LEARNING IS A LIFELONG PROCESS

The Ann Arbor Public Schools offer a continuum of early education and support for children and families from birth to at 5. We understand that during the first years of life, children are forming the basis of lifelong learning and success - and families play an integral role in their progress. Our youngest learners deserve all the best!

Children learn at many different rates, in many different ways, and through many different processes.

At the Westerman Preschool & Family Center (WPFC), our primary responsibility is to provide a safe, nurturing, and stimulating environment in which children, from birth to age 5, can thrive as they "learn" to learn.

OUR WHOLE CHILD APPROACH

Exposure to academically robust programming and services promote positive social interaction, self-expression, emotional development, curiosity, and independence necessary for a lifelong love of learning. We create an exciting classroom environment that combines foundational skills in reading, writing, and arithmetic, with hands-on learning and constructive play to enhance social, emotional, physical, and creative skills.

Students are taught using The Creative Curriculum - a formalized preschool-specific, research-based curriculum approved by state and federal educational authorities.

Programs offer core educational components, including:

- Academics
- Imaginative play
- Large and small group activities
- Nutritious meals
- Outside time
- Social-emotional development
- Access to technology

A COORDINATED, TEAM APPROACH

Experienced, highly-qualified teachers and professional support staff, with multiple degrees in early childhood development, guide students through enriched curricula supported by Everyday Math for Preschoolers, Dialogic Reading, Second Step Social Skills Development, and Handwriting Without Tears, developed explicitly for preschool students.

Classroom activities and access to the media center, gymnasium, and outdoor recreation areas - are designed to inspire, challenge, and strengthen young minds and bodies. For this reason, every aspect of your preschooler's early education is carefully planned, implemented, and evaluated to maximize growth and developmental potential. When necessary, modifications - such as home visits or one-on-one classroom support from auxiliary personnel - may be recommended.

▲ PRESCHOOL OPTIONS

The Ann Arbor Public Schools offer free, grant-funded, and tuition-based preschool options at one or more of our 5 locations (Westerman Preschool, Allen, Bryant, Mitchell, Thurston). Programs serve 3- and 4-year-old children living in Washtenaw County or one of the nine Washtenaw County school districts. School-day length classes (approximately 7 hours) operate four days per week (Monday-Thursday) and follow the AAPS School Calendar. (A Friday program is available at some locations for an additional fee.)

A Free Grant-Funded Programs for 3-year-old Children Available only at Westerman Preschool & Family Center and Mitchell

- Available for children who turn 3-years-old on or before December 1 of the school year.
- Transportation provided for in-district students.
- Family must be below 100% FPL* or meet other criteria.
- Go to www.washtenawpreschool.org to complete an interest survey to start the application process.

B Free Grant-Funded Programs for 4-year-old Children Available at Westerman Preschool, Allen, Bryant, Mitchell, & Thurston

- Available for children turning 4-years-old on or before December 1 of the school year.
- Transportation provided for in-district students at Westerman Preschool, Mitchell, and Bryant only.
- Family must be below 250% FPL* or meet other criteria.
- Go to www.washtenawpreschool.org to complete an interest survey to start the application process.

C Tuition Programs Available at Westerman Preschool, Allen, & Thurston

- Available for children turning 3- or 4-years-old on or before December 1 of the school year.
- 3-year-old option available at Westerman Preschool.
- 4-year-old option available at Westerman Preschool, Allen, and Thurston.
- Transportation provided for in-district students at Westerman Preschool only.

In small class sizes
