Subject: New Providence High School Named to Advanced Placement School Honor Roll

New Providence, NJ – College Board announced that New Providence High School has been named to the Advanced Placement® Program (AP®) School Honor Roll, earning silver distinction.

The AP® School Honor Roll recognizes schools whose AP programs are delivering results for students while broadening access. Schools can earn this recognition annually based on criteria that reflect a commitment to increasing college-going culture, providing opportunities for students to earn college credit, and maximizing college readiness.

NPHS had 52% of seniors who took at least one AP exam during high school, 45% scoring a three or higher on at least one AP exam, and 5% who took five or more AP exams!
