2023 AP SCHOLARS

Advanced Placement (AP), through the College Board, provides students the opportunity to take college level courses and earn credit at the collegiate level. Of our 68 graduates, 55% of the class completed one or more Advanced Placement (AP) courses and, additionally, 26 or 38% completed two or more AP courses during their high school career.

The AP Scholar program recognizes students who have met benchmark scores on multiple AP exams taken in the same year. There are four levels of recognition.

After another successful AP testing season, 11 students in the Class of 2023 were recognized as AP Scholars.

ACADEMIC ACHIEVEMENT



The Class of 2023 was a diverse group of hard working students with 83% accepted to post-secondary institutions, and 25% pursuing direct employment or vocational training. Shepaug offers over 20 honors courses across all subjects including agriscience, art, history, language, literature, music and science, over 17 college level courses, as well as extracurricular opportunities for students to challenge themselves throughout their academic careers.

This year, Mary Katherine Eddy was named Valedictorian and is attending the University of Connecticut as a pre-med student and presidential scholar. Julianna Fontanilla was named Salutatorian and is attending University of Oklahoma to study Pharmacy.

ANSWERING A CALL TO CITIZENSHIP

The Class of 2023 contributed significant community service hours. The graduating class of 68 students contributed nearly 3,000 hours of service. This years community service recipient is Arantza Artieda.

NATIONAL MERIT SCHOLARS



The National Honor Society (NHS) stands as a venerable symbol of scholarly excellence. As one of the oldest and largest co-curricular organizations, boasting a membership of over 1.4 million students nationwide, the NHS embodies an

unwavering commitment to academic prowess. Far more than a mere organization, the NHS acts as a catalyst, fostering dedication to scholarship, cultivating a passion for altruistic service, refining leadership skills, and molding the character of secondary school students.

Approximately 1.6 million high school students enter the National Merit Scholarship program each year by taking the PSAT/National Merit Scholarship Qualifying Exam in October of their junior year in high school. The top 50,000 scorers on the qualifying exam are eligible for the awards.

Anchored in its four pillars of scholarship, leadership, service, and character - the NHS shapes well-rounded individuals beyond academics. By fostering dedication to scholarship, refining leadership skills, and promoting a passion for altruistic service, the NHS remains a powerful force in molding the character of secondary school students.

NATIONAL HONOR SOCIETY INDUCTION CEREMONY

In partnership with Read Across America, Judge Alexandra DePentima visited Shepaug to read 'This Is Your Time' by Ruby Bridges, as well as to discuss the US Constitution and answer questions about the legal system. During the engaging session, Judge DePentima emphasized the importance of fostering civic awareness among students, encouraging them to actively participate in their communities and understand the role of the legal system in shaping a just society.



APPELATE COURT VISIT

On Monday, April 17, 2023, Shepaug Valley School hosted the State Appellate Court. Students witnessed two provocative cases and gained firsthand insight into the judicial process. Through its "On Circuit" program, the Appellate Court has presented arguments at various high schools, colleges, and universities since the program's inception in 1996, and this marked the first time the court engaged with Shepaug Valley School. During the interactive question-and-answer session, students exhibited a noteworthy enthusiasm for delving into the legal intricacies presented in the two cases, actively engaging with the visiting lawyers to enhance their comprehension of the judicial proceedings.

Shepaug's Principal Dr. Donald R. Schels expressed his appreciation, stating, "Shepaug Valley School feels very lucky to have this wonderful opportunity for our students to gain deeper insight into the appellate process in our state. It is wonderful that our judiciary considers this type of outreach to be part of its mission, and a continued partnership between the courts and our schools will help our students develop a deeper sense of civic awareness and engagement."



LISTENING SESSION

Students from The Agriscience Academy engaged with Congresswoman Jahana Hayes and Congressman Glenn "GT" Thompson during the Farm Bill Listening Session at Shepaug Valley School on Saturday, July 29, 2023. Proudly hosted at Shepaug Valley School, the event allowed students to participate in discussions about crucial policies for the local agricultural community. They discussed topics like increased funding for small farms, better access to meat processing plants for smaller farmers, and support for BIPOC, young, and beginning farmers, gaining insights into addressing the impact of extreme weather and the climate crisis on local farms.

SENIOR PROJECTS WITH EXCELLENCE & DISTINCTION

Each year, Shepaug recognizes and awards Excellence and Distinction to students who demonstrated a strong commitment, diligence, and passion in completing their projects. In 2023, we recognized four seniors for their outstanding exploration, discovery, and execution.



Abigail Creech

Aquaculture for the Ocean

Abby's project fused original research with practical application to combat some of the ways that human behavior exacerbates damage to our oceans. Abby grew corals from polyps in a home tank. She used experimental conditions to determine which factors of lighting, filtration, materials, and nutrients could best lead to a thriving habitat for reef corals. She ended up learning more than she expected about programming home electronics, fixing faulty pumps, managing homicidal clown fish, and interacting collegially with globally renowned oceanographers.



Julianna Fontanilla Flowers to Remember

Julianna studied the effects of flower arranging on memory with senior citizens. Julianna conducted a comprehensive study that met the highest standards of rigor, including an extensive literary review, multiple trials with different participants, and data analysis. She measured the accuracy of participants' memory using methodologies drawn from her research. She also studied differing styles of floral arranging. Julianna showed superior commitment to excellence and integrity to create a study with scientific integrity and validity.



Rocco Massago Bringing It To Life: The Barrel Train Express

Rocco took on the challenge this year of restoring and fabricating a lawn tractor into a barrel train. He combined traditional research with hands-on trial and error to bring the train to life. Throughout the process, he truly left no stone unturned, as he essentially stripped the tractor down to its barest elements and rebuilt them all. He kept playfulness and service at the core of his vision as well, and converted old barrels into rider seats for children. As a result of his hard work, the barrel train will be a fun memory for many children at future community events. Rocco has decided to pursue a career in restoration and fabrication.

Becoming a First Responder

Dante spent his year looking at what it takes to be a first responder. Dante used a variety of research, from in-person interviews with experts, to a visit to the Litchfield County Dispatch, to actually becoming a certified first responder. He completed a 60-hour course to certify him as an EMR (Emergency Medical Responder). Dante put his research into practice by joining the Bridgewater Fire Department. The Senior Project team was impressed by his consistency and dedication. Dante turned his research into an integral part of who he is. Through this, he is serving his community in critically important ways.


