pen-and-paper exams.

CongoSpeak requires the patient to talk to a virtual agent. Here, they are asked questions that test memory capacity, fluency when speaking, and their ability to describe presented pictures. After the test is complete, the results are sent to the patient's doctor — allowing the patient to get the proper help they need.

It has also been used to create personalized medicine for patients using RestoreU, created by a uMETHOD company. The AI tool uses the patient's health record and multiple sources to create the most precise personalized medication for the patient.



19 Deaths in Airbnb's Caused by Carbon Monoxide Poisoning

There have been 19 deaths in Airbnb over the last ten years directly due to carbon monoxide poisoning. Affected families are claiming that Airbnb has failed to do enough to prevent carbon monoxide poisoning in their locations. Further, they are claiming that there should be mandated carbon monoxide detectors in every rental.

In early 2014, Airbnb said that they would require hosts to confirm that there were carbon monoxide detectors installed in every room. The company had faced its first death months earlier in Taiwan.

Airbnb's first death was nearly ten years ago and they have failed to take proper action. There have been many more lives lost in Airbnb locations during these ten years. The total number of deaths since 2013 is reported to be 19. With this, Airbnb is currently facing three lawsuits.

Airbnb has stated in seven of the cases, which accounts for 17 of the deaths. None of their statements, however, have given details surrounding the death or the role of carbon monoxide. In the two cases where Airbnb did not issue a statement, they were faced with two lawsuits. One lawsuit was settled and the second lawsuit was dismissed.

Jennifer Winder lost her father and stepmother to this problem in November of 2018. Jennifer Winder said that the company met with her and her brother to give suggestions to solve the problem. She wonders, with all the deaths in 2022, if any steps were actually taken.

Polluted Thoughts: Unmasking How Air Pollution Can Damage the Brain

Recent studies suggest a negative correlation between air pollution exposure and intelligence. According to the United Nations Environment Programme, "Air pollution can also have a huge negative effect on cognitive intelligence."

In August of 2023, a study was conducted to examine this issue. Scientists at Peking University and Yale University gathered 25,000 people across 162 Chinese counties. The study also gathered air pollutant data from each county. The National Academy of Sciences journal explained, "The study was also based on...sulfur dioxide (SO₂), nitrogen dioxide (NO₂) and particulate matter smaller than 10 micrometers (PM10) where the participants lived."

The participants were then given a verbal and math exam. Their scores were compared to those who do not live in areas with significant air pollution. Ultimately, the researchers found lower exam scores among the study's participants. Professor Xi Chen, a professor at Yale University, revealed that "polluted air can cause everyone to reduce their level of education by one year, which is huge."

Why did this happen? A study conducted in 2016 suggests that PM2.5 is the key culprit. PM2.5 is a particulate matter that is produced by industrial activities. Alzheimer's Society explains, "The particles (PM2.5) were seen inside protein deposits called amyloid plaques which are abundant in the Alzheimer's brain, leading to speculation that magnetite could be involved in the development of [cognitive decline]."

Air pollution can infiltrate the very core of our cognitive functions. With this, society must make an effort towards limiting air pollution exposure.

U.N. States 2023 is the Hottest Year on Record

The U.N. Weather Agency states that 2023 is the hottest year on record. With this, there are warnings of trends that suggest increasing floods, wildfires, glacier melt, and heat waves in the near future.


The World Meteorological Organization also cautioned that the average temperature for the year increased by 2.5 degrees Fahrenheit from pre-industrial times. This is only one-tenth of a degree under the target temperature for the end of the century, as suggested by the Paris Climate Record in 2015.

The WMO Secretary-General said the onset earlier this year of El Nino, the phenomenon marked by heating the Pacific Ocean, could tip the average temperature over the 2.7 degrees Fahrenheit target of Paris.

Last month destroyed the previous November heat record, pushing global average temperatures to 2.7 degrees Fahrenheit warmer than the pre-industrial era.

It had been previously assumed that 2023 would break the global heat record.

Due to rising temperatures, the U.N Weather Agency will finalize a global climate agreement on December 12th. However, the most recent draft text is expected on Wednesday, sources stated to the AFP news agency.



Guyana-Venezuela Tensions Sparks Concern

If you take a look at the news, you'll notice one thing; conflicts are ravaging nearly all corners of the world. From Khortoum to Kyiv and from Tel Aviv to Yerevan, it seems as though the Old World has lost all sense and order. Sadly, the plague of war is not exclusive to nations beyond the Atlantic. Since early November, centuries-old tensions have sprouted roots and hooked onto the North Western coast of South America.

South America is home to twelve distinct nations and one overseas European territory. South America, much like the rest of the New World, has a long history of colonialism and interstate conflicts. Most of these conflicts, however, subsided over the course of the early 20th century. Notably, the last major state-on-state conflict was in the 1990s between Ecuador and Peru. As the 20th century gave way to the 21st, the roots of these conflicts changed. In recent times, tensions have now sparked over maritime boundaries and resources. This is exemplified by the recent Guyana-Venezuela tensions.

For context, Guyana and Venezuela have a difficult territorial history. From its independence in 1811, Venezuela held roughly 90% of what today is considered Guyana. Prior to 1890, this region of Guyana, referred to as the Essequibo/Esequiba Region, belonged to Venezuela. The remainder of Guyana was a British colony. Essequibo would be ceded to British Guyana after a near war and negotiations.

From then on, the Venezuelans held a deep resentment towards the loss of this territory. In 1966, Guyana gained independence from the British Crown. With independence came a renewed Venezuelan interest in the reclamation of Essequibo. Negotiations between Georgetown and Caracas, the capitals of Guyana and Venezuela respectively, failed to reaffirm the pre-1890 border.

Contrary to Venezuelan demands, Essequibo would be reaffirmed as Guyananese territory by the International Court of Justice in 1966, initially settling the dilemma. Things would change when Guyananese authorities unearthed oil in the Essequibo region in 2015. Suddenly, Caracas had grown yet another interest within the Essequibo region. Despite this, things would remain mainly peaceful for the next eight years.

In October 2023, a sudden uptick in Venezuelan troop movements was noticed near the Venezuela-Guyana border. Georgetown, fearing a sudden military incursion by Venezuela, called on the International Court of Justice in November yet again to handle the situation. Guyana demanded their natural boundaries established both in 1890 and later cemented in 1966 be respected. Caracas ignored these. Then, on December 3rd, Venezuelan President Nicolás Maduro launched a nationwide referendum on the annexation of Essequibo. Votes were counted and by December 4th the polls showed that 95% of all Venezuelans supported military action in Essequibo.

Currently, tensions continue to hang over Guyana. Brazil had pledged and deployed thousands of soldiers in Guyana to protect Guyanese territorial integrity. Similarly, the United States pledged to establish military bases and begin an air watch over Guyana. These precautions have seemingly been made to deter Caracas from invasion. The situation is still unfolding and all eyes are on Caracas.

The Passing of Henry Kissinger

Former United States Secretary of State Henry Alfred Kissinger passed away on November 29, 2023, at his home in rural Connecticut at age 100. No cause of death was provided for his death, but it is assumed as death due to old age. He was known as an American diplomat, political scientist, geographic consultant, and politician who served as the United States Secretary of State.

Many Americans would consider him the most powerful United States Secretary of State of the post-war era. He served as national security advisor under Richard Nixon and Secretary of State under General Ford between 1969 and 1977. He was a lifelong advisor to many foreign leaders. Kissinger pioneered the policy of detente with the Soviet Union, which eased the tensions between the two countries.

He engaged in "shuttle diplomacy" to separate Israel and Arab forces after their fallout during the Yom Kippur War. Many would object to his foreign policy, and believed Kissinger was neglecting human rights in other countries. No issues complicated Kissinger's legacy more than the Vietnam War. This was when Nixon was in office and devised a "secret plan" while working alongside Kissenger to promise a way to end the war. This initially didn't end the war, and roughly 30,000 Americans died in Vietnam. This would increase citizens' distrust of their government.

Are the Rumors True?


